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

To the Chairman and Members of the Tutbury Rural District Council. Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1954.

In considering the Vital Statistics, it must be borne in mind that in a district of this size, small changes in certain totals make a considerable difference in the various Rates. The Death Rate is considerably below the national Rate and the Birth Rate continues to increase slightly.

Infectious Diseases have been slightly less prevalent than in 1953 except for Measles which showed a typical biennial fall.

There has again been a considerable number of children immunised, and no cases of Diphtheria were notified. Further improvements are still desirable, as there is by now little opportunity for children to acquire natural immunity, and approximately 57% of children under 15 years are unimmunised. A continued drop in the numbers of children immunised will increase the possibility of a recurrence of epidemics of diphtheria.

While it is too soon to ascribe the marked fall in the incidence of Whooping Cough in the District to the County Council's Immunisation Scheme, it is to be hoped that this scheme will produce results comparable to those achieved by Diphtheria Immunisation.

114 Council houses and 39 private houses were completed and occupied during the year.

While this number compares favourably with similar districts, I feel that some two or three apartment dwellings should be included in future programmes to provide for elderly or childless couples, to avoid using the standard five apartment houses uneconomically, and facilitate the programme of demolition.

I have to thank the Members of the Council, the Council Officers and the Health Department Staff for their help and co-operation.

SECTION C

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER

The supply of water to the greater part of the Rural District is by the South Staffordshire Waterworks Company, and the quality and quantity have been satisfactory.

The under-mentioned properties were connected to the new mains during the year: —

Dunstall—4 dwelling houses

Tatenhill-12 dwelling houses

Yoxall—4 dwelling houses

Tutbury Parish is supplied from a well and reservoir by the Rural District Council. The quality of the water is satisfactory.

Bacteriological examination and chemical analysis have been made of this water, and it was found that the Coli Aerogenes Content (presumptive Coli) varied between nil and 25 per 100 ml. after 48 hours incubation at 37° C. This increase over the past years is probably due to the breakdown of the chlorinating apparatus, which has not yet been repaired owing to difficulty in obtaining replacements. The Chemical analysis showed the water to be organically of satisfactory quality, but very hard.

The hardness before boiling was 45.5°

The hardness after boiling was 34.5°

Temporary hardness 11.0°

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

A Scheme for sewerage in part of Dunstall Parish has been completed.

It is regretted that the scheme for the new sewage disposal plant at Yoxall which has been approved in principle by the Ministry of Local Government and Planning cannot yet be proceeded with due to the restrictions on capital expenditure. Serious nuisance arises in the parish owing to the complete absence of a plant.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

The work has been of a satisfactory standard throughout the year.

CLOSET ACCOMODATION

16 privies or pan closets have been abolished and water closets substituted by owners during the year.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

There were no complaints regarding smoke nuisances during the year.

CAMPING SITES

A privately owned caravan site to site 24 caravans has been approved at Rolleston.

SWIMMING BATHS

The only swimming bath in the district is a privately owned one in the village of Rolleston. This appears to be well managed and supervised.

DISINFECTION AND DISINFESTATION

10 houses were disinfected after the occurrence of intectious diseases, deaths, etc.

8 infestations by fleas and other insects were overcome by treatment with a 10% D.D.T. solution and Gammexane smoke generators.

Measles showed a typical biennial fall and the figures for scarlet fever and whooping cough showed a slight increase.

IMMUNISATION AGAINST DIPHTHERIA

Immunisation against Diphtheria has been carried out as usual at the five Infant Welfare Centres in the District. The response is fairly satisfactory. Tribute must be paid to the two Health Visitors in the District for their excellent work in this connection.

There have again been no cases of Diphtheria, the last reported case being in 1945.

ANNUAL REPORT

SANITARY INSPECTOR 1954

To the Chairman and Members of the Tutbury Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1954.

