Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the Year ended 31st December, 1902.

Infectious Disease in the Port.-Patients admitted into the Floating Hospital and Deans Hospital.

During 1902, 68 patients have been admitted into the Floating Hospital. 6 patients were admitted into the Jarrow Infectious

Hospital. The subjoined Table gives particulars as to the cases and their issue:—

					the difficulties of such cases, and they agreed with the precautionary measures adopted in this case. Dr.
					Hy. Armstrong and myself agreed to recommend that in the future no cases should be admitted into the Royal Infirmary from ships without

Water-Boats and Water Supply to Ships in Port.

The water-boats, 32 in number, have been examined as usual, and the tanks found in good condition.

In 52 cases the *drinking water* of ships, which came from Ports infected, or suspected to be infected, with Cholera, has been changed, and the purification of the tanks has been seen to by the Inspector, acting under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health.

Advices as to Sickness

on shipboard, and other matters, continued to be received from and forwarded to the Health Departments of other British Port Sanitary Authorities.

Clothing and Bedding.

17 vessels and several lots of clothing or bedding have been disinfected. 130 old beds have been burnt, and 15 lots of filthy clothing have been destroyed, on account of infection.

Passenger Steamers.

The Passenger Steamers arriving continue to be regularly visited and examined.

Fishing Boats.

The total arrival of fishing vessels at the Quay, North Shields, steam and sailing, is 13,340* (6,510 Trawlers and 6,830 Herring Boats), as compared with a total of 13,527 in the previous year. 56 of these, in foul condition, were cleansed and deodorized on notice from the Inspector. The rest were in good order.

Foul Cattle Ships.

The Inspector reports that 4 Cattle Ships arrived in the Port direct with cattle, and 1 after having landed cattle elsewhere. They were cleansed under his supervision.

Regulations.

Copies of Regulations issued have, as usual, been posted on all gangways, and delivered on board of vessels in the port.

Cholera, Yellow Fever, and Plague.

No cases occurred in the Tyne Port during the year 1902.

Floating Hospital.

In February, at the request of the Local Authorities on Tyneside, the hospital was reserved for the treatment of smallpox which might arise in the various districts where no accommodation existed for its reception. During the outbreak of smallpox on Tyneside from February to June, 38 cases were admitted from the Borough of North Shields, 2 cases from Jarrow, 7 cases from Blaydon, 1 case from Wallsend, and 1 case from Willington Quay. This arrangement existed until the end of the year and necessarily postponed dealing with the important question which will have to be faced in the near future, viz.:—The provision of an adequate administrative department for the Floating Hospital, which is a model hospital of its class as far as ward accommodation is concerned.

New Hospital.

A scheme for the provision of a New Hospital for the treatment of the ordinary infectious cases, i.e., typhoid, scarlet fever, diphtheria, &c., has been considered by the Hospital Committee. The recommendations put forward were that the Floating Hospital should be used for smallpox and plague if necessary, and that another hospital should be erected on shore for the treatment of the commoner and less dangerous infectious cases. Nothing short of a scheme like this will meet with the views and approval of the Local Government Board, as there are serious objections to the old method of treating smallpox in a general infectious hospital. No doubt during this year action in a practical form will be taken by the Authority on these important subjects upon which the proper administration and efficiency of the Port Sanitary work depends.
