

The attached chart (which was not included in the press copies) analyses the deaths from Cancer over the past 18 years.



SALMONELLAE

We are continuing to have sporadic outbreaks of this disease amongst cattle, but very few humans are reported to have been infected.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

1. Nursing in the Home - Home Help Service

This service provides valuable help, but is sometimes found to be rather inadequate.

2. Laboratory Facilities

Clinical material is examined at the Public Health Laboratories, as previously, and also at the Pathological Department of the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital.

3. Hospital Services

I have received the following report from Mr. S.R.Lamey, the Hospital Secretary:

"Tiverton and District Hospital reverted to full working on 3rd August, 1969, following the renewal of all engineering services within the hospital and generally modernising the interior of the hospital. This included the provision of two patients' lounges, the major portion of the cost of which was borne by the League of Friends of the Tiverton Hospitals. With the provision also of a number of items of modern surgical equipment, the Hospital is now regarded as a well-appointed hospital."

Personally, I feel that despite the engineering and redecorating improvements in the Tiverton Hospital, there is still an urgent want for a new hospital to consolidate the three existing ones in one building and to provide for increased beddage.

4. Maternity Services

48-Hour bookings continue to be accepted at Tiverton and District Hospital and this has proved very beneficial in making the best use of the available beds.

5. Accommodation for the Aged

This has been extended to some extent during the year.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

PRESENT POSITION AND FUTURE SCHEMES

During the year under review, new sewerage schemes have come into operation at (a) Bampton (Shillingford) and (b) Uffculme (Ashill). Work is proceeding on a major scheme in the Parish of Cullompton but is behind schedule. Work is also proceeding on a small sewerage scheme in the Parish of Huntsham and the work should be completed during 1970.

The position regarding sewerage in the various parishes is set out below :

Effectively sewered (i.e. all except outlying properties A. connected or connectable to a system of main drainage with no further extension contemplated).

BAMPTON

Population: 1,517

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

The sewerage arrangements and sewage works generally are performing satisfactorily. The River Authority is concerned about occasional samples which are below the Consent standard and it is hoped that during 1970 steps will be taken to convert the humus tanks into an upward flow clarifier.

The new works in the Hamlet of Shillingford is producing a satisfactory effluent, but a is producing a satisfactory effluent, but a few minor works are still required to complete the scheme.

BURLESCOMBE Population: 725

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

Practically the whole of the houses in the built-up area of Burlescombe and Westleigh have been connected to the new sewers.

BUTTERLEIGH Population:

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

The scheme is now giving a satisfactory effluent during the summer months, but trouble is still being experienced with the sand filters during the periods of excessive rain and sudden rain when the sand filters become clogged up very quickly.

CRUWYS MORCHARD (Nomansland and Pennymoor)

Satisfactory samples have been taken by the Devon River Authority from both these small schemes during the year, but there is still the problem of sand filters becoming clogged up during the period of heavy and prolonged rainfall.

CULMSTOCK Population: 692

There have been occasional unsatisfactory reports on the effluent and these can be attributed to a problem with the detritus chamber, which has not yet been rectified.

HALBERTON Population: 1,268

Approx. number of properties in the parish: 440

This scheme is operating satisfactorily.

HEMYOCK

Population: 1,063

Approx. number of properties in the parish: 433

There has been a number of teething troubles with the sewage works and pumps at Hemyock. These matters are being attended to by the Contractors and Consultants.

HCLCOMBE Population: 483
ROGUS

Approx. number of properties in the parish: 181

During the year under review, samples taken from the sewage works have been very satisfactory and the scheme has operated well.

SAMPFORD PEVERELL

711 Population:

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

The sewers and sewage works are working in a satisfactory manner. There is, however, a problem with infiltration water, which has given rise to occasional poor samples from the works. We are looking into this matter and hope to locate and rectify the trouble during 1970.

SILVERTON Population: 1,248

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

The new sewage works is operating in a satis-factory manner and samples taken have complied with the Consent conditions.

UFFCULME Population: 1,663

Approx. number of properties in the parish: 647

A scheme for improvements to the trunk sewer from the pumping station at Coldharbour to Bridge Street and beyond has been prepared by our Consultants and details are with the Ministry awaiting approval.

The Ashill Works has been completed and certain problems have been experienced with the pebble clarifier: our Consultants have been advised.

The works installed during the year 1958 is now loaded to capacity owing to recent development in the Parish and considerable development is envisaged. The Council have therefore proceeded with the preparation of a scheme for enlarging the sewage works. The land has been purchased and it is hoped that work will commence during 1970.

Partly sewered and with further extensions in prospect.

