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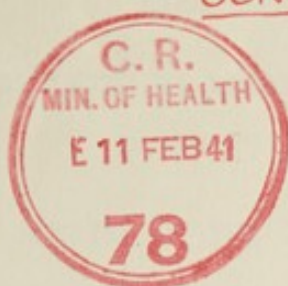

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for the year, 1940, on the existing conditions of the Tyne Port and of the work of your Officers during this period.

War conditions continue to impose restrictions upon the information which it is advisable to include in this Report, and I have endeavoured therefore, to confine it to statements of a general nature relative to the work on which the Staff have been engaged.

Merchant shipping conditions have, as usual, received great attention, and particular care has been exercised to effect improvement of conditions on board without undue delay to the shipping concerned.

The health of crews has been carefully supervised, and no case of major infectious disease has occurred.

During the severe weather of the early months of the year, an increase in the number of respiratory diseases occurred, reaching among the coloured crew on board one vessel, the proportions of a slight epidemic.

An increase in the number of cases of malaria occurring prior to arrival at Tyne was also noted.

Two further members of the Staff have been temporarily released to undertake other work of National Importance.

Once again, I am pleased to give sincere tribute to the efficient and cheerful work of all Members of the Staff, and to the Members of the Committee for their interest, and I feel sure, that despite a certain amount of disorganisation and readjustment consequent to the war, with the same help, the work will continue at it's present satisfactory level.

Close co-operation has been maintained throughout the year with the Ministry of Shipping and the Port Health Authorities of other ports with a view to ensuring that defects detected are adequately followed up and rectified either here or elsewhere at the earliest opportunity.

Information of such action taken is also transmitted to the port primarily responsible for the detection of the defects under consideration.

SOURCE OF WATER SUPPLY.

The arrangements for the supply of water to shipping remains substantially the same as previously, in so far as the sources of supply are concerned.

Where water is supplied by means of waterboats, a system of partial chlorination has been enforced with very satisfactory results.

The Bacterial Analyses have been consistently good, and form a marked contrast to those previously obtained which formed the basis of a special report on the subject.

PORT SANITARY REGULATIONS, 1933.Experience of working of Article 16.

No legal proceedings were undertaken by this Authority under the Provisions of this Article.

PSITTACOSIS.Parrots (Prohibition of Import) Regulations, 1930.

16 vessels arrived at Tyne Ports with 25 budgerigars on board. These birds all appeared to be in a healthy condition.

No cases of Psittacosis (Parrot Disease) occurred during the year.

FOOD INSPECTION.

(1) No legal actions were taken under the Public Health (Imported Food) Regulations, 1925, the Public Health (Imported Food) Regulations, 1937, the Public Health (Preservatives etc. in Food) Regulations, 1925 to 1939, the Public Health (Imported Milk) Regulations, 1926, and the Public Health (Shellfish) Regulations, 1934.

(2) There are no Shellfish Beds within the jurisdiction of the Tyne Port Health Authority.

CO-OPERATION WITH OUTSIDE AUTHORITIES.
