

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Royal Tunbridge Wells.

Mr . Mayor , Ladies and Gentlemen ,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the health of the Borough for the year 1967.

Statistics: The mid-year population of the Borough as estimated by the Registrar General was 43,490. This figure once again shows a slight increase from the previous year.

Deaths from all causes totalled 694 (268 males and 426 females). The crude death rate per 1,000 population was 16.0 but the application of the comparability factor of 0.56 gives a corrected death rate of 9.0 compared with 11.2.for England and Wales.

The total number of registered live births was 675 (344 males and 331 females). The adjusted birth rate per 1,000 population was 17.0, the crude birth rate being 15.5; the rate for England and Wales was 17.2.

The Infant Mortality rate (i.e.number of deaths under one year per 1,000 live births) was 19.0 compared with 18.3 for England and Wales. The Neo-Natal death rate (the number of deaths of infants under four weeks) was 8.9 the corresponding death rate for England and Wales being 12.5.

No Maternal Deaths occurred during the year under review.

The number of deaths from Cancer of the lung and bronchus was 31 (25 males and 6 females) and this figure has only once been exceeded during the past ten years during which period 267 deaths have occurred from this disease in the Borough.

There were 418 notifications of infectious disease during 1967, Measles accounting for 384 of this number. No cases of either Diphtheria or Acute Poliomyelitis were notified and as in previous years I would like to make my usual appeal for all parents to avail themselves of the facilities offered for vaccination against these two diseases.

I am also pleased to report there were no cases of food poisoning reported during the year and the staff of the Health Department continue to impress upon food handlers the importance of cleanliness and personal hygiene.

I am indebted to the County Medical Officer for the figures appearing on Page 21.of this Report, giving the number of persons vaccinated against Poliomyelitis and Smallpox and also the number of persons immunised against Diphtheria and Whooping Cough and Tetanus.

Once again I would like to thank Mr.Willans, Chief Public Health Inspector, for his help and co-operation throughout the year and also the other members of the Public Health Department staff for their loyalty and hard work during 1967.

I would also like to express my appreciation to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their interest in the work of the Department and to the Chief Officers for their kind co-operation.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

DOMICILIARY MIDWIFERY.

The County Council arranges for the free attendance of midwives upon patients who are to be confined at home. The name and address of the appropriate midwife for any particular district is usually known to the patient's doctor, but can be obtained from the District Office of the County Council.

HOME NURSING SERVICE.

The County Council provides a service free of charge for the attendance on persons whose doctors require them to be nursed in their own homes. The nurses attendance is normally arranged by the doctor, but the name and address of the appropriate nurse for any particular district is obtainable from the District Office of the County Council.

DOMESTIC HELP SERVICE.

Domestic Help service may be provided in households where it is needed owing to the presence of a person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally subnormal, aged or a child not over compulsory school age, but only where there is no able-bodied person in the household capable of carrying out the necessary household duties.

NIGHT AND EVENING SERVICE.

Evening Service is provided for elderly people who are bedridden or housebound and have no one to assist them to prepare for the night and includes the provision of a light meal or hot drink and attention to fires. Night Service is provided, for no longer than three weeks unless there are

exceptional circumstances, for the care of seriously ill people who are living in their own homes and who need attention during the night. In some cases the service is provided for one to three nights a week to give relief to relatives.

FAMILY CARE SERVICE.

After consultation with the Children's Department, this service is provided for the short-term care of children in their own homes during the absence of the mother by reason of admission to hospital for illness or confinement or in other special circumstances. Help is given only to families where care of at least two children is involved and the period of service is limited to three months.

FAMILY WELFARE SERVICE.

This service is provided, with the parent's consent, in households where the habits, behaviour and standards of living of the family are much below those generally accepted in the society in which they live. The three main objectives of the service are to raise the standard of living of the families, to improve the welfare of the children, and to keep the families together and prevent their break-up. Intensive training for a period of three months is given and this is succeeded by a follow-on service for nine months. In families where there is medical evidence of mental subnormality the continuance of the service after the initial period of three months may be approved for not more than twelve hours a week until the youngest child reaches compulsory school age.

Two accidents are worthy of note and details are as follows:-

1) A male Glass-cutter, when moving a full glass crate standing on edge, the crate overbalanced and fell over sideways and on to the employee, pinning both his legs underneath. The nature and extent of injury consisted of bruised left leg and thigh, twisted and bruised right ankle. Abrasions to face.

An investigation was carried out and it would appear that this employee did not ask for assistance from the available labour but attempted to move the heavy load (15 cwt. approximately) on a bogie with the aid of one assistant.

2) An unusual accident hazard was noted in the form of the flexible type door which is now increasingly seen in shop and warehouse premises. These doors, usually of thick rubber or plastic, are normally of the double swing type and in this particular instance some one had placed a box of goods about a foot high on the floor immediately behind one of a pair of such doors. Another worker tripped over the hidden object and fell heavily through the flexible door. Had this been a pair of solid swing doors the box would have prevented the door from opening and an accident would have been unlikely.