BRADNINCH

Population: 1,663

Approx. number of properties in the

Approximately 440 premises are served by the present village sewerage system, which discharges into horizontal flow settling tanks of inadequate capacity. The effluent is then given broad irrigation treatment over the land. There is serious pollution of the River Culm from both outfalls and our Consulting Engineers have been instructed to prepare a comprehensive scheme which includes the provision of completely new sewage disposal works. The preparation work on this scheme is behind schedule and the scheme is long overdue. As a temporary measure the Duchy of Cornwall have instructed the Council to clean out the ditches and to fence the outfall watercourses. This work should be done during 1970.

CULLOMPTON

Population: 3,415

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

The new scheme for providing more comprehensive sewers and a new sewage disposal works in this Parish is well under way, but behind schedule. It is hoped that the first stage will come into operation during the autumn of 1970 and the whole scheme should be finished early in 1971. Owing to the closing down of The Tannery, there is considerable excess capacity at the new works to deal with future development, both industrial and housing.

KENTISBEARE

Population: 692 Approx. number of properties in the

Part of the village is sewered into a small treatment plant near our Council Housing Estates. However, the whole village requires to be sewered and a scheme is being prepared by our Consulting Engineers. The provisional date for the scheme is 1971/72.

Population: 674 THORVERTON

Approx. number of properties in the parish: 288

The new scheme prepared by our Consulting Engineers has been approved by the Ministry and it is hoped that work will be commenced during the year 1970.

WASHFIELD

Population: 323

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

The village area is served and also a small built-up area at Courtney, where a new dis-tribution apparatus and filter bed are being provided.

Partly sewered and with no further extensions in prospect.

BICKLEIGH

Population:

217

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

The small sewage plant at Bickleigh is functioning satisfactorily and samples taken have complied with the Consent conditions.

CADELEIGH Population:

142

Approx. number of properties in the parish: 54

The parish is too scattered to warrant a sewerage scheme, but there is an old septic tank system which deals with the area around the Cadeleigh Arms.

HOCKWORTHY Population:

192

Approx. number of properties in the parish:

There is a small sewage plant serving the Council Houses at Staple Cross, but the rest of the parish is too scattered to warrant a sewerage scheme and is served mainly by -septic tanks.

MOREBATH

During the year under review, improvements have been carried out to the effluent drainage system and land treatment is now given.

OAKFORD

The Village of Stoodleigh is rather scattered running from Stoodleigh Drive to beyond Ford Farm. We have instructed our Consulting Engineers to prepare a scheme for this area to serve up to 40 dwellings. The total cost will be high owing to the strung out nature of the village and the engineering difficulties which will be involved. A start should be made on the detailed preparation of this scheme during 1970.

Not sewered and no sewerage contemplated.

The undermentioned parishes are very rural in character. They have no large built-up area and no sewerage scheme is considered to be necessary :-

Cadbury

Clayhanger

Loxbeare

Templeton.

WATER SUPPLIES

The water supply in this District is from the mains of the North Devon Water Board.

The water supply to the area has been satisfactory in quality. Out of a total of 275 samples, which were taken for bacteriological examination, 24 were unsatisfactory, but were satisfactory on re-sampling. Chemical analysis of the treated water indicated a pure and wholesome water supply suitable for drinking and domestic purposes. The fluoride content of the sources is nil.

The Board is experiencing difficulty in maintaining adequate supplies to the eastern parishes of the Tiverton Rural District during times of peak demand. The Planning Authorities have been requested to do everything they can to postpone the demand for supplies of water to new development in the eastern part of the district until such time as water can be made available from the new works at present being constructed at Tiverton and the laying of a trunk main to Cullompton.

PUBLIC SWIMMING BATH

Regular samples were taken during the season at the public swimming bath at "aterloo Cross, Uffculme, and the usual satisfactory results were maintained using the system of hand chlorination and tintometer checks. The swimming pool was closed in September and the filling station is being operated by Messrs. Whittons of Cullompton, who are not opening the pool for public or private use, nor are they operating the cafe which was on the same premises. The owners have been advised that considerable work would be required to the swimming pool installation before it could again be re-opened for public use.

LEARNER SWIMMING POOLS AT SCHOOLS

Routine samples of these pools are taken by the County
Health Department. We give advice on chlorination and
general swimming pool hygiene and these pools are well
controlled by the Headmasters of the schools concerned.

Mr. W. P. Lake has continued as the Council's Rodent Operator for the purpose of dealing with rats and mice during the year under review. We have a large number of farm contracts and a number of husiness premises that are also dealt with by means of contracts. These premises are treated four times a year and visited as required. In general, Warfarin bait is used. The Council's sewers and tips are treated at least twice a year and regular checks are made on rodent infestation at these premises. The services of our Rodent Operator are available to any ratepayer who wishes to engage him, but there is a charge for private dwellings.

