MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

Council Offices, THORNTON CLEVELEYS.

To the Chairman and Members of the Thornton Cleveleys Urban District Council.

Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the report of the Medical

Officer of Health for the year 1959.

Looking first at the Vital Statistics for the year, the Adjusted Birth Rate at 15.9 per 1,000 of the population, is virtually unchanged from the figure 16.0 in 1958. The Adjusted Death Rate is slightly raised at 15.8 per 1,000 of the population compared with 13.4 last year. The Infant Mortality Rate at 19.5 per 1,000 live births, is down, compared with the figure 22.4 for 1958. The actual number of deaths under one year old was five. Three of these died within the first month of life. No mothers lost their lives in childbirth. It is noted that the Adjusted Birth and Death Rates almost exactly balance one another.

Of the total number of deaths which occurred (314), 53 were due to malignant growths and 175 due to disease of the heart and blood vessels - that is, 228 deaths were due to causes mainly associated with advanced years. In fact, 233 of the deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age and a further 62 in persons between 45 and 65. The total of deaths under 45 years was 19. Twelve deaths were due to accidents - four being motor accidents. How many of these could have been prevented? In addition, four people took their own lives.

1959 was a "Measles year". 118 cases occurred out of a
total of 181 cases of infectious disease notified during the
year. 36 cases of Scarlet Fever occurred, but this is not
now regarded as it was half a century ago. The 15 cases of
Dysentery were scattered throughout the year and not a
concentrated outbreak. The one case of Enteric Fever was
imported following a religious pilgrimage to Spain and Portugal.

It is somewhat disconcerting to see that six new cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified during the year as against two in 1958. These cases and their contacts are carefully followed up through the Chest Clinic of the Regional Hospital Board and the Tuberculosis Health Visitor on the County Divisional Staff. All these six cases were males - three under 45 years of age and three over that age.

My thanks are due to Mr. Barnes and the staff of the Health Department for unfailing co-operation, and to yourself, Madam

Chairman and the Members of the Health Committee.

PHYSICAL FEATURES AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

By the Lancashire (Central and Western Areas) Review Order, 1934, a part of the Township of Carleton, containing 354 acres, was added to the Urban District on the 1st April, 1934. The district is bounded on the West by the Irish Sea; on the East by the River Wyre; on the North by the Borough of Fleetwood and on the South by the County Borough of Blackpool.

GEOLOGY.

The general sub-soil of the district is clay, which is overlaid with a thick layer of alluvial deposit(blue silt), varying in thickness from four to eight feet. On top of this is a thin layer (about four inches) of peaty matter. This was found in considerable thickness in Butts Road(North Ward) and also in Fleetwood Road (East Ward). On top of this again is a layer of sandy soil or a mixture of soil and clay, varying in thickness from two and a half feet to four feet. The surface covering is about six inches in thickness. From above downwards, we get:

(1) surface covering, (2) mixture of soil and clay or sandy soil, (3) peat, (4) blue silt, (5) boulder clay.

CLIMATE.

The prevailing wind is a westerly sea breeze and together with the usually mild winters, produces a temperate and very bracing climate.

AREA AND DETAILS OF POPULATION.

As previously mentioned, the area of Thornton Cleveleys was increased by the inclusion of a part of the Parish of Carleton, on the 1st April, 1934, the total area now being given as 3,355 acres.

The average number of persons per acre is 5.2.

WARD BOUNDARIES.

The Ward Boundaries were altered during 1958 and came into operation in May, 1959.

The new Wards are as follows: -

NORTH WARD - This is the industrial area of the district and has within its boundaries the Works of the Imperial Chemical Industries, Ltd. It is bounded on the North by the Borough of Fleetwood; on the West by the Eastern boundaries of South and West wards, and on the East by the River Wyre. Its Southern boundary is the Northern boundary of East Ward. The number of houses in North Ward is 1.633.

SOUTH WARD - The Western boundary is the sea front and the Eastern boundary is the Western boundaries of North and East Wards. The Southern boundary is the Borough of Blackpool. It is flat in character and contains a large residential area and also many hotels and boarding houses.

The number of houses in South Ward is 1,532.

EAST WARD - This is the agricultural area of the district and also includes part of the added area. Its boundaries adjoin the North and South Wards; the River Wyre and the Urban District of Poulton-le-Fylde.

The number of houses in East Ward is 1,959.

WEST WARD - This Ward is bounded on the North by the Borough of Fleetwood; on the West by the Sea front; on the East by the Western boundary of North Ward and on the South by the Northern boundary of South Ward. This Ward also is residential but contains many boarding houses and private hotels.

The number of houses in West Ward is 1,751.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS, INDUSTRIES, ETC.

During the last few years, the Cleveleys portion of the district has rapidly developed as a seaside holiday resort and with the additional amenities now provided, together with the activities of private builders, the district as a whole has greatly benefited.

The largest employers of labour within the district are the Imperial Chemical Industries, Ltd. who have large chemical and plastic Works on the Northern boundary. There is still a large portion of the district devoted to agriculture. Many people are employed at the Offices of the Ministry of Health, Pensions and National Insurance, which are situated in our area.

During the year 256 births were recorded by the Registrar-General, comprising 126 males and 130 females. Birth Rate for district(adjusted): 15.9 per 1,000 as against 16.0 for 1958.



TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE THORNTON CLEVELEYS URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Sanitary and Cleansing Department of the Council for the year 1959.

During the year the work has continued satisfactorily, many times under pressure as a result of the expanding work of the department. Much time and energy has been expended to improve the general standards in the environmental health field.

