Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to lay before you my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year ending 31st December, 1971.

The Borough covers an area of 17,680 acres. The area taken up by the 'built up' area of the Borough has been increasing steadily over the last few years.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

Messrs. J Heathcoat and its subsidiaries are the chief source of employment.

The Globe Elastic Thread Company, on the industrial estate at Kennedy Way, manufactures elastic thread and is also associated with Messrs. J. Heathcoat and Company.

The Whitbread Group have a brewery in Phoenix Lane and large extensions at Howden Industrial Estate.

Weldcontrol (Devon) Limited, which specialises in welding, is now an expanding firm and have transferred their business to larger premises.

Fenton's Manufacturing Company, on the industrial estate at Kennedy Way, continues to manufacture toilet requisites.

Poultry and Egg Packing are two smaller industries in the Borough.

Blundell's School, a large public school, is also situated in Tiverton.

### Swimming Bath

Owing to the generosity of Sir John Heathcoat Amory, Bart, the town has acquired a magnificent swimming bath which should be of immense benefit in teaching swimming, not only to the Borough, but to the whole youth of the neighbourhood. There has been some argument regarding the temperature due to the fact that some people use it simply as a swimming bath and others as a social centre and of course the latter prefer a temperature of 80° or more. The answer to this problem will have to be found by experience.

### Council Housing

Bungalow accommodation is greatly in demand and is allocated by means of a points system which presents anomalies. A case of a man with a defective heart and his wife in hospital with a dislocated hip can only receive 10 points from me, which is the maximum I am allowed to allot. On the other hand, a perfectly healthy young couple, without a bathroom in their present house, receives the same number of points. This strikes me as being unfair. I am, however, allowed to make a special appeal to the Housing Committee in exceptionally hard cases.

### Private Housing

A vast area of agricultural land surrounding the town has, during the last few years, been covered by a spread of new dwelling houses. One wonders how long this sort of thing can continue.

### Central Council for Health Education

Tiverton Borough Council is one that contributes annually to this organisation, whose work is of the greatest benefit to this department.

### Medical Services

All medical services are located at the upper end of the town, on the East side of the river. This causes considerable inconvenience to the aged residents in the lower end of the town as it necessitates two journeys, i.e., one to make an appointment and the second to keep it.

Old Age Pensioners

The above have been suffering real hardship due to the inflatory price of bus fares, which prevents them travelling into the town to escape that loneliness which is their chief enemy.

I am thankful to hear that at long last some attempt is being made to ameliorate this situation.

I would also urge, in the interest of the elderly, that bus services are not further reduced.

In making this statement I have the backing of the Tiverton Aged People's Association.

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

### 1. Hospital Services

Mr. P. Le Fleming, Group Secretary to the Exeter and Mid-Devon Hospital Management Committee, has given me the following report:-

"The level of work of the three Tiverton Hospitals during recent years was maintained throughout 1971, with a total of 2,023 patients discharged following in-patient treatment, of whom 1,697 were from the Tiverton & District Hospital. There were also 337 live births in the Maternity Unit at the District Hospital. 3,056 new patients attended out-patient clinics, and out-patient attendances totalled 8,371. The Casualty Department treated 4,666 new patients and there were 10,577 attendances at this department during the year.

"The Hospital Management Committee is keen to see a start made on the re-development of the Tiverton Hospital on the Belmont Hospital site, and although this scheme does not yet appear in the Regional Hospital Board's capital building programme, it is anticipated that active planning of the first stage will begin in the not too distant future. This phase will include new in-patient accommodation and departments for the geriatric patients at present in the Belmont Hospital, and will also include the facilities of a day hospital for these patients which will enable more of them to receive specialist hospital assessment and treatment whilst remaining in their own homes.

"Satisfactory negotiations have been conducted during the year between the hospital and local midwifery services to further improve the liaison in maternity care and to make the most efficient use of the facilities of the Maternity Unit at the Tiverton & District Hospital. It is hoped that these arrangements will enable the department to deal with increased maternity bookings in the future. Special attention has also been given during the year to the Casualty Department at the District Hospital, and the Regional

Board, recognising the importance of this service, is providing funds to improve the facilities and equipment of the department."