The year was notable for the Council's decision to commence a weekly collection of nightsoil from the whole area apart from that served by the public sewers, as from the 1st April, 1955. As far as the centre of Yoxall parish is concerned, this is purely a temporary measure pending the approval by the Ministry of Housing and Local Government to the new sewerage scheme, which will serve the centre of Yoxall parish. It is hoped that the long awaited approval to the scheme will be received in the near future as the need for the scheme in this built up area of the parish is now urgent.

Thanks are due to the staff of the public health department, and I am grateful for the excellent support received from the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee.

WATER SUPPLY

16 samples of water from private sources were submitted for chemical and bacteriological reports and 11 samples found to be unfit for drinking purposes. The occupiers of premises involved in adverse reports were advised to boil their water before use. Of the 11 unfit wells sampled, 7 serve properties where no mains are available. The owners of 5 were requested to carry out certain works, and the other 2 lie on the line of a proposed new water main.

The owners of the 4 unfit wells where mains water is available were requested to connect to the mains, and this work is in hand.

A total of 20 existing properties has been connected to the new mains during the year.

Housing

REPAIRS

The revision of the Rent Restriction Acts will enable owners to maintain their property in a sound condition. The increased cost of repairs has for a long time prevented much needed major works of repair, and the Rent Revision will help to prevent the deterioration of property into demolition category.

IMPROVEMENTS

17 applications for improvement grants were approved during the year.

The Ministry revised their standard for improved dwellings in order to encourage owners to improve their property, and to prolong the life of sub-standard property, as a result, there was an increase in the number of applications.

SLUM CLEARANCE

9 premises were the subject of either demolition or closing orders during the year. Such a step is only taken where the owner fails to make an offer to put the premises into a habitable condition. The premises were all in a delapidated condition.

Sanitary Accommodation

The pails or privies at 16 premises were converted to water closets.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

COLLECTION

Three Shelvoke & Drewry 11 cub. yard side-loading refuse collection vehicles are used for the collection of dry household refuse in the District, and a fortnightly collection of refuse is made from all premises. Few complaints have been received, and satisfactory service has been maintained.

A comprehensive scheme for night soil collection from the whole area has been commenced during 1954. A detailed survey of those parts of the area not served by the public sewer was carried out in preparation for the scheme. Approximately 600 premises were visited.

DISPOSAL

Every endeavour is made to cover the household refuse at the tips with suitable covering material, and the tips are sprayed with insecticide at regular intervals during the warmer weather.

SALVAGE

WASTE PAPER

The collection of waste paper was resumed at the end of the year. The merchants offered an increased price for the waste paper and the accumulation at the depot was sold.

SCRAP METAL AND TEXTILES

These materials are collected with the household refuse. The following are the salvage returns for the year:—

INSPECTION OF FOOD PREMISES

Several new food premises have been opened during the vear and the premises were brought up to the standard required before the sale of food was commenced. Further improvements were also made to existing premises.

Talks have been given to canteen staffs on food hygiene and regular visits are paid to canteens in order to ensure that new staff are aware of the need for it.

The Headmasters of the Tutbury and Barton-under-Needwood Secondary Modern Schools again kindly arranged for talks on food hygiene to those pupils about to leave school, in order that any who might be going into the catering trade would be conversant with the principles of food hygiene.

ICE CREAM PREMISES

There are now 43 premises on the register, an increase of 1 as compared with 1953. The vendors deal mainly with pre-packed products, which is a safeguard in Public Health.

42 samples of ice cream were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for bacteriological reports. All reports were satisfactory.

SHOPS ACT, 1950

The above Act affects all shops where there are employees, 85 inspections and 17 re-inspections were carried out, and informal notices served upon the owners of 4 shops. The defects have been remedied in 3 cases and are in hand in the other.

LICENSED BY LOCAL AUTHORITY

There are 14 moveable dwellings licensed by the Tutbury Rural District Council to be sited in the area. These are inspected regularly to ensure that the sanitary arrangements are satisfactory.
