#### Cancer Notifications.

I have addressed two medical societies on this subject recently and am now receiving considerable support and am confident that eventually my suggestions will be adopted in whole or in part.

#### General Provision of Health Services for the Area.

1. Nursing in the Home. No change.
2. Domiciliary Midwifery. We have two district midwives. We are fortunate in having an M.R.C.O.G. resident in the town who can be called up in difficult cases.
3. Laboratory Facilities. The County Laboratory connected with the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital. The County Laboratory has now removed to the University premises.
4. Health Education. Smoking. Several talks have been given and a film strip has been shown illustrating the evils of cigarette smoking. We can claim definite progress among the more intelligent public and particularly among the workers at the local factory.

5. Chiropody Services. Service operates for the old people and is run by their association and which is fairly satisfactory. The Devon County Council and the local factory both supply chiropody services.
6. Hospital Services. On the whole these have proved adequate throughout the year. However, as is usual with general practitioner beds, there is a seasonal shortage of accommodation at the District Hospital.

Maternity.

An experiment in booking cases for discharge in 48 hours is being tried and is working satisfactorily. This scheme if satisfactory, will have the effect of greatly relieving pressure on beds and has many other advantages. It is particularly suited to Tiverton where the patient usually continues with the same doctor after discharge from hospital.

Belmont Hospital.

This is chronically full and vacancies are apt to occur only through deaths. Better use could be made of the accommodation if the scheme for modernization were to be carried out.

The Lift. After 14 years of state management this hospital is still without a lift (an amenity possessed by many one star hotels).

Patients are manhandled up 3 flights of stairs which are too narrow and winding to take a stretcher.

Once they are on the top floor they usually stay there until death. All structural obstacles to the erection of a lift have been removed and it could be readily installed at a cost of £6000.

Whipton Isolation Hospital. Infectious cases are sent to this hospital where accommodation is always adequate.

An ante-natal Clinic is held every Tuesday at 2.30 p.m. at the Tiverton and District Hospital.

A Tuberculosis Clinic is held at the Tiverton and District Hospital twice monthly.

7. Liaison arrangements. Our local hospitals are largely staffed by general practitioners which constitutes an advantage as regards liaison.

The Mothers and Children have had supervision and advice both at the Welfare weekly by the Medical Officer and the Health Visitor, and in their houses by the Health Visitor. Simple treatment has been given where considered sufficient, in other cases the mothers were referred to their private doctor for treatment.

Home Help Service. Cases are dealt with direct through Mrs. Grant in conjunction with the W.V.S. Some Maternity cases in the area are dealt with direct by the District Nurses.

The Orthopaedic Clinic was held on 52 Tuesdays during the year - Appointments are made by the Secretary, Mrs. D. A. Birch, and this works very well.

Mr. Mayor and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my seventeenth Annual Report dealing with the duties of my department during the year 1962.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water Supply.

- (a) The Town's water supply is controlled by the North Devon Water Board and has been satisfactory in both quality and quantity.
- (b) The Allers public main supply water is obtained from the springs rising at Norwood Common and supplemented by pumping at Bolham from the River Exe and the water is both filtered and chlorinated. Routine monthly sample checks have shown the water at all times to be consistently satisfactory in quality. In the case of the Warnicombe supply, the water is obtained from an adit driven into the North East slope of Newte's Hill. This water is chlorinated but not filtered and varies in quality. Chlorination has not been completely successful and out of a total of 18 samples in the year, 3 were not entirely satisfactory. On January 11th. a bacteriological examination yielded a count of 35 Coliform Bacilli per 100 ml. and 11 Bact. Coli (type I). The Engineer of the North Devon Water Board was immediately notified and a repeat sample taken on the 20th. January, showed the water equivalent to a Class I supply. Again on 13th. November, a count of 5 Coliform Bacilli per 100 ml. was revealed and the Water Board Engineer notified and a repeat sample taken on the 16th. November, gave a count of 0.

In the cases of the Bampton/Cove and the Butterleigh/Bickleigh supplies the waters are chlorinated only and examination of samples showed the quality as consistently satisfactory.

- (c) Population of the Tiverton Borough has risen to 12,770 and occupying 4376 dwelling houses. 3781 dwelling houses supplied from public mains direct to the houses, house approximately 11,343 persons. 130 dwelling houses supplied from public mains by means of stand-pipes, house approximately 390 persons.
- (d) The Council owns and runs a public swimming bath. The bath is an open bath and is in use only during the Summer. The water is obtained from the public main supply and a filtration and chlorination plant keeps the water in a highly satisfactory condition.

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### IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

In the case of applications for Improvement Grants, houses are inspected and advice given on the reconstruction, alterations or improvements.

During the year, out of a total of 35 "Standard Grant" applications, 34 were finally approved, and improvement work was completed in the case of 29 premises and Completion Certificates issued.

Also during the year 1 "Discretionary Grant" application was finally approved, and improvement work was completed in the case of 2 properties and Completion Certificates issued.

Since the inception of the scheme for the improvement of houses by way of financial grants, 95 "Discretionary Grant" applications have been approved of which total 86 have been completed.

133 "Standard Grant" applications have been recommended and a total of 105 have been completed.

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### DRAINAGE
