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

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR.

TO THE CHATEMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE THORNTON CLEVELEYS URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentleman,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the Public Health and Cleansing Department, for the year 1971.

During the year routine visits to food premises and offices and shops were maintained, in spite of not having a District Inspector for a period of five months. Inspections of houses in multi-occupation and the preparation of schedules for means of escape in case of fire, continued in consultation with the Lancashire County Council Fire Brigade.

The refuse sack system was extended during the year to include all the properties in the area. The system is working well and appears to be appreciated by the members of the public.

It was found necessary to remove the five refuse disposal points established under the Civic Amenities Act,1957, as the Health Committee considered that due to their mis-use and action by vandals, they were creating a nuisance. However, a refuse disposal point was established at the refuse tip in the Fleetwood area, for the joint use by both authorities.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Chairman of the Health Committee, Councillor J.D.Grime, J.P., and all members of the Health Committee, also Dr.J.E.Morris, the Medical Officer of Health, for their help and assistance during the year.

I would like to thank Mr.D.Leslie, the Deputy Chief Public Health Inspector, and all members of the staff, for the help and co-operation they have given me during the year.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLY.

The district is supplied by the Fylde Water Board, the water being of good quality, pleasantly soft and of a peaty nature. Only one outlying house depends on well water, the total number of houses being supplied by the Fylde Water Board is 10,647.

Four samples of water were taken by this department from the mains supply, one being submitted for chemical analysis and three for bacteriological examination. All the samples were satisfactory.

Owing to the flat nature of the district, a system of electrical pumps and ejectors worked by compressed air, is in operation. The sewage is discharged near dead low water mark into the sea. No extensive additions were made to the sewers during the year but a new Pumping Station was opened at the River Wyre end of the district, to assist land drainage of the area during storm conditions and high tides.

Improvements have now been completed at the conveniences at the Arena, Jubilee Gardens and Bathing Station.

In common with other authorities, we suffered a great deal of damage and this vandalism causes extra work and also increases greatly the cost of maintenance.

The cleansing work is carried out by two 35 cu.yd. Pakamatic vehicles and one Karrier/Ramillies diesel bulk loader. During the year an order was placed for a Dennis Bulkmaster, for delivery early in 1972. Also during the year the TBZ. type diesel Pakamatic was converted to bulk-loading and the "TW" type (S.D.4) will be sold when the new vehicle is delivered. Wastepaper was collected by the BIMC vehicle.

During the year the remainder of the premises in the area was converted to the refuse sack system and approximately 11,265 premises are now on this system.

Due to their mis-use and vandalism, it was decided to close down the five refuse disposal points, established under the Civic Amenities Act,1967. The cost of clearing these became very prohibitive and it was unfortunate that they were abused, mainly by contractors dumping their rubbish there. Members of the public, however, appreciated them and on their closure a compound was established at the Fleetwood refuse tip which is open permanently to the public.

Many of the larger hotels, shop premises, factories and caravan sites, are using bulk containers which make for better storage and collection of refuse. At a number of these premises, a twice weekly collection is made during the summer months, the cost of the second collection being borne by the occupier of the premises. It is estimated that there are 105 bulk containers in use in the district.

Refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping methods and since June, 1967, tipping facilities have been shared with a neighbouring authority, along with the costs involved. This is a very helpful arrangement and will provide us with tipping space for many years to come.

The above figures show the present minimum labour requirements, but it is necessary from time to time to increase this labour force for holidar periods and sickness. An increased Bonus Scheme, based on Work tudy principles, came into operation in February, 1970. This allowed for some decrease in the labour establishment.

REMOVAL OF ADDITIONAL REFUSE.

During the financial year ended 31st March,1972, a total of 322 requests for the removal of bulky articles, garden refuse, etc. were received. Of this total, 742 were cleared. The discrepancy allows for those not yet collected (about 40) and those which were not necessary, cancellations, etc. This is an average of 16.16 per week. This number varied from as low as 5 during some winter weeks to as many as 35 during spring and summer.

A total amount of £471.50 was received for these collections, an average of 64p. per collection.








