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
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
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# Tetbury IRural District.

# ANNUAL REPORT of the Medical Officer of Health for 1938.

#### DR. H. F. W. ADAMS.

Herewith my 18th Annual Report for the District. The general health of the district has been good and there were no epidemics, and only three cases of Tuberculosis were notified throughout the year.

Steady advance was made in Housing and all Sanitary matters.

### CAUSES OF DEATH IN 1938.

As will be seen from the preceding figures and statistics no abnormal or excessive death rate occurred in 1938.

CANCER: ten; an increase but in view of the general prevalence of the disease, not serious (5 in 1937, 14 in 1936).

INFLUENZA: one death (male) was recorded.

DISEASES OF THE CIRCULATORY SYSTEM number 37, out of a total of 72—the usual percentage.

- DEATH RATE:—12.1 is not at all a bad figure although it is above that for 1937, 11.1, and England and Wales, 11.6.
- BIRTH RATE:---15.1 is a good figure, being the same as that for England and Wales in 1938.

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE DISTRICT.

#### COTTAGE HOSPITAL.

This extended hospital, with up-to-date accommodation, continues to do good work : there is ampleaccommodation for the district.

Fever cases are accommodated at the Cirencester Isolation Hospital.

Accommodation for Smallpox cases is provided at Elmstone, near Hardwicke, on the Cheltenham-Tewkesbury road.

There is no hospital accommodation for Tuberculosis, or for children. Maternity cases are dealt with at the converted P.L. Institution in Tetbury, which is doing extremely valuable work.

The Tuberculosis cases are accommodated in Standish Sanatorium.

The nursing in the district is carried out by Nurses of the District Nursing Association, supervised by a whole-time County Nurse.

Pathological and Bacteriological Examinations are carried out in the laboratories of Gloucester General Hospital.

Outfits for taking specimens can be supplied to practitioners by the Medical Officer of Health.

The Public Health Staff for the district consists of one Medical Officer of Health (full-time) and one Sanitary Inspector (full-time).

### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF

#### THE AREA.

#### WATER SUPPLY.

TETBURY.—The drought which is clearly indicated in details of rainfall given in this report effected the boreholes considerably, the pumping levels being lower than at any time since the installation of the present plant and it was not until the latter part of the year that they completely recovered. I would also mention that if it had not been for an extra 30 ft. of suction pipe which was added during the overhaul of the No. I pump the previous year, there would have been a serious shortage of water for a considerable period. A great deal of work has been done during the year in connection with the testing of the water mains and service pipes for leakages. All the testing of the water mains and service pipes has been done at night and three defective mains and four service connections have been repaired, with the result that the Market Place and Northfield are no longer without water during the week although the pressure is not always sufficient. In this direction the Parochial Committee are considering the erection of a water tower at the Tetbury Waterworks and Messrs. Parker Pearson & Ross Hooper, Civil Engineers of Chippenham, Wilts., have been appointed as the Council's Consulting Engineers with regard to the matter. It is hoped that the work will be commenced early in the year.

The repairs of mains and services has had a very noticeable effect upon the daily comsumption, which is now approximately 34,000 gallons as against 39,000 gallons during the previous year. The number of new connections to the Council's water mains during the year was 52.

Two samples of water were taken from the waterworks during the year and both were found to be satisfactory. The Council has agreed to take four samples per year in the future under the new scheme arranged by the County Council, whereby samples may be analysed by the County Analyst at a considerably reduced cost.

1637 inspections were made during the year in connection with water supplies and waterworks.

DIDMARTON, LONG NEWNTON & SHIPTON MOYNE.— These Parishes are supplied by the West Gloucestershire Water Co., and the supply has been satisfactory during the year.

CHERINGTON.—No shortage has occurred during the year.

ASHLEY.—Culkerton still enjoys an adequate supply of water from the Rodmarton Estate and there has been no shortage.

AVENING.—The village has a standpost supply which has remained satisfactory during the year. The Stroud Water Co. now supply a large house and 2 cottages in this parish.

WESTONBIRT with LASBOROUGH.—Most of the parish is supplied by the Westonbirt School and has been satisfactory during the year.

