I am indebted to the Council's Water Engineer for the following report upon the Water Supply of the District for the past year.

(1) The water supply to the area was, on the whole, satisfactory throughout the year. Some difficulty was experienced with contamination of the Haldon Spring, which was finally diverted from the reservoir on the 20th June, 1950, and not used for the remainder of the year. Samples of this spring water were sent at intervals for analysis although it was not being used and this accounts for some of the unsuitable analyses given below.

(2) Some 59 samples of "raw" water were sent for analysis of which 27 were considered unsuitable. 84 samples were sent from the reservoirs and supply mains of which 36 were unsuitable. This contamination is a recurring Summer problem but one which is quickly overcome by adjustment of the chlorination gates.

(3) There is no evidence that the water has any plumbo-solvent action.

(4) With regard to the contamination of the Haldon Spring reported above, it is not considered an economical provision to install treatment apparatus in view of the limited quantity of water available and it is proposed, therefore, that the stream should remain permanently diverted from the reservoir.

(5) The population supplied from the public water mains on the 31st December, 1950, direct to houses was estimated to be 10,600 and by standpipes, 30. The total number of dwellings at the same date was 3,275.

Some difficulty was experienced with contamination of the Haldon Spring, which was finally diverted from the reservoir on the 20th June, 1980, and not used for the remainder of the year. Samples of this spring water were sent to laboratories for analysis although it was not being used and this accounts for some of the unsatisfactory analyses given below.

Some 69 samples of "raw" water were sent for analysis of which 27 were considered unsatisfactory. 84 samples were sent from the reservoir and supply mains of which 32 were unsatisfactory. The contamination is a recurring summer problem but one which is quickly overcome by adjustment of the chlorination rates.

(2) There is no evidence that the water has any plumbo-solvent action.

(3) With regard to the contamination of the Haldon Spring reported above, it is not considered an economical provision to install treatment apparatus in view of the limited quantity of water available and it is proposed, therefore, that the stream should be permanently diverted from the reservoir.

(4) The population supplied from the public water mains on the 31st December, 1980, direct to houses was estimated to be 10,000 and by standpipes, 50. The total number of dwellings at the same date was 2,275.

The list of applicants for the tenancies of Council premises shows no signs of decreasing.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

This is under the control of the Public Health Department. Collection of refuse (once weekly from private houses and twice weekly from hotels and boarding houses) is executed by two "Karrier Bentam" Refuse vehicles. Tipping, by controlled methods, is at the Council's Tip at Broadmeadow, which it is proposed eventually to convert to an extensive levelled area, capable of accommodating football grounds, cricket pitches, tennis courts, etc: which are badly needed in the District.

WASTE PAPER SALVAGE.

After the unforeseen cessation of demand from the Mills for Salvaged Paper in the middle of 1949, the Council's Recovery Scheme was reluctantly closed down but in June, 1950, the demand revived and prices were at such a level as to render collection and disposal economical. The Council, on request, approved the recommencement of operations and from July to December, 1,204 $\frac{3}{4}$ cwt of Paper was reclaimed and sold for £415, which gave a profit of approximately £100.

As far as possible with the premises available, transfers are arranged between tenants so that the size of the houses concerned is in proportion to the size of the family. The list of applicants for the premises of Council premises shows no signs of decreasing.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

This is under the control of the Public Health Department. Collection of refuse (once weekly from private houses and twice weekly from hotels and boarding houses) is executed by two "Kartier Bontem" Refuse vehicles. Tipping, by controlled methods, is at the Council's tip at Broadmeadow, which it is proposed eventually to convert to an extensive levelled area, capable of accommodating football grounds, cricket pitches, tennis courts, etc. which are badly needed in the District.

WASTE PAPER SALVAGE

After the unbroken cessation of demand from the Mills for Wilted Paper in the middle of 1949, the Council's Recovery Scheme was reluctantly closed down but in June, 1950, the demand revived and prices rose to such a level as to render collection not financially economical. The Council, on request, approved the resumption of operations and from July to December, 1,200 tons of paper was reclaimed and sold for £115, which gave a profit of approximately £100.
