SIR,

I have the honour to present herewith my Annual Report for the year 1914.

It has been an eventful year, a year that will stand out prominently in the annals of our country as marking the commencement of the greatest war in the world's history. A war waged with all the resources of our great Empire against the forces of a malignant militarism, cloaked by the name of "Kultur," it threatened civilized Europe as the plague might endanger the healthy population of our seaports and cities.

In our work as a Port Sanitary Authority, we wage a continual war against unseen foes in the form of Foreign Infectious diseases, which are transported from country to country by the peaceful Mercantile Marine and which become a menace to the Public Health when they gain a foothold in our midst. Our equipment as the first line of defence to combat these dangers has been made more efficient during this eventful year, and the work this entailed I am pleased to say, was completed before the European War broke out. We are well prepared to deal with an increase of sea-borne diseases which we may expect during and after war, by the action of the Board over which you preside in re-organising and increasing your River Staff, and supplying a new steam launch the "George C. Coates." This well appointed craft has proved to be a great acquisition in dealing with the large number of vessels arriving in the Tyne Ports.

On June 5th, John Russell, your Senior Assistant Inspector was appointed Chief Inspector. Under his experienced guidance the staff are carrying out their responsible duties in a loyal and satisfactory manner.

On August 5th, I received a telegram from the Admiralty to proceed to Southampton to take up my duties as Surgeon, R.N.V.R. Dr. Baker of North Shields readily agreed to act for me in my absence, and I left a few hours later. During the month of August I had the honour of superintending the fitting out of H.M. Hospital Ship "Plassy," and have been on the staff of the same vessel on active service ever since.

I appreciate the way in which the Authority have facilitated my arrangements, and their good wishes.

Regulations as to Food Act, 1908.

Inspector Russell has regularly inspected the cargoes of vessels arriving in the Tyne and Albert Edward Docks, and at the Dunston Co-operative Flour Mills.

Tyne Dock.

The foodstuffs imported into this Dock during the year by steamers from the United States, Canada, Russia, Portugal, Argentine, Australia, Norway and Sweden have been inspected:—Grain, 55,033 tons; Condensed Milk, 8,605 cases; Margarine, 366 cases; Butter, 983 kegs; Game, 12 cases; Fish, 20 cases; Fruit, 1,101 cases; Tomatoes, 109 cases. The consignments were found in good condition.

Unsound Food.

The Collector of H.M. Customs detained for our inspection at Tyne Dock, per the s.s. "Bessheim" and s.s. "Sterling" from Christiania, during the year the following consignments:—

Forty-eight casks of Tripe. Four of these containing 8 cwts. 3 qrs. 13 lbs. were seized as unfit for human food, and with the consent of the Importers were destroyed.

Thirty-two casks of Pigs' Maws, containing 4 tons 3 cwts. 2 qrs. 8 lbs. This is an illegal importation. The packages bore the official certificate of the Government of Norway. A notice as required by Article 111 (5) of the Public Health (Foreign Meat) Regulations, 1908, was served upon the Importer, and the meat was returned to the port of shipment.

Three casks of Offal containing 4 cwts. were seized as unfit for food, and with the consent of the Importer were destroyed.

Two casks of Cows' Udders were examined, and one, weighing 3 cwts. 7 lbs. was found in a decomposed condition, and with the Importer's consent was destroyed.

Albert Edward Dock.

Cargoes consisting of 5,080 tons of Wheat from Australia were inspected in this Dock, and were found in good condition.

Dunston Flour Mills.

Wheat cargoes consisting of 38,247 tons were inspected at the wharf of the above Mills from Canadian, Indian and Australian ports, and with the exception of 4,312 bags damaged by sweating and condemned with the sanction of the Owners, the remainder was found in good condition.

Mill Dam Wharf, South Shields.

Eleven cargoes of Potatoes, ten from Scotland and one from Denmark, were inspected and were found in good condition.

Fish Quay, North Shields.

All vessels arriving with White Fish and Herrings have been inspected daily at the Fish Quay. The fish landed from the boats was found to be of good quality.

Special Cargoes Inspected.

Among the different cargoes examined by the Inspectors were the undermentioned :-

Emigrants.