BOXWELL with LEIGHTERTON.—This parish is still without an adequate supply of water, although it is gratifying to note that Mr. F. O. J. Huntley of Boxwell Court has sunk a borehole and is supplying parts of Boxwell with water.

RAINFALL AT SHIPTON MOYNE WATERWORKS. Altitude approximately 320 feet above sea level.

I am indebted to Mr. J. Reade of Tetbury and Mr. H. S. Shinner, Engineer and Secretary to the West Gloucestershire Water Company, who supplied the information regarding rainfalls in this district.

#### SEWAGE AND DRAINAGE.

#### TETBURY MAIN SEWER OUTFALL.

Seven of the ten irrigation beds have been reconditioned during the year and the four sludge beds have been relaid. An extra sludge bed has been constructed and is working satisfactorily. The remaining irrigation beds should be reconstructed in the near future and the need for a proper store at the Sewage Works is becoming more urgent.

Six tons of Alumino Ferric were used at these works during the year.

Two samples of sewage effluent were taken and found to be very satisfactory. The Council have decided to take two samples per year in future under the County Scheme.

These works are under frequent supervision and are kept in good condition.

#### TETBURY DRAINAGE.

The Tetbury Drainage System is working satisfactorily and no new sewer has been laid during the year, but 51 new connections have been made.

#### RIVERS AND STREAMS.

The nuisance found to exist at Avening arising from the discharge of house drains into the brook has been abated except for one drain which is connected with the urinals of the Church of England School, and I understand that this matter is receiving attention.

No other nuisances have arisen during the year in connection with rivers and streams.

#### PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Scavenging in the parish of Tetbury has been carried out as in previous years with the exception of the number of collections per week. In renewing the scavenging contract the Committee agreed to collect from the whole of the town twice weekly whereas previously parts of the town were only collected once. This arrangement has increased the cost of scavenging in the parish but is a great improvement on the old system. The refuse tip is under constant supervision and as far as possible is kept tidy and free from vermin.

Avening Parish Council is responsible for refuse collection in that parish and a new tip has had to be found. This is situated well away from the village and appears satisfactory.

During the year 45 inspections of refuse tips and collections have been made.

All the 49 Council Houses erected for slum clearances, overcrowding and aged persons were completed for occupation early in the year, and much work was entailed in getting the Contractor to wind up the small details which were not completed during the year. All the tenants are now settled down in their new homes and appear to be very happy and contented.

Six of the twelve 1919 Council Houses in Tetbury have been provided with "Selfix" Interoven grates in place of the original Yorkshire type grates, and the Council have agreed to replace the remaining six in the new year.

Four of the twelve Council Houses in the parish of Avening have been provided with Concrete footpaths, which is a great improvement.

Some 351 inspections for Council House repairs and maintenance have been made during the year.

Earlier in the year the Council agreed to employ a rat catcher under the County Scheme to destroy the vermin which infested the Tetbury Refuse Tip and four times during the year the tip was baited, with excellent results. I may add that during the year the County have reorganised the scheme, inasmuch as the rat catchers have now become the employees of the County Council, and that any complaints whatsoever regarding vermin from householders will be visited by the appropriate officers and the necessary advice given.

# PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OVER

### INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The total number of infectious diseases notified during 1938 was 19. Of these—

7 were Pneumonias: one was admitted to hospital; there were 3 deaths (1 M. and 2 F.).

6 Scarlet Fevers occurred: 3 females, aged 12, 17 and 21, and 3 males, aged  $1\frac{1}{2}$ , 13 and 22. All were admitted to hospital. There were no deaths.

Five cases of Diphtheria occurred : two very severe, requiring tracheotomy : one, a female aged 3, died. All were treated in hospital.

The age incidences were-

M. Nil. F. 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, 3, 5, 38 and 45.

There was also one case of Puerperal Pyrexia treated in hospital, which also developed pneumonia.

No cases of Opthalmia Neonatorum occurred in 1938.

#### TUBERCULOSIS.

Three new cases of Tuberculosis were notified in 1938: 3 females, aged 23, 25 and 20, all pulmonary.

These were all admitted to a Sanatorium.

One female pulmonary death occurred.
