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Water Supply during the year has been satisfactory. The supply coming from the Broomen Green Well.
Samples are taken frequently and are satisfactory.

Infant Welfare and Maternity Centre.

The work here continues to be conducted in a satisfactory manner.

House Refuse Collection.

This, as in previous years, is collected by covered cart once a week except in the case of a few out-lying houses.

Dairies and Cowsheds.

These have been regularly inspected during the year and

are in a satisfactory condition.

One of them is showing signs of the presence of Bacillus Coli but samples are being taken frequently and we hope this will soon be improved.

Schools.

(1) County Council (for boys only).

These buildings are modern and in good condition.

(2) Girls and Infants.

This school is rather over-crowded but otherwise satisfactory.

I have during the year examined the children born in the

years 1925 and 1928.

The children are healthy and there are no signs of under or improper feeding. Their clothing is good and the boots satisfactory.

During the examination I received help from Mr Davies in the boy's School and from Miss Apthorpe and the District

Nurse in the Girls and Infants School.

Milk Supply.

This is increasing in the number of children taking milk.

Mid-day Meals.

There is a falling off in the number of girls taking these meals and it has sunk about fifteen. Some of them go home for their dinner. The boys are keeping up their number.
