The Census 1921 there was a decrease of population shown in all civil parishes except Wadhurst which remains the same and Salehurst.

Persons per acre were 0.3.

The Death rate of infants under one year of age per 1000 Births was 36. Deaths under one year 7, Legitimate 6, Illegitimate 1. Causes of death Premature Birth 2, Bronchitis 2, Diarrhoea 2, other diseases 1.

The Vital Statistics for the District are satisfactory.

The Birth Rate was 11. very low, and seems to be falling, unfortunately 9 of these were illegitimate.

The Nett Death rate was II.

The death rate from Tuberculosis was somewhat higher, 21 cases of Tuberculosis were notified, these are exclusive of cases entering Darvell Bank and not belonging to district.

The chief causes of death during the past year were—Cancer 12, Heart Disease 27, Tuberculosis 11, Suicide 3, Accidents 9, Whooping Cough 1, Diphtheria 1.

Infectious Fever Hospital.

During the past year few cases of infectious illness have been notified and the work at the Isolation Hospital has not been heavy. The Hospital has been maintained in good condition. The Staff have, as in previous years, carried out their duties satisfactorily.

The hospital is a great asset for preventing the spread of infectious disease.

Diphtheria Antitoxin supplied. The Sanitary Inspector keeps a stock and supplies on demand to Medical Practitioners, free.

Water Supply.

Wadhurst Supply from Crowborough Water Coy.

Water supply insufficient at areas known as Osmers Hill and Woods Green. Council have fixed a stand pipe from a private service as a temporary measure; Crowborough Water Company will not extend the mains as the rateable value is insufficient. The Council have had this matter in hand for two years.

Frant Village supplied from Public Wells and Private Wells. Conditions unaltered. (Supply needed).

Burwash Ticehurst Supplied by the Heathfield & District Water Coy. Conditions unaltered.

Salehurst Etchingham Flimwell badly needs a water supply, and the Council is negotiating with the Heathfield and District Water Company.

The total number of houses in the various parishes supplied from the mains of the Water Companies, at the end of the year, is approximately—Frant 29, Wadhurst 544, Ticehurst 122, Etchingham 24, Burwash 119, Salehurst 150, Bodiam Nil.

Sewage Disposal.

Frant Village—Partly sewered, outfall to large cesspool, effluent irrigated.

Wadhurst—Durgates Sewage Works up to date percolating filters and Sedimentation Tanks.

Wadhurst-Wadhurst Town. Broad irrigation on 4 acres of land,

Wadhurst—Cousley Wood. The Council have laid a scheme before the Ministry of Health which will deal with the main area.

Ticehurst-A system of sewers exist. Flimwell should be sewered.

Portions of sewers exist, but all are bad.

There are in the district—Pails and Privies, 2711. Water Closets, 900.

Scavenging.

Wadhurst – A scheme of private scavenging has been formulated by the Parish Council. Householders paying for removal. No other parishes have any form of scavenging, although there is a need for same.

No scheme for emptying cesspools or removing contents of earth closets and privies exist in district.

Slaughter Houses.

Slaughter Houses are visited once a week during killing time, as the Inspector finds time, each Parish is taken in turn.

General Sanitary Survey.

The Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health is required to contain an account of the sanitary improvements in the

District for the previous 5 years. Considerable progress has been made in the building of new houses. The extension of Electric Light for the Parishes of Frant, Wadhurst, Ticehurst and Flimwell and the improvement in the Sewage Works.

The District is chiefly residential, agricultural, dairy farming, cattle and poultry are reared. Hops are grown but not to such an extent as before the War. The pickers are mostly home pickers.

The Sanitary Inspector is a building Surveyor as well as Sanitary Inspector and the work placed upon him with regard to the Public Health (meat) regulations would seem to merit some assistance. The area of the district is wide, there are several Sewage Works to attend to besides buildings and the routine work of a Sanitary Inspector, I suggest that the appointment of an Assistant Inspector should be considered, or any form of assistance the Inspector would most prefer. Mr. Harris's work is very good and conscientiously carried out.
