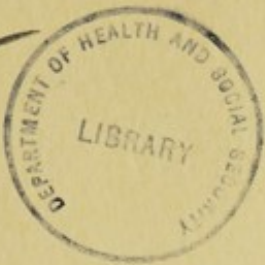

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

This report is drawn up in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of Health Circular 1/69 dated January, 1969. Included is the report of your Chief Public Health Inspector.

STATISTICS

With the formation of TORBAY COUNTY BOROUGH on the 1st April, the District boundaries were altered so that the population decreased to 13,850 persons and the acreage increased to 82,632 acres. These changes were due mainly to the loss of Galmpton and Churston and to the acquisition of the more rural parts of the old Brixham Urban District including parts of Kingswear.

The Standardised Birth Rate at 16.5 per thousand population is very close to the National Rate of 16.9 and the Standardised Death Rate at 8.9 per thousand population is lower than the National Average of 11.9. The solitary infant death caused a Rate of 4.5 per 1,000 live births which is considerably less than the figure of 18.0 for England and Wales.

As usual nearly 56% of deaths were due to Cardiovascular diseases. Cancer and Respiratory illness caused 15% and 14% of the deaths respectively and there were 5 deaths due to accidental causes other than road accidents.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

A serious outbreak of food poisoning occurred in October transmitted by unpasteurised farm bottled milk. Approximately 70 persons were taken ill, all of whom drank the unpasteurised milk which was infected with *Salmonella typhimurium* from one diseased cow. Most of the cases of illness occurred in Torbay County Borough but there were about 19 cases in the Rural District although only three of these were officially notified by the doctors concerned. Steps were taken to prohibit the sale of unpasteurised milk from the farm concerned and after the infected cow had been identified it was segregated from the herd. The Pasteurisation Order made under the Milk and Dairies Regulations was then lifted but I am pleased to report that the farmer has decided to sell only pasteurised milk in future and to cease bottling raw milk from his farm.

## Infections Common to Farm Animals and Man

Elsewhere in this Report is included a paragraph dealing with infections on farms. In the four large rural districts covered by your Medical Officer of Health (Kingsbridge, Plympton, Tavistock and Totnes) a marked increase has been noted in the number of infections on farms common to man and animals. Those in particular which occurred in 1968 were ANTHRAX SALMONELLA INFECTIONS and BRUCELLOSIS. After each incident was reported to the Public Health Department the farmer was advised as to what to do to minimise the risk of spreading the disease to humans. There were 3 outbreaks of Anthrax, 70 outbreaks of Salmoncellosis and 3 outbreaks of Brucellosis. Two of the Brucellosis incidents affected herds where the farmer was a producer retailer of raw untreated milk, and it was necessary to arrange for the milk to be pasteurised before sale to the public until the infection on the farms had been eradicated. The Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food has a voluntary Brucellosis Eradication Scheme, but, although Devon is one of the foremost counties in getting farmers interested, I feel the scheme would be more efficacious if it was made compulsory or farmers were given more financial inducements to join it.

The Chief Medical Officer to the Ministry of Health (now the Department of Health and Social Security) in his 1967 Annual Report states that "untreated milk is unsafe milk", but whilst pasteurisation of infected milk renders it safe how much better it would be to have uninfected milk to start with and not rely solely upon pasteurisation to safeguard human health.

I wish to thank the Councillors for their support during this year and also thank my colleagues on the staff for their co-operation in producing this Report.

## SECTION B

### GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES

#### 1. Hospitals

The Rural District is served by hospitals in Totnes, Dartmouth, Paignton, Newton Abbot, Ashburton, Torquay and Bittaford.

#### 2. Laboratory Facilities

Laboratory facilities are provided by the Public Health Laboratory services at Exeter and Plymouth. The chemical analysis of water is undertaken by Public Analysts at Exeter.

#### 3. Mass Miniature Radiography

The Unit visited main towns in the area once a fortnight throughout the year and all persons living in the rural parishes were easily able to obtain chest x-rays.

#### 4. County Health Services

Under the National Health Services Act, 1946, the County Council provides the following services:-

Domiciliary midwives, home nurses, health visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, ambulance services, vaccination and immunisation procedures, home help services and the care of persons suffering from illness or mental disorders, and the aftercare of such persons.

Nine district nurse/midwives work in the district together with four health visitors and a nursing assistant. Child welfare clinics are held at regular intervals at South Brent, Stoke Gabriel and Kingswear.

The home help service is provided by the County Council. A chiropody service has now been introduced for the handicapped, the aged and expectant mothers. Chiropody clinics are held in Stoke Gabriel, Buckfastleigh and Totnes.

#### 5. Family Planning Service

A clinic is held at the Central Clinic, Midvale Road, Paignton every first and third Monday of the month, 6.00 to 7.30 p.m.; every 2nd and 4th Monday, 2.00 to 3.30 p.m. A clinic is also held at the Adult Education Centre, Dartington, on the 3rd Tuesday afternoon of alternate months beginning in January of each year.

#### INTERNATIONAL CERTIFICATES OF VACCINATION

In accordance with the requirements of the World Health Regulations 72 certificates of Smallpox or Cholera vaccinations in respect of persons travelling abroad were authenticated by the Public Health Department.

#### DISEASES ON FARMS

##### Salmonellosis

Fifteen outbreaks of Salmonella dublin and thirteen of Salmonella typhimurium occurred on farms within the district during the year, all were investigated and at only one were humans affected. In this case the farmer was a producer retailer of milk and over fifty people who received his milk were confirmed as suffering from the disease. A cow was found to be an intermittent reactor and was removed from the herd. Milk samples taken over the following six months revealed no further outbreak.





## DISEASES ON FARMS (Cont.)

### Anthrax

One case was reported in a cow at a dairy farm, an investigation was carried out and imported cattle feeding stuffs were suspected as being the cause, this was not proved but the farmer had the food destroyed as a precautionary measure.

Berry Pomeroy:- This scheme is dependant on the Borough of Totnes awaiting Ministry approval for the improvement of their sewerage system.

Compton and Marlton:- A scheme for enlarging these works is awaiting transaction.

Ugborough:- A scheme for the modernisation of these works was prepared and is awaiting Ministry approval.

## 4. Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949

Action here is designed to be mainly preventative as opposed to curative. This is effected in large measure by routine visits to refuse tips, sewage works and other vulnerable premises and the annual treatment of sewers.

The Council has continued to share the services of a Rodent Operator with Totnes Borough Council.
