YOUR WORSHIP, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Fifty-Eighth Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health, upon the Health and Sanitary conditions of this Borough, for the year 1938, drawn up in accordance with the requirements of the Minister of Health.

Health Services.

During the period under review, several meetings have been held by representatives of the various bodies interested, in order to formulate a scheme for the amalgamation of the general hospital facilities at present existing in the Borough. The parties involved in these discussions were, the County Borough of Tynemouth Corporation; the Northumberland County Council; and the Board of Governors of the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary. This matter is still under consideration.

An attempt has also been made towards the ultimate fusion of the various Clinical Services provided by the individual Committees of the Council. It is hoped, in this connection, that it shall be possible in the near future, to erect a new Joint Clinical Centre.

It has not been possible up to the present, to introduce a scheme for the immunisation of school and pre-school children against Diphtheria, owing to the additional duties which have been placed upon the Department in connection with the administration of that part of the Air Raid Precautions Scheme with which it is concerned.

Notifications relating to Infectious Diseases received during the year were in excess of the number recorded for the year 1937. The increase was in large measure accounted for by the greater prevalence of cases of Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever. In spite of the increased numbers in these groups, the Mortality Rates were not materially affected.

Housing.

Considerable progress has been made under the Slum Clearance Programme adopted by the Council, the total number of Areas represented up to the end of 1938 being 61, which together with 107 Individual Houses represented, comprises a total of 2,591 tenants (9,514 persons) dealt with under the Housing Acts 1930-36.

During the year an additional 360 houses have been erected by the Council, which together with 135 flats erected by the Sir James Knott Memorial Trust brings the total of houses erected under the Housing Acts 1930-36 for the displacement of tenants from the declared Slum Areas to 1,914. The alleviation of Overcrowding has been well maintained as in the past, by the operation of the exchange system.

A further estate of 214 houses, which includes the provision of 14 "Aged Persons Homes" (One Bedroomed Type) is in course of construction at the Ridges Estate, and good progress is being made. Completion is expected at an early date.

It is with pleasure that I express my gratitude to all members of my staff for the efficiency and helpful co-operation they have shown in the carrying out of the multifarious duties imposed upon the modern Health Department. I also desire to tender my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their valuable co-operation, and the keen interest which they have taken in the administration of the Department.

DEATHS.

The total number of deaths recorded in the Borough was 1,054, but 307 of these were non-resident. 50 deaths of residents also occurred outside the Borough. The **nett deaths** were, therefore 797, which is equal to a **death rate** of 11.98 per 1,000 of the population. The rates for England and Wales, and the Great Towns were 11.6 and 11.7 respectively.

The number of deaths of persons belonging to Tynemouth which occurred in Public Institutions during the year, was:—

Tynemouth Poor Law Institution, 241; Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary, 54; Moor Park Isolation Hospital, 18; Royal Victoria Infirmary, Newcastle, 10; other Institutions outside the Borough (including 13 deaths in Morpeth Asylum) 26. This makes a total of 349, which is 43.8 per cent. of all deaths of residents during the year.

INFANTILE MORTALITY.

There were 67 deaths of children under one year of age, which gives an Infantile Mortality Rate of 61 to every 1,000 live births.

The infantile mortality rates for England and Wales, and for the Great Towns were 53 and 57 respectively.

During 1938 there were 7 deaths from Measles and Respiratory diseases among infants; in 1937 there were 24, and in 1936, 20.

CHILD MORTALITY.

There were 27 deaths of children between the ages of 1 to 5 years. The principal causes of death were as follows:—

Pneumonia (4), Measles (4), Diphtheria (1), Bronchitis (3), Whooping Cough (2), and Non Pulmonary T.B. (4).

NEO-NATAL MORTALITY,

The neo-natal mortality, i.e., the death rate under 1 month of age per 1,000 births, was 37.1 compared with 19.3 in 1937, 24.7 in 1936; 31.6 in 1935; 34.0 in 1934.



