It might be interesting to the Council to compare the foregoing statistics with those in an old annual report made by my predecessor for 1923. In that year the Birth Rate was 18.65; the Death Rate 12.35 and Deaths of Infants under 1 year 39.75 per 1,000 births. Deaths from Tuberculosis numbered 14 and new cases of Tuberculosis numbered 19. Three women died in childbirth during 1923 out of a total of 287 births. (The figure to-day is about one death in 2,000 births).

It is surprising to find that, in spite of the vast strides in medical science and improvements in housing and sanitation, the death rate was very much the same in 1923 as it is to-day. Coronary thrombosis, apoplexy and cancer have filled the gap left by the improved figures for tuberculosis, infantile mortality and notifiable diseases.

EXCESSIVE MORTALITY DURING THE YEAR

Deaths from Cancer during 1961 were 55. This compares with previous years as follows: - 1949 - 40; 1950 - 43; 1951 - 32; 1952 - 35; 1953 - 39; 1954 - 40; 1955 - 44; 1956 - 40; 1957 - 39; 1958 - 60; 1959 - 41; 1960 - 47.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

- NURSING IN THE HOME HOME HELP SERVICE. Cases are dealt with by direct
 application from the District Nurses or Health Visitors to the
 County Office.
- NUMBER OF MIDWIVES. The District Nurses, of whom there are 16, act in this capacity.
- LABORATORY FACILITIES. Clinical material is examined at the County Laboratories as previously and also at the Pathological Department of the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital.
- 4. LEGISLATION IN FORCE. There has been no major change during the year with regard to legislation in force throughout the area.
- has lost two of the surgical S.H.M.O's from the staff. This has reduced the surgical coverage to the district below danger level. It is believed, however, that this serious defect in the surgical services will be terminated in 1962. In the meantime, many surgical emergencies are referred to the Exeter Hospitals.

The Medical and Geriatric services have been greatly improved by the appointment of a Consultant Physician who divides his time between Tiverton and Exeter. It is now possible for a resident in the district to see a Consultant Physician in Tiverton without the necessity of losing a day's work by going to Exeter, as was previously the case.

- 6. MATERNITY CASES. Accommodation for maternity cases is inadequate with the result that cases requiring hospitalisation are sometimes referred elsewhere. Doctors in the district are in the habit of referring their obstetric emergencies to Tiverton Hospital, where we are fortunate in having a member of the staff who is an M.R.C.O.G. Were this not the case, many emergencies would have to travel to Exeter, which I consider is too far for safety.
- 7. AGED SICK. Improvement in the County Welfare Service has eased our problems in this direction, but our hospital beds are still cluttered up with the type of patient who would be better dealt with at much less expense in a County Hostel.
- 8. SMALLPOX. In view of the recent outbreak in Wales, it is a disquieting thought that the nearest smallpox expert resides at Weymouth. I consider it essential that there should be one based on Exeter.

SALMONELLA INFECTION

An outbreak of salmonella infection ocurred in a hatcheries in the district and this was investigated in conjunction with the veterinary authorities. Fifteen of the employees had samples of faeces taken and, of these, three were found to be positive. The employees concerned were excluded from actual contact with the eggs and the fowls. At the suggestion of Dr. Mocre, of the Public Health Laboratory, a series of samples were taken from slaughtermen working in Lloyd Maunder's chicken department and other slaughterhouses in the district; all these samples proved to be negative. By the end of the year the trouble had completely subsided.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Schemes completed during 1961.

During the year the Uffculme scheme, including the solids diverter, taking in the Corks Farm area has been completed. A scheme is also being carried out for the elimination of infiltration water from the sewers and will be completed in 1962.

A small preliminary scheme at Silverton has been carried out and completed. This is part of the main scheme and has been put in at an early date, in order to obviate the flooding of two houses in School Road.

A small scheme (being part of the trunk sewer) has been carried out in advance of the main scheme at Cullompton, in order to eliminate infiltration water and to enable more accurate gaugings to be taken of the flow to assist our engineers in their design calculations.

Schemes approved by the Ministry

Burlescombe The final scheme was submitted to the Ministry and approval was given early in 1962. The consultants are now inviting tenders. The total estimated cost is £49,000.

Holcombe The final scheme was submitted to the Ministry and approval was given early in 1962. The consultants are now inviting tenders. The total estimated cost is £39,000.

Schemes in course of preparation

Cullompton This scheme has been in course of preparation since 1954. The estimated cost at that time was £82,000. Now that the town plan for Cullompton has been prepared, the consultants have been able to carry out various modifications to their original scheme, taking into account the fact that Messrs. Sellwoods Tannery effluent will have to be dealt with. It is hoped that the final scheme will be submitted to the Ministry during 1962.

Homyock Messrs. Harvey McGill & Hayes are hoping to finalise this scheme during 1962, in order that it can be submitted to the Ministry.

Silverton The final scheme has now been submitted to the Ministry for approval. It is hoped that this scheme will be started during 1962.

Priority list for other parishes

The order of priority has been revised during the year, as our consultants intimated that they could get on faster if some of the smaller schemes could be brought forward. Maintenance of existing sewers and sewage disposal works.

During the year, an extra man has been taken on the maintenance staff. Mr. Stoneman, the foreman, is on the telephone and there is always someone available (including week-ends) to attend to urgent work on sewerage systems. Small septic tanks and treatment plants in the outlying districts are desludged and emptied regularly by the Contractors, Messrs. C.W. Harrisons. These are also regularly maintained.

WATER SUPPLIES

The North Devon Water Board is responsible for supplying the District with water.

In the case of farm supplies, the advice of the Water Supplies Officer of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food is asked for when necessary.

FUBLIC SWIMMING BATH

The only public swimming bath in the district is situated at the Old Well Roadhouse, Waterloo Cross, Uffculme. The size of the bath is 75 feet by 20 feet. The swimming bath is open from May to September and during this period weekly samples of the water are taken and sent to the Public Health Laboratory for bacteriological examination. At the beginning of the season the bath is completely filled with water from a nearby spring.

The water is then recirculated through a filter and hand chlorinated. There is also a continuous flow of spring water into the bath. Although the water has an objectionable appearance during hot weather, bacteriological examinations of samples of the water have all proved satisfactory. The swimming bath is used by children attending the County Schools at Uffculme and Cullompton and also Bradfield Special School.

Although this water is efficiently chlorinated, I feel that steps should be taken to get main water laid on so that the water could be changed more regularly. However, this is a matter for the North Devon Water Board.