Much attention has again been given to the inspection and supervision of food premises and many improvements have been carried out. Although all the work required had not been completed at the end of the year, some progress has been made. Some adverse reports were received on samples of milk and ice cream taken by us; these were followed up and on subsequent sampling they were satisfactory.

Some work was done under the provisions of the Housing Act in accordance with the Council's programme and all individual houses requiring formal action have now been reported upon. At the end of the year some official representations in respect of Orders were being made.

The Public Cleansing service has again maintained a high standard of efficiency and a weekly collection was maintained. The district is growing rapidly and all new premises built in this area have "long carries" and extra labour with resultant increase in costs, will have to be provided. All the refuse collected was disposed of on the River Foreshore reclamation scheme and it is hoped that before long, some development can take place there.

I wish to record my sincere thanks to the members of the Council and the Health Committee for their ever-ready help and co-operation in all matters affecting the sanitary conditions of our district.

I especially thank the members of my staff for their helpful and loyal co-operation during the year.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLY.

The district is supplied by the Fylde Water Board, the water being of good quality, pleasantly soft and of a peaty nature. Only one outlying house depends on well water.

One sample of water was obtained from the mains supply and was submitted for bacteriological examination, and one sample was obtained for chemical analysis. Both samples were satisfactory. Eleven samples were also taken by the Fylde Water Board from a tap in the Council's Depot, for bacteriological examination and these also proved satisfactory.

The water supply has been satisfactory in quality and quantity throughout the year.

The only house in the district dependent upon well water is remote from any mains supply and it would be impossible, except at exorbitant cost, to have it connected to the mains supply.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

Owing to the flat nature of the district, a system of electrical pumps and ejectors worked by compressed air, is in operation. The sewage is discharged near dead low water mark into the sea. No extensive additions were made to the sewers during the year, but additions were made to drain new housing estates.

Conversions during the year.

There were three conversions during the year, from pail closets to fresh water closets. Two were in respect of Tennis Club premises and one in respect of a farm cottage improved by Improvement Grant. It will not be possible for further conversions to take place until the sewers are extended. The 21 houses without modern sanitary accommodation are farms or outlying cottages and to which no sewers are available. There is still one privy midden which has not yet been converted to a pail closet.

DRAINAGE.

There are some premises in the district which are not connected to the Council's sewers, but which have septic tanks and filters, some of which discharge to adjacent watercourses. Some of these are not satisfactory but are mostly in districts where no sewers are available.

During the year a new sewer and surface water drains were laid in the Briar Road area. As a result of this, the drainage systems in respect of 7 premises were re-laid and connected to the Council's sewer. The unsatisfactory septic tanks were done away with and a great sanitary improvement has been effected in our district.

The department employs a man part-time on drainage work, the cost of clearing and cleansing the blocked drains being borne by the owner or occupier. This service to the public is much appreciated and also helps in the efficient working of the department. Preparation and service of notices is thus avoided, unless the blockage is due to structural defect of the drains.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The work of the Public Cleansing section of the department has proceeded in a satisfactory manner. The collection of household refuse and salvage was carried out by a "W" type S.D. 16 cu.yd. side-loading freighter and two fore and aft tippers - "W" type - all with cabs to accommodate driver and loaders. A special weekly collection of waste-paper salvage from shops and business premises was carried out by one 11 cu.yd. S.D.freighter.

Throughout the year a weekly collection of refuse and salvage from all premises in the district, was maintained. This is essential if we are to maintain our salvage collection. It was found necessary to implement the number of employees engaged on this work, from time to time, to maintain this standard.

DISPOSAL OF REFUSE.

The Council own a plot of land approximately 9 acres in extent, for the purpose of refuse disposal and at the end of the year there was still a certain amount available for tipping. The whole amount of refuse collected during the year was disposed of on the "reclamation scheme" site at the River Wyre Foreshore. The embankment which had previously been covered with turf successfully withstood the action of the tides and maintenance costs were very low.

COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF SALVAGE.

The Council continued with the collection of wastepaper and other salvage during the year, although there
was little call for iron, metals and tins. The price for
wastepaper during most of the year was £6.10.0. per ton,
but in November, 1959, the price increased by 10/- a ton.
The tonnage of paper and other salvage collected was
approximately 30 tons less than in 1958. During the 19
years ending 31st December, 1959, 5,172 tons of salvage
have been disposed of for a sum of £31,820, a yearly
average over the period of 272 tons collected and income
of £1,675.

OFFICES.

The offices in the area are inspected annually and comply with the requirements of the Public Health Act, 1936.

There is no public swimming bath in the area but there is one privately-owned pool which is open to the public.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

There are 10 in number and are confined exclusively to fish friers. Regular inspections are made and conditions generally are found to be satisfactory.

No premises in the area are licensed for the manufacture of rag flock or other filling materials. There are two premises on the register where filling materials are used. Inspections were carried out, the provisions of the Act being complied with.

A modern mortuary possessing equipment in accordance with present day practice, has been in use throughout the year. It was used on 52 occasions and 41 post-mortems were conducted by the Police Surgeon. During the year an adjacent Borough Council had the joint temporary use of our mortuary. This arrangement is still in operation and is proving satisfactory.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS & CAMPING SITES.

The control of moveable dwellings and camping sites in this area is under the Thornton Cleveleys Improvement Act, 1936, and not the Public Health Act, 1936. We have no licensed sites but the three in use are approved by the Council and comply with their requirements. They are permitted to be used for the following numbers of caravans.
