Preface

To the Mayor, Aldermen, and Members of the Borough Council: -

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I present herewith the Annual Report on the Health of the District, drawn up in accordance with Ministry of Health Circular 1/73 dated January, 1973. Included in the Report is the Report of your Chief Public Health Inspector.

Vital Statistics

The Registrar General estimated that the population increased by 80 persons to a total of 5,800 persons. Deaths exceeded births by 41 so that to get this increased population a total of 121 people must have moved into the town. The 77 births that occurred give a standardised Birth Rate of 15.8 per thousand population which is above the National Rate of 14.8. The 118 deaths resulted in a Standardised Death Rate of 11.2 which is below the National Average of 12.1, so on the whole these statistics are encouraging. There were no infant deaths.

Infectious Diseases

In June a resident of the Borough returned from a World Cruise where he had been a contact of typhoid fever. Stool tests carried out on him were negative.

In August a small number of persons employed at two local food factories were found to have Sonné Dysentery. Routine tests were carried out on all the contacts and as a result two more persons were found to be infected, though symptomless, and were excluded from work. Certificates under the National Insurance Regulations were issued to some workers and other workers were excluded from work under the Public Health (Infectious Diseases) Regulations 1968. These latter workers were compensated for loss of earnings by the Borough Council. The outbreak cleared up by early September.

SECTION 'B'

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICE

1. Hospitals

There are two hospitals in the town, The Totnes and District Hospital is a general practitioner hospital and has 24 beds. Broomborough Hospital has 135 beds for chronic cases. It has a maternity wing with 13 beds and cots; this unit serves a wide area outside the town.

2. Laboratory Facilities

Laboratory facilities are provided by the Public Health Laboratory services at Exeter and Plymouth. The chemical analysis of water is undertaken by Public Analysts at Exeter, and also by the South West Devon Water Board.

3. Mass Miniature Radiography

The Unit visited Totnes once a fortnight throughout the year.

4. County Health Services

Under the National Health Services Act, 1946, the County Council provides the following services:-

Domiciliary midwives, home nurses, health visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, ambulance services, vaccination and immunisation procedures.

Two District nurse/midwives work in the district together with a health visitor and a clinic nurse. A Child Welfare clinic is held at regular intervals at The Borough Park Clinic.

A chiropody clinic is held for the handicapped, the aged and expectant mothers at the Family Welfare Centre, Pomeroy House, Bridgetown, Totnes. Telephone: Totnes 3665

5. Social Services

The Area Director of Social Services at The Family delfare Centre, Pomeroy House, Bridgetown, Totnes, Telephone 3665, is responsible for providing a Social Work Service under the Children's Act, the Mental Health Act 1959, and the National Assistance Act, to the elderly, the mentally ill, the physically handicapped and homeless persons and families. The Social Services Department also administers the Home Help Service, the Social Work Service to Schools, the Occupational Therapy Services and residential homes and centres.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

1972 was overshadowed by the fast approaching reality of Local Government Reorganisation. The effects were felt not only in the sense that any forward planning was inhibited, but also in that increasing time had to be devoted to the subject.

The professional public health officers of No. 9 District got away to an early start in a spirit of good will and co-operation. They studied the likely work in the new District, the quality of performance and the concept of total environmental health in an idealistic as well as practical manner. In those early days, especially in view of the Bains Report recommendations, the prospect of proper recognition for the work and worth of the Environmental Health Officer seemed very real. Time has tempered these aspirations and whilst the hope remains, expectancy has receded in the face of old reactionary ideas of others who, in strange contrast with the spirit of co-operate management, think "Inspector of Nuisances", pronounce on matters outside their own professional competence but, by reason of their status, are heeded more readily.

There is little on which to pass comment in the report itself.

The main work of inspecting the District continued at a level somewhat lower than in the previous year. The main reason for this, apart from reorganisation, was the increased interest shown in Improvement Grants. Forty-two applications were approved compared with fourteen in the previous year. Whilst this may not appear many, the time spent by Officers from first enquiry to final completion is very considerable. In addition, almost as much work is spent in dealing with enquiries which, for various reasons, do not result in formal applications.

Especially in older houses, a number of cases are coming to light where applications made some years ago were approved on very inadequate specifications; where the "new work", for example, a bathroom was grant aided but where the damp and decaying condition of the original house was almost ignored. These houses are now coming forward for further grants. But not only is that the case; the situation sometimes arises where action is needed to require the remedy of unfit conditions in a house which has been "improved".

Cases of this kind highlight the need for greater depth in the quality of our work and closer attention to detail. Time to inspect, to research, to reflect are essential ingredients of Public Health work and which can only be provided through proper recognition of the value to be placed upon the function. The old empirical standards are passing but, like the Inspector of Nuisances, will linger on in the minds of those who see pale mediocrity as an acceptable standard for environmental control.

3. SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Report of the Borough Engineer and Surveyor

In view of the real urgency to provide adequate sewerage and sewage disposal facilities for Totnes, the Corporation's consultants, Messrs. C.D.C. Braine & Partners, are taking all possible steps to meet the timetable which has been accepted by the Corporation. It is hoped that work on the sewerage contract will commence in March 1974, and will be of some 18 months to 2 years in duration. The contract for sewage treatment and disposal is programmed for the Spring of 1975. Whilst it is approciated that sewage treatment is of greater importance than improving the sewerage system, various factors make it impossible to implement a scheme before this date.

The method of treatment proposed is surface aeration, and a pilot plant is shortly to be set up by St. Peter's Quay Pumping Station in order to accurately determine the effectiveness of this form of treatment.
