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

Preface

To the Mayor, Aldermen, and Members of the Borough Council:-

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I present herewith the Annual Report on the Health of the District drawn up in accordance with Ministry of Health Circular 1/68 dated January, 1968. Included in the Report is the Report of your Chief Public Health Inspector.

At the beginning of April the Borough Health Department ceased to be amalgamated with the Totnes Rural District Health Department. Consequently the number of Health Inspectors available for duties in the Borough was reduced.

No great change occurred in the vital statistics for 1967 over previous years but there were eleven more births and thirty-seven fewer deaths than in 1966, which is encouraging, and there were no infant deaths.

A small number of cases of measles occurred in the early part of the year. It is hoped that after the Devon County Council measles vaccination compaign becomes effective, there will be a substantial drop in the number of cases of measles in future years. Twenty nine cases of Sonne' Dysentery occurred mostly in youngsters of 5 years of age or under, again in the first quarter of the year. Energetic treatment by local doctors, coupled by strict hygienic precautions carried out at the Primary School helped contain the outbreak.

The Chief Public Health Inspector draws attention to the unsatisfactory tipping arrangements at Nockwood Quarry where "controlled tipping" is not carried out. Also mentioned is alleviation of trouble at the Totnes Sewage Disposal works, due to severe overloading of the works.

I wish to thank members of the Council and staff for their support during the year.

Section B

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES

1. Hospitals

There are two hospitals in the town, The Totnes and District Hospital is a general practitioner hospital and has 24 beds. Broomborough Hospital has 135 beds for chronic cases. It has a maternity wing with 13 beds and cots; this unit serves a wide area outside the town. There are also 43 beds available for residential cases under Part III of the National Assistance Act.

2. County Council Health Services

Under the National Health Service Act, the County Council provides the following services:-

Domiciliary midwives, home nurses, health visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, ambulance services, vaccination and immunisation procedures, home help services, and the care of persons suffering from illness or mental disorders, and the after care of such persons.

Two district nurse/midwives work in the district together with a health visitor and a nursing assistant. A child welfare clinic is held on the first, third and fifth Monday in the month at the Borough Park Clinic, and the health visitor for the area is in attendance. The home help service is provided by the County Council. A chiropody service has been made available for the handicapped, the aged, and expectant mothers. The ambulance service is operated by voluntary organisations. A "meals on wheels" service is provided by the M.R.V.S.

3. Laboratory Services

Bacteriological examinations of pathological specimens and samples of milk, water, and ice cream, are carried out at the Public Health Laboratories at Exeter and Plymouth. The chemical analysis of water is undertaken by Public / nalysts at Exeter.

4. Home Help Service

The Home Help Organiser has an office at 43 Fore Street, Totnes, Telephone: Totnes 2663 (between 9 and 10 a.m.) The demand for this service is ever increasing and provides essential domestic help in cases of maternity, sickness, convalesence, old age and infirmity. It is not free, but thoses unable to pay the full charges are assessed according to their means.

Section D

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

1. WATER

2053 dwellings received a piped supply from the South lest Devon later Board. Two dwellings are served by a standpipe and one has its own private supply.

All samples taken from the main supply have been satisfactory.

2. REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The Council undertakes a once-weekly kerbside collection of refuse. No serious difficulty has been experienced in maintaining the service.

Disposal is by means of crude tipping at Hockwood Quarry, and it is only by reason of its location, well away from domestic premises, that conditions do not give rise to serious nuisance. Owing to limited financial resources and insufficient covering materials, it has not been possible to carry out proper controlled tipping. Regular use is made of a bulldozer to keep the tip tidy and fortunately there were no complaints received during the year.

The two side loading refuse vehicles are rapidly deteriorating and consideration will need to be given to replacing these in the near future. It is hoped that when the time does arrive, more efficient and hygienic vehicles will replace them, in accordance with the recommendations of the Working Party Report on Refuse Collection.

In September, a charge was introduced for the removal of trade refuse.

3. SEWERAGE AND SEMAGE DISPOSAL

The automation of the electrical equipment associated with the spray irrigation of effluent at the sewage treatment works before it is discharged via a stream to the river is causing trouble, but overall the remedial scheme has been successful in that analytical reports have shown that standards generally speaking have been close to the temporary standards imposed by the Devon River Authority.

The additional land required for spraying purposes has still not been acquired.

Schemes in broad outline form for both sewerage and sewage disposal have been submitted to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government and in the meantime, certain works will be carried out at the sewage disposal works to improve the treatment process.

SECTION E

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

In spite of staff changes and disruption of the smooth running of the Department when integration with the Rural District Council, Public Health Department ended in April, 320 inspections and visits of all types of food premises were made and resulted in 39 informal notices being served in respect of contraventions of food hygiene legislation. The Food Hygiene (Markets, Stalls and Delivery Vehicles) Regulations, introduced in 1966 placed an additional burden of work on the Department.

The standard of food hygiene has remained generally constant throughout the year. In several establishments, both large and small, there is yet a need for all round improvement in the practices of food handlers and a greater awareness on the part of management of their responsibilities to a general public which is expected to consume the food in which they deal.
