MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT

Council Offices, THORNTON CLEVELEYS.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE THORNTON CLEVELEYS URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the health of the Urban District of Thornton Cleveleys for the year 1972.

The health of the district remained generally satisfactory during the year, with the exception of a high incidence of measles amongst young children and an increase in the number of deaths from lung cancer. In all, a total of 345 cases of measles were notified and it seems quite incredible to me that so much misery and suffering should still be permitted to occur amongst these young people, when a perfectly reliable and effective vaccine against this illness is now freely available at all Child Health Clinics and from General Practitioners. I therefore appeal to all parents of young children who have not already had measles, to have them vaccinated without further delay.

A total of 24 deaths occurred from lung cancer, an increase over the deaths from this cause for the previous year. There is unlikely to be any substantial reduction in the death rate from this disease, until the public take more seriously the repeated warnings from the Department of Health and Social Security, on the dangers of heavy cigarette smoking.

My thanks are again due to my colleagues in the Health Department, for their loyalty and assistance. I also wish to express my appreciation to the Chairman and members of the Health Committee, for the encouragement and support afforded to me.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE THORNTON CLEVELE'S ORBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the Public Health and Cleansing Department for the year 1972.

Priority has again been given to routine visits to food premises, to offices and shops and to houses in multiple occupation in both holiday and permanent use. A successful prosecution was taken under the Food Hygiene (General) Regulations, 1960, against the proprietor of a small private hotel.

During the year the procedures for dealing with Improvement Grant applications, were stream-lined and my department was given added responsibility in the processing of standard and improvement grants. More applications have been received during this year which have involved the department in considerable work and it is anticipated that the number of applications will increase further in the coming year.

A new refuse collection vehicle, of the intermittent loading type, was put in use during the year and it is my opinion that this type of vehicle has many advantages over those of the continuous loading variety and should prove much cheaper to maintain over the years.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Chairman of the Health Committee, Councillor J.D.Grime, J.P., and all members of the Committee, also Dr.J.E.Morris, Medical Officer of Health, for their help and assistance during the year.

I also wish to thank my deputy, Mr.D.Leslie, and all members of my staff, for the help and co-operation they have given.

WATER SUPPLY.

The district is supplied by the Fylde Water Board, the water being of good quality, pleasantly soft and of a peaty nature. Only one outlying house depends on well water; the total number of houses being supplied by the Fylde Water Board is 10,729.

Three samples of water were taken by this department from the mains supply, one being submitted for chemical analysis and two for bacteriological examination. All the samples were satisfactory.

The district is divided into three refuse collection rounds. Two rounds concentrate on the removal of refuse from domestic premises; the third on the removal of refuse from commercial premises. There are 119 bulk containers in the area and some of these are emptied more than once a week.

The department also operates a bulk container hire service, by which occupiers of business premises can increase their refuse storage capacity to meet seasonal demands.

Refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping methods at a tipping site in Fleetwood and since 1967, facilities have been shared with this authority. This is a very helpful arrangement and will provide us with tipping space for many years to come.

The department continues to operate a service for the removal of bulky articles, garden refuse, etc. 897 additional collections were made and a sum of £619.00 was received during the financial year 1972/73.
