TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE THORNTON CLEVELEYS URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1970.

This year saw the retirement in March of Mr. A.E. Barnes, from his position as Chief Public Health Inspector to the Council, after thirty years of devoted service. Mr. K.E. Emery, formerly Deputy Chief Public Health Inspector with the Council, was appointed to succeed Mr. Barnes.

The vital statistics for the area remained generally satisfactory during the year. The incidence of notifiable infectious diseases remained generally low with the exception of Measles. In the case of this disease there were 119 notifications during the year. An effective measles vaccine is now available for infants and young children and if more parents were to have their children vaccinated against this disease, it would result in a considerable reduction in the number of cases that occur.

My thanks are again due to my colleagues in the Health Department for their loyalty and assistance.

To you, Mr. Chairman and members of the Health Committee, my appreciation of the encouragement and support afforded to me.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE THORNTON CLEVELEYS URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my first Annual Report on the Public Health and Cleansing Department, for the year 1970.

In doing so, I would first like to pay tribute to my predecessor, Mr.A.E.Barnes, who was the Chief Public Health Inspector to this authority for 30 years and who has been responsible for achieving a high standard in all public health matters concerning the welfare of the district.

During the year, many requests were received under the Housing Act, 1969, for Qualification Certificates which resulted in considerable work by the department. Most of the requests were made by owners of properties which already had standard amenities.

Surveys were being made to hotels, guest houses and some larger premises let as holiday flats, with regard to means of escape in case of fire and where necessary, work has been requested. Attention has also been given to all premises in which food is handled and the operation of the Food Hygiene Regulations must always be an important part of the department's work.

During the year an Incentive Bonus Scheme, based on Work Study principles, was introduced for the refuse collectors and this has allowed a decrease in the labour establishment. A further 2,100 premises were converted to the refuse sack system and at the end of the year 6,300 premises were on the scheme. The five refuse disposal points provided under the Civic Amenities Act,1967, have occasioned the department some concern due to their being mis-used and consideration will have to be given for some improvements to be made to these sites.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Chairman and members of the Health Committee and also Dr.Morris, the Medical Officer of Health, for their help and co-operation during the year. On the 18th May,1970, Mr.D.Leslie was appointed Deputy Chief Public Health Inspector and I would also like to thank him and all the members of the staff for their co-operation in this my first year as Chief Public Health Inspector.

The cleansing work is carried out by two 35 cu.yd. Pakamatic vehicles and one new diesel bulk loader which came into operation on the 1st June,1970. The TW type diesel fore and aft tipper which can be used for emptying bulk containers came in very useful as a spare vehicle. An old TW.type diesel fore and aft tipper (S.D.3) used for the collection of wastepaper, was scrapped during the year and was replaced by a new BLMC diesel vehicle.

During the year, further premises were converted to the refuse sack system and at the end of the year 6,300 premises were on the scheme. Further extensions will take place during 1971, when the whole of the district will then be on this system.

Under the Civic Amenities Act, 1967, 5 refuse disposal points were in operation throughout the district. A refuse disposal point consists of one or more bulk containers surrounded by fencing and allowing adequate space for the depositing of bulky articles which would not go into the bulk containers. It has been found necessary for these compounds to be cleared during the weekend period throughout the summer months. In addition, bulk containers are provided by the owners of many of the larger hotel and shop premises.

ATMOSPHERIC PULLUTION.



The area is dominated by a large Chemical Works to the North and East, whilst to the South is light industry and open fields to the West.






