To His Worship the Mayor, and to the Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Royal Tunbridge Wells.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Borough for the Year ended December 31st, 1940.

In view of the necessity for economy in the use of paper, The Ministry of Health suggests that interim reports should be made at this time. The usual records have been prepared and preserved, in order that after the War a report may be made dealing more fully with the period from 1940 to the end of the last complete year.

A considerable extension of the immunising of children against Diphtheria occurred towards the close of 1940, largely owing to official broadcasts on its importance. This important work has been continued and is still continuing.

The health of the population under war conditions stood up to the strain remarkably well. This result was surprising even to those with inside knowledge of the risks of shelter conditions. There is no doubt that the good results obtained were at least partly due to the many years of patient teaching of personal hygiene, and to the spread of knowledge of health matters, by means of the arrangements which the Council has made through its various health clinics.

No person under 25 years of age died of any of the acute infectious diseases - a new record. One death occurred from cerebro-spinal fever, and one from acute encephalitis, but both were persons in the 55-65 age group. Of the total deaths, 11.2 per cent were those of persons under 45 years; 69.1 per cent were those of persons over 65 years of age - a higher proportion of old persons than ever before.

METEOROLOGICAL NOTES: Records have been fully kept, but for reasons of paper economy are not published with this Report. 1,740 hours 12 minutes of bright sunshine were recorded, being 158 hours above the 26 years' average. Rainfall - 30.54 inches - was nearly a quarter of an inch below the average.

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF: There were no changes of staff during the year.

LABORATORY FACILITIES: The services of the Public Health Laboratory were made full use of during 1940, 849 specimens being examined as compared with 619 in 1939. In addition to these, 193 specimens were sent to the County Laboratories for various examinations.

20 samples of milk were forwarded for bacteriological test at the County Laboratories under the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936; those which failed to satisfy the prescribed standard were investigated and tests repeated.

12 samples of water were collected from the springs, reservoirs and mains supplying the Borough with drinking water and sent to the County Laboratories for bacteriological analysis. A number of these showed the presence of contamination in the ground round some of the springs. After consultation with the Borough Water Engineer, it was decided to chlorinate the various water supplies. Chlorination of the main water supply was commenced in December, 1940, and at Saints Hill in January, 1941. Further analyses since these dates have given uniformly good results.

BOROUGH FEVER HOSPITAL: The number of patients admitted to the Hospital during 1940 was 192, as compared with 89 in 1939, (108 of these were patients from the Borough itself, 11 from Southborough, 12 from Eastbourne, 6 from Bexhill, 4 from Hastings, 1 from Ticehurst, 2 from Cranbrook and 48 from H. H. Forces). Grave difficulties were experienced in obtaining sufficient staff to run the Hospital. A debt of gratitude is due to the Matron and the Sister who undertook an exceptional amount of nursing and household duties in order to cope with times of extra stress caused by this shortage. There has been a universal difficulty in obtaining staff for fever hospitals. This is accentuated by the lack of suitable accommodation for the staff in the Borough Administrative Block, which the needs of the Hospital have long outgrown.

THE TUNBRIDGE WELLS AND DISTRICT MATERNITY HOME: 261 confinements took place in the Home during 1940. Of these, 124 mothers were residents of Tunbridge Wells: this represents 30 per cent of the total Tunbridge Wells births for the year.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE SERVICES: The Infant Welfare Centre at II, Crescent Road continued in use throughout the year, as did the branch Centre held in the Congregational Church, Rusthall High Street. The total number of attendances at the Centres during 1940 was 12,106, easily a record number. Medical consultations numbered 3,723, as compared with 2,900 in 1939.

There was also an increase in attendances at Dr. Morison's Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinic, and in patients attending Dr. Buchan's Dental Clinic.

Administrations of general anaesthetics 86.

Grants totalling £6. 7s. 6d., towards the cost of dentures for expectant and nursing mothers were made in four cases during the year.

Assistance in Necessitous Cases.

8,517 pints of milk were supplied free during the period 1st. January to 21st. July (the date when the National Milk Scheme came into operation), at a cost to the Borough Council of £107. In addition, food and drugs (dried milks, cod liver oil and malt etc.) to the value of £55. ls. 7d., were issued free of cost.

Child Life Protection.

On December 31st, 1940, there were within the Borough 106 children under the care of 30 registered foster mothers, as compared with 103 children boarded-out with 33 foster mothers at the end of the previous year (Note: These figures include St. Christopher's Nursery College with 70-80 children). 284 visits of inspection were paid during the year.

REGISTRATION OF NURSING HOMES: 11 Homes with 111 beds were registered at the commencement of the year, as compared with 12 Homes providing 117 beds at the end of 1940.

WATER SUPPLY: Chlorination of the main water supply at Pembury was commenced on 20th. December, 1940, and at Saints Hill on 10th. January. 1941.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE: There were no alterations during the year under review.

SWINNING BATHS: The water of the Indoor Bath continued to give satisfactory analyses.

At the Open Air Bath algae caused green discoloration of the water, and suitable treatment with copper sulphate was applied to remove this trouble.

NON-NOTIFIABLE INFECTIOUS DISEASES: During the year under review, there were 591 known cases of German Measles, 132 of Chicken Pox and one case of Mumps.

DISINFECTION AND DISINFESTATION: 331 disinfectant baths were given to 81 persons during the year, their personal clothing being disinfected in the steam sack disinfector in the Cleansing Centre.

There is need for a large steam disinfector of Wington-Lyon or similar type, so that blankets, sheets, and especially mattresses, may be adequately dealt with. Spraying these with "Bacterol" chemical disinfectant is carried out in a cellar fitted up for the purpose. Bulk disinfection when needed is carried out in a Wington-Lyon Disinfector at Dislingbury Smallpox Hospital, some miles from the Town.

Disinfection of rooms was carried out on 115 occasions.