---

The Tiverton and District Hospital, although housed in old-fashioned premises, accomplishes a large programme of work as regards emergencies, in-patients, out-patients, consultants' clinics, in addition to routine operations and investigations.

It is a happy and efficient unit and I regard it as a priceless asset to the neighbourhood.

2. Domiciliary Midwifery

We have two district midwives. We are fortunate to have a M.R.C.O.G. resident in the town who can be called upon in difficult cases, and also a D.R.C.O.G.

3. Laboratory Facilities

The Public Health Laboratory is situated in Church Lane, Heavitree, Exeter.

4. Health Education

a. Smoking

Progress is being made in discouraging smoking among the general public.

b. Venereal Disease

No action is taken on V.D. as the incidence is very low and from outside sources.

5. Institutional Provision for Unmarried Mothers

None in the area.



6. Ambulance Facilities

Two ambulances operate in the district, one is centered in Tiverton and the other in Cullompton.

7. Clinics and Treatment Centres

Consultation Clinic

Wednesday 9 - 12 a.m. Dr. E. A. Chalk and three health visitors attend in rotation (if necessary).

Ophthalmic Clinic

Every fourth Monday, all day. Dr. Chaturvedi in attendance, by appointment.

Speech Therapy Clinic

Mondays all day and Thursday mornings by appointment with Mr. Warby.

Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic

Every Wednesday from 2 - 4 p.m.

School Dental Service

Emergency treatment, Wednesday from 9.30 - 11 a.m.  
Orthodontic treatment by Mr. Burnett first Friday in month.

Chiropody Clinic

Most Thursdays and Fridays by appointment. There is also a private Chiropodist who is doing valuable work and relieving our waiting list.

Hearing Assessment Clinic

Every third Tuesday in alternate months.



### Ante-Natal Clinic

Thursday afternoons from 2.30 to 4.30 p.m. Run by District Midwives and Health Visitors. Talks on elementary dietetics, baby care etc.

### Cervical Cytology

Once a month by arrangement with Doctor S. Jones in attendance.

### Retirement Club

For the 65 to 70's, every second and fourth Friday afternoons from 2 to 5 p.m.

### Home Help Organisation

Based at the Clinic. Cases are dealt with by Mrs. Nott and Miss Warmington.

### Mass Radiography

This valuable service continues to function smoothly, and pays weekly visits to the town.

### Health Centre

I consider it unfortunate that Tiverton is lagging behind in the provision of a Health Centre but I understand it was to have been a key type with certain facilities available to the whole district.

I believe the chief obstacle has been that both firms of general practitioners have purpose built surgeries, which they very naturally would be loath to give up. The attachment of Health Visitors to practices appears to have been a great success.

### Fluoridation

The natural content of the Borough Water Supply is extremely low and no provision has yet been made to add fluoride artificially. The Council are uncommitted as to the value of this procedure.

### Sewage Disposal

The new Sewage Disposal works has operated satisfactorily and an acceptable final effluent is being obtained.



## PUBLIC HEALTH

### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Household and other refuse is collected weekly, except very rural parts which are fortnightly, by direct labour. Many shops and commercial premises have a twice weekly collection.

Disposal is by controlled tipping of household refuse and trade refuse is burnt on the tip.

Unwanted articles are collected on request. No disposal points are provided for householders to dispose of rubbish.

### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The urban part of the Borough is sewered, and disposal is at a new sewage disposal works at Holwell.

The rural dwellings of the Borough are provided with septic tanks, there only being a very few properties remaining with pail closets.

### PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

There are eight public conveniences within the Borough. The conveniences at The Works and the Town Hall will be closed next year and it is proposed to build some new ones in Phoenix Lane, adjacent to the present bus station. Hand washing facilities are available in three of the eight conveniences.

### NOISE ABATEMENT

During the year representations were made to several Contractors using pneumatic road breakers without muffs and full co-operation was received by this informal action.

### COMMON LODGING HOUSES

There are no Common Lodging houses within the Borough.



