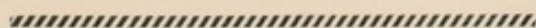

GENTLEMEN,—

I beg to submit my Annual Report for 1903.

I estimate your population, to the middle of the year, to be 5,700; an increase of 100 over 1902.

The births registered have been 115, viz., 53 males and 62 females, three of which were illegitimate; equal to an annual birth-rate of 20·1 per 1,000. The number of births registered and rate for the year 1902 were respectively 112 and 20·0 per 1,000; and the average birth-rate for the preceding ten years (1893 to 1902) was 22·5 per 1,000.

The deaths recorded have been 99, viz., 44 males and 55 females, two of which are uncertified; yielding an annual death-rate of 17·3 per 1,000. In addition, I have to note the deaths of four others, viz., three males and one female, residents of your district, who died away from home, in public institutions. These four added make our total deaths 103, with a nett death-rate of 18 per 1,000. The nett deaths and nett death-rate for the previous year were respectively 88 and 15·7 per 1,000; and the average deaths and death-rate for the preceding ten years, respectively, 74 and 14·9 per 1,000.

Of the 103 deaths, 20 were under one year of age, making an infant mortality of 173·9 per 1,000, which is extremely high. The proportion of deaths among this class, for the year 1902, to every 1,000 births registered was equal to 133·9 per 1,000. The old age deaths, or deaths of persons 65 years of age, were 30,

compared with 17 the previous year. Four cases of sudden or violent death were investigated by the Coroner. Of the 103 deaths from specified causes, 11 were ascribed to the principal zymotic or infectious diseases, equal to a zymotic death-rate of 1·9 per 1,000, against 7 for the preceding year, and a zymotic death rate of 1·2 per 1,000. The deaths from zymotic or preventable diseases are as follows: Smallpox 1, Scarlet Fever 5, Whooping Cough 1, Diphtheria 2, Membranous Croup 1, and Diarrhœa 1. The other causes of death, excluding infectious diseases, are above the average of previous years. They include 18 from acute Lung Diseases, 4 from Phthisis, 6 from Cancer, and 10 from Heart Diseases.

The Vital Statistics for 1903 comprise a birth-rate of 20·1 per 1,000, higher than last year; an infant mortality of 173·9 per 1,000, highest in ten years; a zymotic death-rate of 1·9 per 1,000, also one of the highest recorded; and a high general death-rate.

The infectious diseases reported to me under the "Notification Act" have been 120, viz., Smallpox 20, Scarlet Fever 90, Diphtheria 6, Membranous Croup 1, Erysipelas 2, and Puerperal Fever 1.

All the Smallpox patients were sent to Sourhall Hospital, one dying there, who had never been vaccinated. Twenty-three cases of Scarlet Fever were removed to the Fielden Hospital.

Smallpox broke out in "Dawson City" on the 21st March, under circumstances which I have explained to you in a special report dated 6th April, 1903. Twenty cases occurred from the 21st March to 18th August, when the last patient was removed from "Dawson City." This disease extended to Charlestown and Heptonstall, and after five months was suppressed with difficulty. Many of the parties affected went about the public thoroughfares with Smallpox eruption full out on them, apparently regardless of consequences. It was largely spread in the Rural District by this exposure of infected persons. Several doing so ought to

have been prosecuted, as they were well aware what they ailed. Vaccination and re-vaccination were promptly carried out, and the Sanitary Inspector, in all cases, superintended the thorough disinfection of houses, premises, &c. I received every assistance from Mr. Tempest, contractor to the Halifax Waterworks, in dealing with his workmen, in regard to the precautionary measures adopted. All contacts who submitted to vaccination, after the occurrence of a fresh case in any hut, were permitted to go on with their work at Walshaw-dean; and any persons refusing vaccination and who had been exposed to the infection, lost their employment if they did not comply. The women and children in the various huts also willingly accepted these conditions. The plan acted well, and was followed by the best results.

Scarlet Fever, as you are aware, has been very prevalent during the year throughout the whole district. No schools were closed in consequence, as the Board Authorities are very careful to exclude any children from attendance who belong to infected families. Adults have been attacked as well as young children. Five deaths are attributed to this disorder. I am afraid, in several instances, mild cases have passed without being medically treated, and were unrecognised. This, has been, to a great extent, an important factor in the wide spread of Scarlatina over the Rural District. The increasing accommodation at the Fielden Hospital for the isolation of this disease will materially assist in the control and gradual decline of these cases.

Diphtheria and Membranous Croup caused three deaths, without any direct condition pointing to the origin.

Influenza has been prevalent, and was the primary cause of death in two aged people.

Typhoid Fever, I am glad to say, has not existed; no case has been reported for the year. This is a matter for congratulation, and in my experience, has rarely, if ever, occurred before in your district since the Public Health Act first came into force.

Whooping Cough has prevailed widely amongst young children; one death has been reported.

Building for the year has been very quiet. Six newly-built houses have become occupied in 1903, compared with 5 in 1902, 8 in 1901, 14 in 1900, 9 in 1899, 18 in 1898, and 23 in 1897.

Factories and Workshops in your district are fairly satisfactorily provided with closet accommodation for both sexes. The workshops, which are five in number, include two bakehouses. These are clean, in fair sanitary condition, and comply with the requirements of the Act.

I attach to this report the usual tables required by the Local Government Board and County Council, also the Inspector's account of Sanitary work completed during the year.
