PARA-TYPHOID B

There was a slight outbreak of Para-Typhoid B of a sporadic nature during June, July and August. 7 cases were notified 4 being sent to hospital and 3 nursed at home. A great deal of time was spent in investigating the source of infection, assisted by the medical staff of the Herts County Council and Ministry of Health, but the source was not established although milk was suspected.

IMMUNISATION AGAINST DIPHTHERIA

Doctors, Nurses and School Teachers have all co-operated to make a success of the scheme and the children have been immunised chiefly at their respective schools and a few at the Doctors' Surgeries.

About 89% of an estimated population of 457 children under 5, and,

83% of an estimated population of 940 children between 5 and 15 were immunised.

TYPHUS

A specially trained squad has been organised to combat this disease in case of emergency, which is part of a scheme for North Herts.

SCABIES

4 cases of Scabies were reported, which were sent to Letchworth for treatment.

SCHOOL INSPECTION

During the year children were examined at the various schools by the School Medical Officer. On the whole they were found in good physique, health, and in most cases their clothing was good.

COMMUNAL FEEDING

A large percentage of the School children have their mid-day meals regularly at a British Restaurant.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES, PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICIALS

- (a) Medical. The Medical Officer of Health is a part-time officer holding a Diploma in Public Health. He is also Medical Officer of Health for the Urban District Councils of Baldock and Letchworth.
- (b) Sanitary. The Sanitary Inspector holds the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute.

LABORATORY FACILITIES, HOSPITAL FACILITIES, ETC.

Samples of water, milk, etc., are sent to the Public Health Emergency Hospital, Hertford, for bacteriological examination.

INFANT WELFARE AND MATERNITY CENTRE.

Good work has been accomplished at this Centre and on the whole most of the children who attended were free from head lice, etc.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA, WATER SUPPLIES.

The Town is supplied by 2 water works Pumping plants both electrically operated with one steam stand-by from which a constant and normal supply of water is distributed by main to

all the houses with the exception of approximately 70 houses which are situated on the outskirts *who obtain water from wells.*

23 samples were taken and submitted for bacteriological examination which gave the following results:- 19 satisfactory, 4 unsatisfactory, the latter coinciding with new boring operations and the last unsatisfactory sample dated 14th September, 1944.

WELLS - PRIVATE WATER SUPPLIES

26 samples of water were taken from 8 wells for bacteriological examination, which were under suspicion of contamination and the results of the analyses showed 5 samples satisfactory and 21 samples unsatisfactory.

5 of the 8 wells were condemned and have been closed for drinking purposes and the consumers are being supplied with the town's water.

SEWAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The Town is provided with a foul sewer 24" diameter leading to bacterial treatment at the Sewage Disposal Works and a 36" surface water sewer discharging into a water-course, both of which give satisfactory results.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL, AND SALVAGE

House refuse collection and the disposal of same and the cleansing of the Town is supervised and carried out in a very efficient manner by the Surveyor.

The refuse is disposed of by semi-controlled tipping.

During the year, 75 tons were salvaged which realised £330.

MORTUARY

A mortuary was erected in 1936 and is fitted for holding Post-mortem examinations.

HOUSING

House to house inspection was carried out at a number of houses.

No private houses were erected during the year. On account of war conditions, shortage of labour, materials etc. this work has been somewhat restricted.

Although there has been an influx of Evacuees and work-people overcrowding has been kept down to a minimum ; only 4 cases were reported during the year.

VERMINOUS PREMISES

5 houses were treated for vermin which were eradicated by spraying with a liquid vermin mixture named "Zaldecide".

An inspection of furniture, bedding etc. was carried out, this being done by the Local Authority.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

Milk Supply (Special Designations Order) 1936

26 samples of milk were taken for Bacteriological examination which gave the following results:-

National Milk Testing and Advisory Scheme 46 samples of milk were taken from producer-retailers, which gave the following results:- Good 23, Moderate 16, Poor 2.

Meat and other Foods. There are 6 licensed slaughterhouses in the District, which owing to war conditions are not in regular use, which are kept up to a fair standard. Occasional slaughterings licensed by the Food Control Committee are carried out.

Reserved Food supplies are examined from time to time also foods suspected to be unfit for human consumption in shops, stores, etc., have to be certified by your Inspector before replacements can be made.

Bakelhouses, manufacturers of preserved food and tradesmen's vans etc. are inspected with a view to keeping up a good standard of cleanliness.
