### Comment on Vital Statistics.

The estimated local population for mid 1951 shows an increase of 182, considerable immigration in the second half of the year not therefore being shown for that point in time. For the year 1951 the local death rate (10.4) was markedly lower than for most previous years and reflects the recent increase among the younger age groups of the population. The chief causes of death were: Heart and Other Circulatory Diseases 30, Vascular Lesions of the Nervous System 8, and Cancer (all sites) 18. Again no local death is recorded from Motor Vheicle Accidents.

The infant mortality (16) again compares favourably with the figure for England and Wales while the marked rise in the local birth rate follows increases among young families entering the New Town.

### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

### Water Supplies.

The Town is supplied by 2 water pumping plants, both electrically operated. from which a constant and normal supply of water is distributed by main to 2161 houses (approximate population 6524), and by standpipes to 4 houses (approximate population 10), while 40 houses (approximate population 125) are supplied by private wells.

82 samples of water taken by your Sanitary Inspector were submitted to the Luten Public Health Laboratory for bacteriological examination and 111 samples by Messrs. Rideal, Rideal & Sciver, London, for bacteriological examination.

New Mains; The unsatisfactory samples of chlorinated water were taken from new mains not in service. All of the mains were subsequently re-chlorinated and produced satisfactory results before being put into service.

General Remarks. The geological position of Stevenage lies on the edge of a basin and therefore the water supply will always be liable to surface contamination. During recent years the water supply has intermittently been contaminated, and to counteract this, a plant was installed in April (1949) for the water to be super-chlorinated at the inlet to the reservoir with de-chlorination at the outlet.

### Sewage and Sewage Disposal.

The Town is provided with a foul sewer 24" diameter leading to bacterial treatment at the Stevenage Disposal Works and a 36" surface water sewer discharging into a water-course, both of which are satisfactory.

# Refuse Collection and Disposal of Salvage.

House refuse collection, the disposal of same and the cleansing of the Town is supervised and carried out by the Surveyor. The refuse is disposed of by semi-

During the year 22 tons 3 cwts of materials were salvaged which realised £333.18.9.

# Smoke Observations.

6 smoke observations were taken and during each period no nuisances occurred.

# Petroleum (Consolidation) act, 1928.

17 premises are licensed for petroleum, carbide of calcium etc. and the regulations are satisfactorily complied with.

#### Housing.

Routine house-to-house inspections were carried out at 236 houses, viz.109 private and 127 Council houses.

During the year 240 houses were erected, viz. 28 by the Stevenage Urban District Council and 212 by the Stevenage Development Corporation.

### Overcrowding Act, 1936.

During the year no houses were found overcrowded.

Sanitary improvements were undertaken in existing dwelling houses viz:-

4 formal notices were served and the rest of the work was carried out by persuasive methods.

Verninous Premises.

5 houses were treated for vermin which were eradicated by spraying with a liquid vermin mixture named Zaldecide while inspection of furniture bedding, etc., was carried out by the Local Council.

### Inspection and Supervision of Food etc.

### MILK.

There are only 7 registered producers of milk in the district from which one is for the sale of Tuberculin Tested milk and from the other 6 the milk is collected and pasteurised before distribution.

In addition there are 3 registered retailers from whom milk is produced outside the Stevenage district, 1 being licensed for the sale of Tuberculin Tested and Pasteurised Milk, 2 for Tuberculin Tested, Tuberculin Tested (Pasteurised) and Pasteurised Milk.

64 samples of milk were taken for bacteriological examination which gave the following results:-

### ICE-CREAM.

At present there are no manufacturers of ice-cream in Stevenage.

69 samples of ice-cream were taken for bacteriological examination from retailers, restaurants, etc., and the following summary shows the provisional grading:-

### MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

There are 4 licensed private slaughterhouses (including one knackers' slaughterhouse) in the District which are kept up to a fair standard. Only occasional slaughterings licensed by the Local Food Officer are carried out, amounting in all to 6 pigs of which the carcases were inspected.

Foods surrendered as unfit for human consumption in shops, stores, etc. have to be certified before replacements can be made. During the year the following amount of food was condemned as unsound and unfit:-

Bakehouses, restaurant kitchens, preparation rooms, manufacturers of preserved food and tradesmens vans etc. are inspected with a view to keeping up a good standard of cleanliness.

#### FOOD POISONING.

There was no record, either formal or informal, of any such occurrence in your district during the year.

### PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Total notifications of infectious disease (after correction) were for the year: measles 25, whooping cough 18, acute pneumonia 2, scarlet fever 2, and puerperal pyrexia 1.

Measles and whooping cough were each moderately prevalent in the second quarter. The incidence of both these diseases, together with the 2 notified cases of scarlet fever, fell mainly on children of infant school age.

<u>Diptheria</u>. For yet another year no case of diptheria was notified in the district. Despite its continued absence, from the district the offer of protection to infants by immunisation continued to be accepted by a large majority of parents.