### TIVERTON AND DISTRICT SWIMMING POOL

The new indoor swimming pool was opened early in the year. The water is heated and treated by pressure filtration and breakpoint chlorination. The flow is regulated so that all the water passes through the plant every four hours.

Routine residual chlorine and pH tests were taken for bacteriological examination at the Public Health Laboratory, Exeter. All tests showed the water to be of a satisfactory degree of purity.

There were over 106,400 admissions to the pool during 1971.

### DISINFESTATION

The steam disinfecting plant at the Tiverton and District Hospital was used once during the year.

In addition seven premises were disinfested by spraying with a suitable insecticide.

### PEST DESTRUCTION

This Authority provides a free service for the treatment of rodents and pests to domestic premises and charges for treatments at business and agricultural premises.

Three premises were treated successfully following complaints of pigeons. Two premises were cleared of infestations of bats.

### WASPS NESTS

During the year the charge for the treatment of Wasps nests was discontinued and 48 nests were destroyed.

### Closing Orders

One property was considered for Closing Order action under Section 17 of the Housing Act 1957, but the owner submitted proposals to carry out extensive improvements and the Council approved this action.

There were no Certificates of Disrepair issued during the year.

### Housing Repairs

No Abatement Notices were served during the year.

Three properties were repaired following service of written informal notices.

Many other minor repairs were also attended to after an informal visit or telephone call to the owner.

The number of applicants on the Council's Housing List at the end of 1971 was 403.

75 new tenancies were granted during the year.

168 new registrations were accepted during the year.

## W A T E R   S U P P L Y

Practically the whole of the water supplied to the Borough was obtained from the North Devon Water Board's Allers Works.

The total quantity of water supplied to Tiverton Borough (including Cove, Withleigh and Chevithorne) in the 12 months ended 31st December, 1971, amounted to 284,000,000 gallons, an average daily consumption of 780,000 gallons, with a peak of 1,100,000 gallons.

The total number of connections (domestic and trade) made during the year to the Company's mains in Tiverton District amounted to 153, making a total of 5,700 connections on the 31st December, 1971.

The following new mains have been laid in the Tiverton District during the year:-

2" diameter -	50 yards
3" diameter -	391 yards
4" diameter -	2,146 yards
6" diameter -	810 yards.

The majority of the dwellings within the Borough have a mains piped supply within the building. There are some 20 properties remaining sharing standpipes, and there are 60 outlying farms and dwellings with private supplies. All these supplies are sampled from time to time and advice given where necessary.

### REMARKS

This sample is clear and bright in appearance and is free from metals. It has however a reaction slightly on the acid side of neutrality on account of which it will tend to show corrosive action on metals. The water is soft in character with a very moderate content of mineral and saline constituents. It is of a high standard of organic quality.

These results indicate a pure and wholesome water suitable for drinking and domestic uses, from the aspect of the chemical analysis. It will however tend to show corrosive action on metals.

The aforementioned facts and figures have been provided by the courtesy of E. A. Robb, Esq., Dip. Civil Eng. A.R.T.C., Chief Engineer (South) to the North Devon Water Board.

### FOOD HYGIENE

Wherever possible the use of detergent/sterilizers were recommended for washing up utensils and washing down equipment and surfaces.

Following representations, several shops in the town installed improved or additional refrigeration equipment, mainly for the display of cooked meats.

The Market continued to grow and regular inspections were made to ensure that a high standard of food hygiene is maintained.



## FOOD HYGIENE continued

It was disappointing to find that the number of public houses using detergent/sterilizers for washing glasses was very low. It must be realised that a quick rinse under the tap will not kill any infectious germs.

## CONSUMER PROTECTION

Regular checks were made on the shops throughout the Borough to ensure suitable stock rotation was being carried out. From time to time it was noted that manufacturer's recommended shelf life had expired and the shopkeepers were advised accordingly. Representations were also made to the distributors to advise that adequate shelf life be given to commodities supplied to the shops.

Checks were made on refrigerator displays and deep freeze cabinets to ensure satisfactory temperature control methods were adequate.

## UN SOUND FOODS

The following foodstuffs were examined at retail foodshops and certificates given when they were voluntarily surrendered.
