IMMUNISATION AGAINST DIPTHERIA

Doctors, Nurses and School Teachers have all co-operated to make a success of the scheme and the children have been immunised chiefly at their respective schools and a few at the Doctors' Surgeries.

87.58% of an estimated population of 435 children under 5, and, 82.33% of an estimated population of 1070 children between 5 and 15 were immunised.

TYPHUS

A specially trained squad has been organised to combat this disease in case of emergency.

SCABIES

3 cases of Scabies were reported, which were sent to Chalkdell. House, Hitchin, for treatment.

SCHOOL INSPECTION

During the year children were examined at the various Schools by the School Medical Officer. On the whole they were found in good physique, health, and in most cases their clothing was good.

COMMUNAL PREDING

A large percentage of the School children have their mid-day meals regularly at a British Restaurant.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICIALS

- (a) Medical. The Medical Officer of Health is a part-time officer holding a Diploma in Public Health. He is also Medical Officer of Health for the Urban District Councils of Baldock and Letchworth.
- (b) Sanitary. The Sanitary Inspector holds the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute.

LABORATORY FACILITIES, HOSPITAL FACILITIES, ETC.

Samples of water, milk, etc., are sent to the Public Hoalth Emergency Hospital, Hertford, for bacteriological examination, and certain cases of infectious diseases to the North Herts. Isolation Hospital.

INFANT WELFARE AND MATERNITY CENTRE

Good work has been accomplished at this Centre and on the whole most of the children who attended were free from head lice. etc.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA, WATER SUPPLIES

The Town is supplied by 2 water works Pumping plants both electrically operated with one steam stand-by from which a constant and normal supply of water is distributed by main to all the houses with the exception of approximately 70 houses which are situated on the outskirts.

30 samples were taken and submitted for bacteriological examination. For a short period the water was slightly contaminated and every effort was tried to trace the cause. Preventativo methods were adopted and eventually the water cleared itself.

WELLS - PRIVATE WATER SUPPLIES

There are 26 wells or boreholes on the outskirts of the town. Il samples were taken from 4 wells for bacteriological examination. The water from 2 wells was correct, and the other 2 wells were unsatisfactory.

SEWAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The Town is provided with a foul sewer 24" dismeter leading to bacterial treatment at the Sewage Disposal Works and a 36" surface water sewer discharging into a water-course, both of which give satisfactory results.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL, AND SALVAGE

House refuse collection and the disposal of same and the cleansing of the Town is supervised and carried out in a very efficient manner by the Surveyor.

The refuse is disposed of by semi-controlled tipping.

During the year. 95 tons were salvaged which realised £454.

MORTUARY

A mortuary was erected in 1936 and is fitted for holding Post-mortem examinations.

HOUSING

House to house inspection was carried out at a number of houses.

No private houses were erected during the year. On account of war conditions, shortage of labour, materials etc. this work has been somewhat restricted.

Although there has been an influx of Evacuees and work people overcrowding has been kept down to a minimum.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

Milk Supply (Special Designations Order) 1935. 8 samples of accredited milk, 3 of tuberculosis tested milk, and 1 of pasteurised milk, were taken for bacteriological examination. From 12 samples taken, 9 passed the full test and 3 failed. There are 18 Registered Producers or Froducer-retailers of which 1 is licensed for the production of tuberculin tested milk, 1 for pasteurised and 4 for accredited milk.

National Milk Testing and Advisory Scheme. 35 samples of milk were taken from producer-retailers, which gave the following results: - Good 20, Moderate 9, Pour 4.

Meat and other Foods. There are 6 licensed slaughterhouses in the District, which owing to war conditions are not in regular use, which are kept up to a fair standard. Occasional slaughterings licensed by the Food Control Committee are carried out.

Reserved Food supplies are examined from time to time also

Foods suspected to be unfit for human consumption in shops, stores, etc., have to be certified by your Inspector before replacements can be made.

Bakehouses, Manufacturers of Preserved Food and Tradesmens' Vans etc. are inspected with a view to keeping up a good standard of cleanliness.
