We have pleasure in presenting our report for the year ending 31st December, 1962.

During the year the general health of the Borough was very good. There was a mild epidemic of influenza in January: in May-June there was an outbreak of measles, confined almost entirely to the junior school children.

The corrected birth rate was 15.3 per 1,000 population: that for the whole of England and Wales was 18.0.

The corrected death rate was 14.1 per 1,000 population: the figure for the whole of the country was 11.9.

Hazards to Health of Smoking

The attention of the public has been called to the hazards to health of smoking, by posters exhibited in doctors' surgeries and in public places in the town.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There was a mild epidemic of influenza in January: there were no deaths. There was an epidemic of measles, chiefly confined to the junior school-children, during the months of June and July.

In the early months of the year there were outbreaks of smallpox in various parts of the country. Several hundred people in Torrington applied for, and received, vaccination against the disease.

Poliomyelitis

Oral vaccine against poliomyelitis became freely available in the early part of the year. The number of cases of poliomyelitis in England and Wales was lower in 1962 than it has been for over half a century. There has been no case in Torrington for many years.

No new case has come to our notice. There are facilities for clinic treatment in Barnstaple.

CARE OF EXPECTANT MOTHERS.

Ante-natal care is given to expectant mothers by their own doctors and by the District Nurse/Midwife. Mothercraft classes are held fortnightly by the District Nurse/Midwife and the Health Visitor.

DOMICILIARY MIDWIFERY SERVICE AND HOME NURSING.

The Queen's Institute District Nurse/Midwife is resident in Torrington. She has all modern equipment for Midwifery as well as for general home nursing. There were 23 domiciliary confinements in the Borough during the year.

HEALTH SERVICES AND CARE OF YOUNG CHILDREN.

All mothers are visited in their homes, after confinement, by the County Health Visitor. She supervises the Child Welfare Clinic; this is held fortnightly, for children up to the age of five years.

Infant foods and vitamin supplements can be purchased at reduced

prices.

DOMESTIC HELP SERVICE.

Home helps can be provided during confinements and in times of illness. In cases of necessity County grants towards their cost can be made.

CHIROPODY SERVICE.

The County chiropody clinic is held once monthly at the Church House. A small charge is made for treatment.

AMBULANCE SERVICE.

The County ambulance is maintained by Heard's Garage, Torrington, and is operated by the British Red Cross Society. This has been very satisfactory.

The figures for rainfall are recorded daily at the Sewage Disposal Works by the attendant.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The sewage pumping stations and disposal plant have worked satisfactorily throughout the year. Any faults have been of a minor nature and have generally been normal maintenance matters.

The enlargement of the sewage disposal works has not commenced but all details of the contract have been agreed and work will start in the Spring of 1963.

Despite the continued overloading of the works the effluent discharged has been of a very high standard.

Arrangements have been made for the removal of sludge in liquid form. This has obviated the difficulty experienced with sludge drying and the smell which was created when the sludge was shovelled from the drying beds.

WATER SUPPLY.

Water is supplied to the Borough by the North Devon Water Board.

The supply has always been adequate and the quality very good.

The water is slightly alkaline and is not plumbo-solvent.

HOUSING.

A block of six flats for elderly people has been erected in Calf Street. The flats were occupied in May and the tenants are very satisfied with the accommodation. One-bedroomed units such as these would seem to be ideal for those elderly people capable of looking after themselves.

The Council hope to erect ten more flats of a somewhat similar plan in New Street. At present delay is being experienced in obtaining the site.

Preliminary discussions have taken place with representatives of the County Council with a view to providing self-contained bed/sitting room flats within the grounds of the Torridge View Welfare Home. This accommodation would meet the needs of those elderly people who can generally look after themselves but may need communal cooking and dining facilities. In times of illness the tenants of these flats could be cared for by the staff of the Welfare Home.

The Council has acquired the site of 2.35 acres in Mill Street and negotiations are in hand for the submission of preliminary lay-outs. It is hoped that it will be possible to erect some 26-30 flats and houses on this site.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS.

The joint rodent control scheme operated by the Borough Council and the Torrington R.D.C. continues to work satisfactorily. Routine visits, inspections and treatments are made regularly throughout the area and infestation is kept at a very low level.

Very few complaints are received and these are dealt with very quickly.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

Slaughtering has been carried out regularly at two private slaughter-houses within the Borough and Tables A and B give details of animals slaughtered, meat condemned, etc.