The Emigrant vessels coming to the Tyne have been visited by the Medical Officer and Inspectors on arrival, and kept under supervision whilst in Port.

Information as to Emigrants debarking here and proceeding overland to other British ports, continues to be forwarded to the Medical Officers of Health of the respective Ports.

4,306 Emigrants have passed through the Port during 1914, en route to America via Liverpool, Southampton, Bristol, and Glasgow. All were found well before leaving this Port.

In addition to the daily routine inspection of the sanitation of vessels, several special visits have to be made to many vessels on reports on sickness, and in some cases extensive precautions are required in dealing with actual cases of infectious diseases.

214 revisits have been made by our Inspectors during the year, in order to have the above defects remedied to our satisfaction on written or verbal notice.

Water-Boats and Water Supply to Ships in Port.

The water-boats, 18 in number, have been examined as usual, and the tanks found in good condition.

In 29 cases the *drinking water* of ships, which came from Ports infected or suspected to be infected, with cholera, has been changed, and the purification of the tanks has been seen to by the Inspector, acting under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health.

Advice as to Sickness

on shipboard, and other matters, continue to be received from and forwarded to the Health Departments of other British Port Sanitary Authorities.

Clothing and Bedding.

10 vessels and several lots of clothing or bedding have been disinfected. 334 old beds have been burnt, and 4 lots of filthy clothing have been destroyed, on account of infection.

Passenger Steamers.

The Passenger Steamers arriving continue to be regularly visited and examined.

Smoke Nuisance.

The Inspector reports that it has not been necessary to take any action against Masters of Steamers for the evolution of dense smoke during 1914.

Fishing Boats.

The total arrival of fishing vessels at the Quay, North Shields, steam and sailing, is 10,282,* 3,166 Trawlers and 7,116 Herring Boats, as compared with a total of 15,384 in the previous year, 12 of these, in a foul condition, were cleansed and deodorized on notice from the Inspector. The rest were in good order.

Regulations.

Copies of Regulations issued have, as usual, been posted on all ferry landings, and delivered on board of vessels in the Port.

Cholera and Plague.

No cases of Cholera occurred in the Port during the year 1914. Six vessels have been fumigated on account of coming from a plague-infected port, and 126 dead rats were found after the fumigation and cremated.

Steel Screw Launch "Geo. C. Coates."

Built by Messrs. W. Hepple & Co., Ltd., South Shields, and engined by Messrs. The Shields Engineering and Dry Dock Co., North Shields, from designs by Mr. Henry Sanderson, Consulting Engineer, Quayside, Newcastle-on-Tyne, under whose supervision the launch was constructed.

The length between perpendiculars is 70 feet.

Breadth, moulded 13 ,,

Depth, ,, 6 feet 6 inches,

having straight stem and eliptical stern and flush deck fore and aft.

Good crew accommodation is provided in the fore cabin, having all the necessary equipment and being well lighted.

The steering house constructed of teak is provided on fore deck.

The saloon is constructed on the break deck principal, finished throughout with plain oak and provided with suspended ambulance guides to enable the stretcher to be slung at a convenient height.


The machinery consists of one set of inverted triple expansion surface condensing engines having separate condenser and independent centrifugal circulating pump.

Steam is supplied by one cylindrical steel boiler, working at 200 lbs a square inch, under Howdon system of forced draught or natural draught as desired.

Electric light is supplied by one steam dynamo, and the launch is provided with portable clusters to send on board of vessels when transmitting patients at night time.

Steam connections are provided for disinfecting purposes either on board ship or at hospital.

A speed of over 12 knots was attained at the trial, and general satisfaction was expressed by all concerned.



Launches.

The new launch "Geo. C. Coates," constructed by Messrs. Hepple & Co., Ltd., of South Shields, was taken over by the Tyne Port Sanitary Authority, on February 25th, and has done good work since in the inspection and disinfection of vessels. She fulfils all our requirements, is speedy, and works satisfactorily.

The old launch "John Foster Spence" was taken over by Messrs. Hepple & Co., Ltd., as part payment for the "Geo. C. Coates." She has since been sold to Sunderland.

The motor boat "R.S.H." has been found to be very useful in the inspection of vessels; being of shallow draft, she is easily handled and can go alongside of quays and docks at low water.
