To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Royal Tunbridge Wells.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the health of the Borough for the year 1969.

The Vital Statistics of the Borough show that the population as estimated by the Registrar General at mid-year 1969 was 44,930 compared with 43,930 for 1968.

The number of births in the Borough was 646 (323 males and 323 females) compared with 714 for the previous year. The corrected birth rate was 15.8 the rate for England and Wales being 16.3.

The number of deaths was 721 (278 males and 443 females) as compared with 764 in 1968. The crude death rate for the Borough was 8.8. The standardised death rate was 9.9 as against the death rate for England and Wales as a whole which was 11.9. Diseases of the heart and circulation was again the main cause of death.

Deaths of infants under one year numbered eleven, giving an infant mortality rate per thousand live births of 17.0, the rate for England and Wales being 18.0.

The number of notifiable infectious diseases recorded in the Borough was 78 of which forty-four were Measles.

On Page 21 of the Report details are given of the number of persons immunised and vaccinated during the year. This information is supplied by the County Medical Officer to whom I offer my thanks.

At the end of September the Mass Radiography Unit commenced fortnightly visits to the town and during the three months (September to December) the number of persons x-rayed was 1,012.

Two cases of typhoid occurred in travellers returning from holiday in the Mediterranean area. A great many contacts were placed on surveillance, but fortunately no secondary cases occurred. From time to time old scourges such as typhoid, diphtheria, and poliomyelitis, still prevalent elsewhere, will recur unless we continue to protect ourselves adequately by immunisation, and to be effective this latter must be performed in ample time before exposure to risk.

I would like to record my gratitude to my Chairman and to the Members of the Health Committee, for their interest and support. Also to my colleagues and fellow chief officers, for their generous co-operation with the newcomer. And lastly to Mr.Willans for all his willing help, and to the staff of the Health Department, and also for the compilation and execution of the work recorded in the report.

### AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

### DOMICILIARY MIDWIFERY.

The County Council arranges for the free attendance of midwives upon patients who are to be confined at home. The name and address of the appropriate midwife for any particular district is usually known to the patient's doctor, but can be obtained from the District Office of the County Council.

### HOME NURSING SERVICE.

The County Council provides a service free of charge for the attendance on persons whose doctors require them to be nursed in their own homes. The nurses attendance is normally arranged by the doctor, but the name and address of the appropriate nurse for any particular district is obtained from the District Office of the County Council.

### DOMESTIC HELP SERVICE.

Domestic Help service may be provided in households where it is needed owing to the presence of a person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally subnormal, aged or a child not over compulsory school age, but only where there is no able-bodied person in the household capable of carrying out the necessary household duties.

### NIGHT AND EVENING SERVICE.

Evening Service is provided for elderly people who are bedridden or housebound and have no one to assist them to prepare for the night and includes the provision of a light meal or hot drink and attention to fires. Night Service is provided, for no longer than three weeks unless there are exceptional circumstances, for the care of seriously ill people who are living in their own homes and who need attention during the night. In some cases the service is provided for one to three nights a week to give relief to relatives.

### FAMILY CARE SERVICE.

After consultation with the Children's Department, this service is provided for the short-term care of children in their own homes during the absence of the mother by reason of admission to hospital for illness or confinement or in other special circumstances. Help is given only to families where care of a least two children is involved and the period of service is limited to three months.

### FAMILY WELFARE SERVICE.

This service is provided with the parent's consent, in households where the habits, behaviour and standards of living of the family are much below those generally accepted in the society in which they live. The three main objectives of the service are to raise the standard of living of the families, to improve the welfare of the children, and to keep the families together and prevent their break-up. Intensive training for a period of three months is given and this is succeeded by a follow-on service for nine months. In families where there is medical evidence of mental subnormality the continuance of the service after the initial period of three months may be approved for not more than twelve hours a week until the youngest child reaches compulsory school age.

Warning letters were sent in respect of 12 Food complaints and 7 dirty milk bottles.

A sample of Sausage was found to have a meat content of 62% instead of the required 65% and 1 sample of Sausage was found to contain undeclared Preservative - warning letters were sent in each case.

Gerber tests carried out on Channel Island Milk supplied to a local shop by a farmer outside the Borough revealed fat deficiencies of  $12\frac{1}{2}\%$  and  $7\frac{1}{2}\%$  (Fat content 3.5 and 3.7 instead of the required 4%).

A formal Sample was submitted to the Public Analyst who confirmed these findings as follows:-

"Fat 3.50, Solids not fat 8.20 per cent. No fat adhering to the container. The Freezing Point Depression (0.542 degrees C.) indicates no added water. The sample was 12.5 per cent deficient on the minimum amount of fat". On being informed that the milk was below the required standard the proprietor of the shop immediately discontinued sales. The facts were reported to the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food.
