

To the Chairman and Members of the Sidmouth Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman and Members,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Public Health of the Urban District for the year ending 31st.December 1945.

The report conforms as closely as possible with the requirements laid down in the Ministry of Health circulars 10/44 of the 15th.February 1944 and 49/45 of the 19th.March 1945.

(a) <u>Council Officials</u>.

- (b) (i) <u>Laboratory Facilities</u>. These are provided by the Devon County Council Laboratory.
- (ii) <u>Ambulance Facilities</u>. There is an excellent and adequate ambulance service provided by the Sidmouth Division of the St.John's Ambulance Brigade, which possesses a motor ambulance.
 - (111) <u>Nursing in the Home, Clinic and Hospitals</u>. The Queen's Nurse and District Nurses attend to cases requiring nursing in their own homes. These nurses also attend the Child Welfare Clinics and provide ante-natal services.

The up-to-date local hospital, the Victoria Cottage Hospital, provides facilities for every type of case requiring hospital treatment. It is affiliated to the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital. Infectious cases are by arrangement with the City of Exeter admitted to the Whipton Isolation Hospital.

(iv) <u>Maternity</u>. During recent years pressure on housing accommodation and social changes which are taking place make it increasingly difficult for maternity cases to be confined in their own homes. This applies to all classes of the residential and visiting population. It has been during the year under report a great advantage in this respect that the Devon County Council still continue to maintain a temporary maternity home, first in Long Orchard and later at The Grove, two houses suitable for the purpose.

The Victoria Cottage Hospital provides four maternity beds, but the presence of these in a cottage hospital which has a total of twenty-seven beds is open to question. From time to time there must be septic surgical cases in the general beds of the hospital.

The provision of a permanent maternity home in Sidmouth itself is badly needed. Sidmouth as a health resort has always attracted a high class of medical practitioner and it seems anomalous where such medical skill is available that maternity cases should be sent outside the town.

The arrangements for cleansing provided under the A.R.P. authorities at the depot where the disinfector is housed have proved very useful for dealing with troops from time to time who have been camped in the neighbourhood. The disinfector is shortly to be moved from its present position and it is proposed that at its new site a certain number of showers shall be provided.

(viii) Eradication of Bed Bugs.

Two small infestations were dealt with by the Sanitary Inspector. In each case the premises were treated with Zaldecide after first easing all skirtings, architraves, picture rails etc., The treatment was successful, as in subsequent visits no further bed bugs were found.
