

### GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

- 1. Nursing in the Home. No change.
- 2. Number of Midwives practising in the Area. The District Nurses of which there are 16 act in this capacity.
- 3. LABORATORY FACILITIES. Clinical material is examined at the County Laboratories as before.
- 4. Legislation in Force. There has been no change during the past year with regard to Legislation in Force throughout the Area.
- 5. Hospitals. No change. The only Hospital connected with the Local Authority is the Tiverton Joint Isolation Hospital. This has proved adequate in accommodation during the past year.
- 6. Voluntary. The District is served by the Tiverton and the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospitals. The former has recently carried out an extension scheme. A maternity wing, consisting of a general ward of six beds and three private beds, has now been completed.

### SECTION C.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

### WATER SUPPLIES.

With the exception of the Parishes included in the Regional Water Scheme, supplies generally are satisfactory, although in one or two cases there is a possibility of shortage in a dry period.

The Oakford Water Scheme is now in operation and has been found satisfactory.

Thorverton. Levels have now been taken in connection with the proposed Scheme for this Village.

17 Samples have been taken from Private Wells during the year for Chemical and Bacteriological examination, 2 of which were satisfactory and 15 unsatisfactory.

All these unsatisfactory sources will be superseded by the Regional Scheme.

CLEANSING OF SWIMMING BATHS. None in area at present.

SHOPS ACT. No action taken.

SMOKE ABATEMENT. No action.

#### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The Disposal of Sewage throughout the District is fairly satisfactory although there is need for improvement.

It is hoped that a new Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme for Bampton will soon be put in hand as present conditions are bad. The new Senior Schools are not connected to the present works and the sewage is discharged into a ditch.

A Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme has been prepared for the Parish of Hemyock, and one is being prepared for Westleigh in the Parish of Burlescombe. A scheme is urgently required for Culmstock.

The disposal of sewage at Orchard View Council Houses, Halberton is now in order, but the Village as a whole still requires a disposal scheme.

The question of the disposal of effluents from the abattoirs and milk factory and crude sewage from the Council's sewers at Tiverton Junction in the Parish of Willand is now receiving attention.

### SCAVENGING AND REFUSAL DISPOSAL.

The regional collecting scheme is now in force in 17 Parishes and is working satisfactorily.

#### SCHOOLS.

The general condition and sanitation of schools are satisfactory. New schools have been erected at Bampton by the County Council and the Church Council. Halberton school is badly in need of repair, and will be taken over by the County Education Authority who will bring it up to a proper standard.

Sampford Peverell Church School is in need of attention, but until the water supply and a sewer is available, little can be done.

A considerable amount of work has been done at Kentisbeare School, but the sanitary accommodation is still in need of attention. This also is waiting for the water supply.

Plans are now being prepared for erection of houses to abate remaining cases of overcrowding.

### SECTION E.—INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) MILK SUPPLY.

MILK AND DAIRIES ORDER, 1926.

A great deal of steady progress has been made during the year, thanks chiefly to the effects of the accredited scheme.

SAMPLES OF MILK.

123 were taken for cleanliness with the result that 52 were reported as being satisfactory.

With regard to the unsatisfactory samples, producers' methods were corrected with satisfactory results.

All samples taken for tubercle were found to be negative.

### (b) MEAT INSPECTION.

Meat Regulations and Slaughterhouses (R. D. C.) Order, 1924.

No important change has taken place regarding the above. As a general rule premises are fairly satisfactory and any suggestions by the Sanitary Authorities are promptly carried out.

Slaughter of Animals Act, 1933, and General Meat Inspection.

It was pleasing to note that with few exceptions, the slaughtermen now approve of the use of the gun, it was not found necessary to take any statutory action under the Act.

Meat inspection at the Willand abattoirs is now on a much better footing, as a whole time Inspector was appointed for this duty, early in the year.

- (c) ADULTERATION.—No action taken under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act.
- (d) CHEMICAL AND BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF FOOD. —This only applies to milk in this area. Samples are regularly submitted to the County Laboratories in Exeter.
- (e) NUTRITION .- No action taken.

### GENERAL SANITARY ADMINISTRATION.

In connection with the work of supervising the general sanitary conditions throughout the District, periodical inspections have been made of Council houses, cottages, bakehouses, slaughterhouses, also butchers' shops, and dairy premises, where food is prepared and deposited for sale.

# SECTION F.—PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

### SCARLET FEVER.

This disease was not so prevalent in 1937, and was of the mild type which now seems to be the regular thing and which is correspondingly difficult of control. There were 21 cases in all.

### DIPHTHERIA.

The villages of Bampton, Uffculme and Sampford Peverell were immunised against Diphtheria during the year. The school children of these villages receiving '25 and '5 C.C. doses of A.P.T. with an interval of 14 days between injections.

The percentage of school children treated at Bampton and Sampford Peverell was slightly over 90%, but at Uffculme only 60%.

The cases of Diphtheria reported, occurred at Oakford, but I am glad to say the children of this village are now inoculated.
