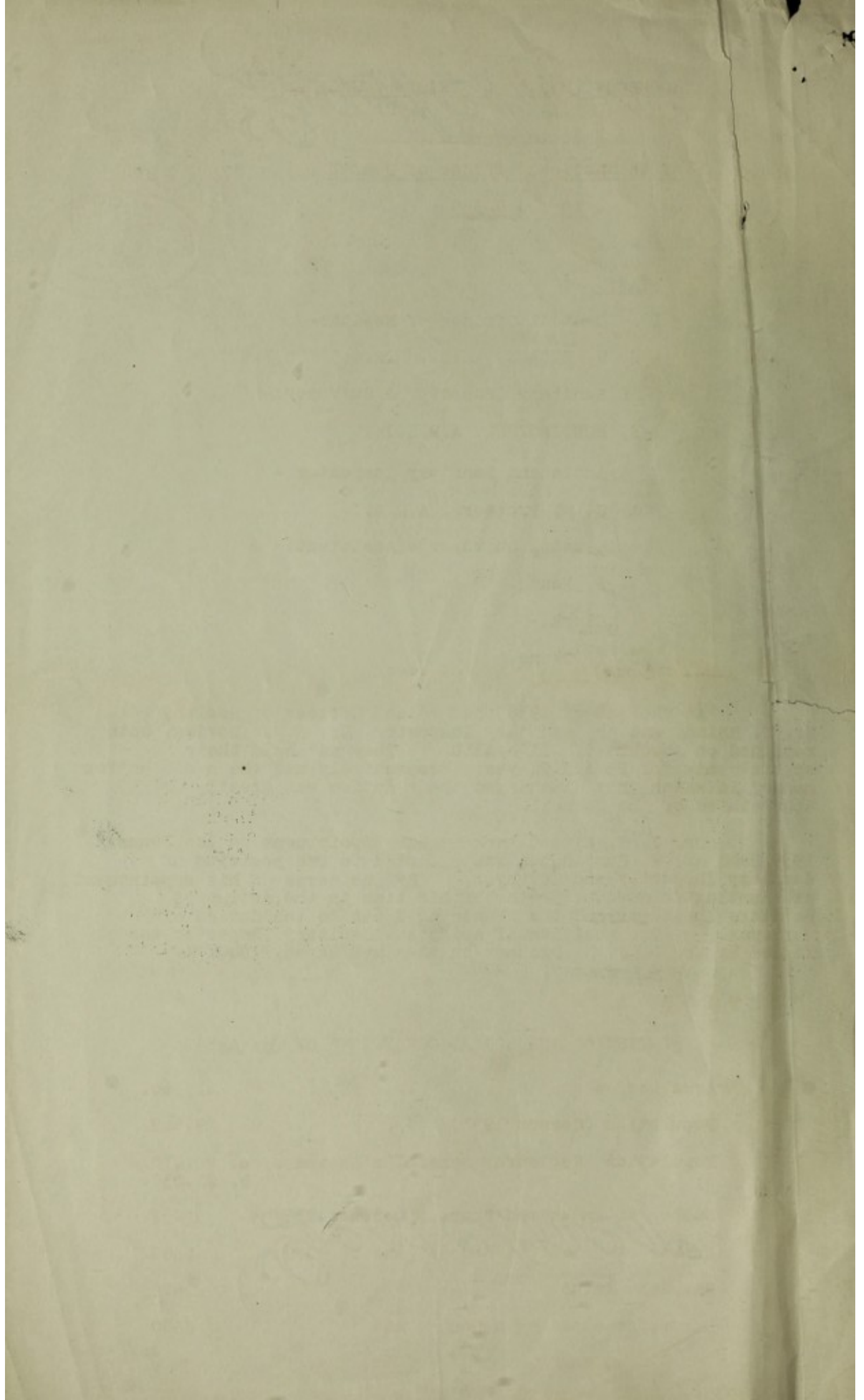

At the end of 1938 the Medical Officer of Health, Dr. T. Rhind, and the Sanitary Inspector, Mr. F. W. Davies, both resigned on account of ill health. They had held their appointments for 25 and 24 years respectively and the conscientious manner in which they discharged their duties was greatly appreciated by the Council.

Dr. J. H. Kitson took up his appointment on 1st January 1939, and Mr. R. Huntington was promoted to the position of Sanitary Inspector and Surveyor. By the terms of his appointment Mr. Huntington devotes 5/6ths of his time to the duties of Sanitary Inspector and the remaining 1/6th to the duties of Surveyor. The position of Assistant Sanitary Inspector was filled by Mr. L. J. M. Prosser on the 14th March, 1940.

(e) The water supply is unsatisfactory in quantity in the Northern part of the district (Berkeley, Hinton, Hamfallow, Alkington, Charfield and Stone), and at Aust, Elberton, and Littleton in the South.

Experimental Results

(1) First series of experiments were carried out with a view to determining the effect of the amount of the electrolyte solution on the rate of reaction.

- (a) 10% solution
- (b) 20% solution

The results of these experiments are shown in the following table. It will be seen that the rate of reaction increases with the amount of electrolyte solution used.

Discussion of Results