MEAT INSPECTION

We have five full-time Mest Inspectors based on Lloyd Maunders and one Trainee. The Trainee will probably go on a Meat Inspection Course at Bristol Polytechnic in the autumn of 1970. Owing largely to the export of sheep and lambs to the continent, the slaughterhouse operates from 6 a.m. onwards and occasionally there is late night work. The Council has come to an arrangement with the management for the Meat Inspectors to be available on a rota basis from 6 a.m. until 6 p.m. When there is late night killing, inspection is carried out by the Public Health Inspectors available from the office. Owing to the long hours the Meat Inspectors have to work, overtime payments are made to those entitled who work longer than 38 hours per week.

Details of the carcases inspected are enumerated on the following two pages and it will be seen that a hundred per cent inspection is carried out.

There is a system of poultry inspection in force and there is a spotters check system operated by Messrs. Lloyd Maunder. Rejected and suspect carcases are examined at intervals during the day by Meat Inspectors. The hygiene at this very large establishment is of a very good standard. The water supply throughout has a fairly high chlorine level which tends noticeably to raise the bacteriological standard of the carcases. Visits are also made to Messrs. H.J. Dunn's poultry killing establishment at Uffculme. For a small installation of this type, the standard is quite reasonably good.

FOOD HYGIENE (MARKETS, STALLS AND DELIVERY VEHICLES) REGULATIONS, 1966

We are continuing to implement these Regulations as and where necessary. During the year inspections have been made of delivery vehicles operating in our District. When vehicles are operating from an adjoining district, details are sent to the local authority concerned.

In our scattered Rural District, it is always difficult to locate and identify vehicles operating in our District from adjoining areas, but wherever possible details of the Regulations are brought to the notice of food vendors and tradesmen who operate vans in our District and in the surrounding areas.

FOOD HYGIENE (GENERAL) REGULATIONS, 1960

It will be seen that there is no substantial change in the number of premises. Regular visits are made to premises which are known to be below standard, especially during the busy summer season when particular attention is given to food premises on the holiday routes.

HOUSING ACTS 1957 - 1969

During the past twelve months 47 applications for Standard Grants have been received and 52 applications have been approved. The difference in numbers is due to an overlap of applications from the previous year. 16 Applications for Discretionary Improvement Grants were received during this period and 13 were approved.

The Housing Act, 1969, containing new provisions relating to house improvement grants became operative in August and it is anticipated with the increased amounts of grant and more flexible approach that the figures for Discretionary Improvement Grants will continue to improve.

With regard to housing generally, during the year 13 Closing Orders and 3 Demolition Orders were made in respect of unfit properties not capable of repair at reasonable expense and 1 Undertaking under Sec. 16(4) of the Housing Act, 1957 was accepted. 4 Unfit properties were demolished and 17 Preliminary Notices were served in respect of unfit houses capable of repair at reasonable expense. 15 Houses were made habitable during the year as follows: Closing Orders revoked 10, Undertakings cancelled 3 and Statutory Notices complied with 2. In addition to the above figures, 7 properties were made habitable as the result of Preliminary Notices.

At the end of the year, the Council, in a general streamlining of administration, formed a new department to deal with all aspects of housing and Mr. Mogford the Deputy Chief Public Health Inspector was appointed to head the new department.

REFUSE COLLECTION

As the District grows and new private and Council Houses are occupied, the demands on the service have continued to grow. We are now collecting from even the most isolated country cottages in the District, although the collections here might not be as regular as in our towns, villages and hamlets, but we do give a service. In the main, there is a weekly collection operating throughout the District.

The Devon County Council have requested us to empty the litter bins and clean up the lay-bys and they are apparently satisfied with the service we are giving to the travelling public on the lay-bys throughout the District. We feel that we are able to cope with the litter problem fairly well, with the exception of the more busy period during August and early September. We still have the problem of local people using the lay-by litter containers for domestic refuse and also local transport lorries cleaning out their vehicles on a Friday night or Saturday and leaving the litter in the lay-bys. In this connection we have written to a number of firms whose lorries were creating a problem.

BULKY REFUSE

During the year we continued to implement our bulky refuse collection and, as a result, the Council have agreed to a second collection, this to take place during the March/April spring cleaning period, to enable householders to get rid of their unwanted articles.

CIVIC AMENITIES ACT, 1967

During the year this department dealt with 9 vehicles, which appeared to have been abandoned, and in 3 of these cases the vehicles were removed by the Council. The Devon and Cornwall Constabulary are particularly helpful to us in dealing with such vehicles.
