To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Royal Tunbridge Wells

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the health of the Borough for the year 1971.

The estimated mid-year population of the Borough, given by the Registrar-General, was 44,610, compared with 45,800 in 1970.

The total number of registered live births in the Borough was 697 (362 males and 335 females), compared with 754 in the previous year. The crude birth rate was 15.6 per 1,000 population, the corrected birth rate being 17.2 compared with 16.0 for England and Wales.

The number of deaths from all causes was 677 (259 males and 418 females), compared with 745 in 1970. The crude death rate for the Borough was 15.2. The corrected death rate was 8.2 and the rate for England and Wales was 11.6.

Deaths of infants under one year numbered 12, giving an infant mortality rate per thousand live births of 17.0. The rate for England and Wales was 18.0. The Neo-Natal death rate (the number of deaths of infants under four weeks) was 10.0.

There were 33 deaths from Cancer of the Lung and Bronchus (24 males and 9 females), compared with 32 last year.

The number of notifiable infectious diseases recorded in the Borough was 171, compared with 524 in 1970.

The Mass Radiography Unit continued fortnightly visits to the Borough in 1971, and the number of persons attending for x-ray during the year was 2,129 compared with 3,263 in 1970. On page 15 of this report, figures are given showing the number of persons immunised and vaccinated during the year under review.

It will be appreciated that this report is an attempt to record the quality of life in our own small community, this in turn reflecting the work of our medical and social services against an environmental background in the planning and improving of which so much time is voluntarily spent by our Civic representatives. This is supplemented by a vast volume of voluntary effort by individuals both inside and outside these services, and to these I should like to record my indebtedness for their help on so many occasions during the year.

However, consideration of the facts of life and death in this report will, I hope, remind us that our personal habits and choice in our mode of life would be as important in improving the health of our community and reduction of the pollution of our environment, as would thought and kindness in caring for our neighbours.

Once again my sincere thanks are due to Mr. Willans and the staff of the Department, and to all those too numerous to mention, who have so patiently assisted in the compilation of these statistics.

### Laboratory Service

The Public Health Laboratory Service, under the Directorship of Dr. A.L. Furniss, provided excellent facilities during the year for the examination of specimens, and full co-operation with the staff was maintained. Valuable facilities are also available in the Pathological Departments of the following hospitals: Kent and Sussex, Pembury, Sevenoaks and Orpington.

### Staff Medical Examinations

During the year fifty-one medical examinations were carried out for superannuation purposes, and five for Heavy Goods Vehicle Licences.

### International Vaccination Certificates

These are authenticated on request, in accordance with international agreements. In co-operation with the immigration authorities, persons arriving in this country from infected or suspected areas without valid certificates are kept under surveillance by the Health Department.

### Health Services

### Ambulance Facilities

Enquiries relating to ambulance service matters and requests for ambulance transport are dealt with by the Kent County Council Ambulance Service from their station at 86a, Speldhurst Road, Southborough (Tel. Tunbridge Wells 23222).

### Domiciliary Midwifery

The County Council arranges for the free attendance of midwives upon patients who are to be confined at home. The name and address of the appropriate midwife for any particular District is usually known to the patient's doctor, but can be obtained from the Area Office of the County Council.

### Home Nursing Service

The County Council provides free of charge a service for the attendance on persons whose doctors require them to be nursed in their own homes. The nurse's attendance is normally arranged by the doctor, but the name and address of the appropriate nurse for any particular District is obtainable from the Area Office of the Kent County Council.

### Home Help Service

Home help service may be provided in households where it is needed owing to the presence of a person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, aged, handicapped as a result of having suffered from illness or congenital deformity, or a child not over compulsory school age, but only where there is no ablebodied person in the household capable of carrying out the necessary household duties.

### Night and Evening Service

Evening service is provided for elderly people who are bedridden or housebound and have no one to assist them to prepare for the night, and includes the provision of a light meal or hot drink and attention to fires. Night service is provided, for no longer than three weeks unless there are exceptional circumstances, for the care of seriously ill people who are living in their own homes and who need attention during the night. In some cases the service is provided for one to three nights a week to give relief to relatives.

### Family Care Service

This service is provided for the short-term care of children in their own homes during the absence of the mother by reason of admission to hospital for illness or confinement, or in other special circumstances. Help is given to families where care of at least two children is involved and the period of service is limited to three months.

### Family Welfare Service

This service is provided with the parent's consent in households where the habits, behaviour and standards of living of the family are much below those generally accepted in the society in which they live. The three main objectives of the service are to raise the standard of living of the families, to improve the welfare of the children, and to keep the families together and prevent their break-up. Intensive training for a period of three months is given and this is succeeded by a follow-on service for nine months. In families where there is medical evidence of mental subnormality, the continuance of the service after the initial period of three months may be approved for not more than twelve hours a week until the youngest child reaches compulsory school age.

Fluoride Content - The Hayes Den, Pembury Boreholes and Saints Hill supplies have a natural fluoride content of 0.2 ppm.

### 2. Drainage and Sewerage

Re-sewering of part of the southern drainage area, i.e., the conversion from combined to separate sewers, has continued during the year. No connections have been made as yet to the new sewers.

Contracts are in progress for the construction of a new sewage disposal plant and sludge treatment plant at the Southern Works; the former is due to be completed about November 1972, whereas the sludge plant (mechanical presses) should be in operation by April or May 1972.

During the year further development of both private and Council estates have taken place within the areas at present served by gravity sewers and such developments include their own drainage systems. No existing soil sewers have been relaid nor have any extensions thereto been constructed apart from estate developments.

The urgently needed new schemes for sewage disposal are:

(a) the extension to the Northern Sewage Works

(b) new pumping equipment at Hurstwood Pumping Station

(c) separation works in the northern area and the Hurstwood drainage area.
