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

**To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors
of the Borough of Tamworth**

Mr. Mayor, Lady and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my report on the state of the Public Health in the Borough of Tamworth for the year 1957.

The Birth Rate was 13.6 and the Death Rate 13.9.

The Infant Mortality Rate was 38.4 whilst there were no deaths attributable to childbirth.

An outbreak of Measles affecting 94 children occurred during the year but school closure did not become necessary.

Seven cases of Poliomyelitis were notified. In each instance prompt action was taken by the Public Health Department to limit the spread of infection in the Borough.

The pandemic of Asian Influenza which swept the country in the Autumn reached Tamworth in September and continued throughout that and the following month.

The disease affected many persons and was responsible for a great deal of absenteeism.

In the majority of cases the infection was mild but an appreciable number of severe cases occurred and the disease was responsible for three deaths.

Twelve houses were demolished during the year. These houses were contained in the following Orders.

Two houses—6 and 8, Lower Gungate, were dealt with under Section II of the Act—Demolition Orders made.

The following houses—7, Brewery Lane, and 5, Lichfield Street, were being dealt with under Section 16 of the Housing Act, 1957.

Towards the end of the year 68 dwellings, to be erected on the Lichfield Street site, were allocated for slum clearance purposes.

In connection with the above details of properties were submitted to the Health Committee with a view to representations being made at the appropriate time.

I would again thank members and officials of the Council for their continued help and co-operation and will now proceed with my Report.

MATERNITY ACCOMMODATION

No maternity accommodation is provided at the Hospitals in the Borough.

CLINIC AND TREATMENT CENTRES

These are under the County Council (except Tuberculosis and Orthopædic Clinics) since the 5th July, 1948.

Infant Welfare Clinics are held twice weekly.

A School Clinic is held weekly.

An Ante-Natal Clinic is held weekly.

Eye Clinics are held fortnightly.

Dental Clinics are held weekly for expectant and nursing mothers, toddlers and school children.

An Orthopædic Clinic is held weekly at the College Lane Schools.

A Chest Clinic is held at St. Editha's Hospital.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

An ambulance is stationed at Tamworth and is available during the daytime. The Lichfield ambulance is available at all other times.

WATER SUPPLY

Treatment Before Distribution.—The supply is chlorinated en route to the high level reservoir at Hopwas, and the bulk supply from the South Staffordshire Waterworks Company is chlorinated at source.

All dwelling houses in the Borough have a piped supply, either direct into the house or by means of standpipes.

Rainfall.—The Rainfall for the year 1957 was 22.94in.

With the assistance of the bulk supply from the South Staffordshire Waterworks Company, it was possible to give a continuous supply to all consumers throughout the year, at pressures ranging from 30lbs. to 80lbs.

During the year, 12 samples of water have been obtained by the Health Department from domestic supplies in various parts of the Borough and submitted for bacteriological and chemical examination.

The results were satisfactory. The water is not plumbo solvent. There is a fairly high degree of hardness.

OPEN-AIR SWIMMING BATHS

Routine samples were taken during the summer months when the baths were open. Bacteriological analyses were all satisfactory. "Break-point" chlorination was used.

These baths are a very valuable health asset to the Borough and are well patronised.

OF

THE SENIOR PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

To the Chairman and Members of the Health
Committee.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I herewith present my Annual Report for the year 1957.

Difficulty was experienced in filling the vacancy of Additional Public Health Inspector, a period of over one year elapsing, and it was not until November that Mr. G. E. Webb took up his duties. In consequence of which it was only possible for me to cope with the general day to day happenings of the Department. An increase in the number of animals slaughtered also entailed additional meat inspection duties.

This increase in the killings was due to a butcher carrying on a wholesale business and Sunday and late night slaughtering took place throughout the year making Sunday and evening inspections necessary.

Eight persons were returned as Outworkers under the Act, and these were engaged on wearing apparel. Visits were made and in each case the home conditions were considered suitable.

THE RENT ACT, 1957

This Act came into operation on the 6th July, 1957.

The provisions allow for the increase, within limits, of rents of houses remaining in control and machinery for dealing with repairs.

After a notice of increase in rent has been served, the tenant may serve a notice on his landlord specifying the defects which he thinks should be remedied. The landlord has six weeks in which to do the work or give an undertaking that the work will be done. If he does neither of these things the tenant may apply to the local authority for a certificate of disrepair in relation to the defects specified in his notice to the landlord.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS, 1955.

There are twenty-three butchers' shops, six bakehouses and thirty-four food preparing premises in the Borough.

Unfortunately it was not possible, due to staff difficulties, to continue with a systematic survey of all these premises but it is hoped in the near future to continue the survey.

Forty-six premises were visited and in twelve instances hot water supplies and sinks were necessary and in due course provided.

The Borough of Tamworth is included in a Specified Area and all dairymen who retail milk in the Borough must sell milk under special designation. The special designations authorised to be sold are "Pasteurised," "Sterilised" and "Tuberculin Tested."

One dairy is licensed to pasteurise milk and the principle adopted is by the "Holder" method. The other retailers obtain their supplies pasteurised and bottled from wholesalers.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

An employee of the Council is trained and engaged in part-time rodent control work.

One hundred and forty-five inspections were made and seventy-two premises were found to be infested. The facilities provided by the Council were made available to the owners or occupiers and the infestations were successfully treated by pre-baiting and poisoning.

Half-yearly treatment of the sewers and periodical treatment of the Council's refuse disposal tip has been carried out.

SANITARY SUPERVISION OF PLACES OF AMUSEMENT

The cinemas and other places of entertainment have been periodically inspected with regard to the sanitary accommodation.

The managements have been found anxious to maintain the conveniences in a satisfactory condition, and any defects found have at once been remedied.