The total number of days spent in hospital by patients during the year was 16,110, or an average of 39.58 days per patient.

TUBERCULOSIS.

The provision of beds under the Public Health Acts for Tuberculosis patients was outlined in the Annual Report for 1930. 91 beds (25 of which are for children) are provided in Preston Hospital, which is administered under the Poor Law Acts, and there are 20 beds at Moor Park for tuberculosis persons.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936.

Consultations in accordance with Section 182 of the Public Health Act, 1936 have been held during the year between representatives of the Tynemouth Corporation and the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary. The purpose of these meetings was to endeavour to formulate a scheme for the amalgamation of General Hospital accommodation existing at present in the Borough.

The agreement with the Northumberland County Council as to joint usage extends until 1950.

WATER.

The Capital Cost of the Water Undertaking of the County Borough of Tynemouth to date amounts to £982,479.

The supply is on the constant system, and is a mixture of water from three sources, viz:-

- (1) From the area of a watershed at Fontburn, near Rothbury. Area of watershed—11½ square miles; upland moorland. Capacity of Reservoir—721½ million gallons.
- (2) From the Tosson Springs on the North East side of Simonside Hills, near Rothbury.
- (3) From Springs at Cartington, which is on the North West side of Rothbury.

The following areas are supplied with water from the above water supply of the Tynemouth Corporation:—

Tynemouth C.B.; Ashington U.D.C.; Whitley and Monkseaton U.D.C.; Seaton Valley U.D.C.; Newbiggin U.D.C.; Bedlington U.D.C.; and part of Morpeth District.

There are 4 Reservoirs in the Borough, viz.:—Ridges, Billy Mill, Moor Houses, and Brock Farm.

Twenty six bacteriological examinations were taken during the year.

During the year 3 samples of water from domestic supplies were submitted for chemical analysis. The following report taken in mid-year has been selected as an average.

The figures relating to the organic impurities in this water are all satisfactory and chemically speaking, the water is in our opinion, suitable for drinking.

Like many soft waters of this type it has the power of disolving lead, although this sample actually does not contain any lead in solution. The lead solvency is a little higher than that of the last sample, reported upon in our certificate dated April 12th, 1938, but is within safe limits.

SWIMMING POOLS.

There are two Open-Air Salt Water Swimming Pools situated within the Borough. Periodically samples of water have been taken and have always attained a satisfactory standard.

In anticipation of the increased use of the larger of the two swimming pools referred to, situated on the sea front at Tynemouth, a Filtration and Chlorination Plant has been installed and shall be in operation throughout the coming season.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The following sewer work, etc., has been executed during the year (information supplied by the Borough Surveyor).

The sewers on the Ridges Estate have been laid on the séperate system, i.e., the foul water is entirely separate from the surface water sewer and although both occupy the same trench the surface water is, in nearly every case, at a slightly higher level.

There have been no conversions to the water carriage system at the cost of the Local Authority.

CLEANSING AND TRANSPORT DEPARTMENT,

Report of the Director of Public Cleansing. (Roy Marson, A.M.Inst., P.C.).

The Cost of Refuse Collection, Refuse Disposal, Street Sweeping, Gully Cleansing, and Ashbin Scheme and Stock, is is shewn for the past three years. Workmen's wages were increased by ½d. per hour in July, 1936, and a further ½d. per hour in March, 1937.

Almost the whole of the refuse storage in the Borough is by means of galvanised ashbins of prescribed standard pattern. There remains only a few privy pails in certain isolated premises in the town area, and only a small number of dry and privy ashpits in outlying places, where it has not been practicable to convert to water carriage system.

The number of privy pail closets in the Borough is 26, dry pits 24, privy pits 77.

During the year 854 standard ashbins were provided to eliminate defective ashbins and unsuitable receptacles, and for new houses.

Dry house refuse is collected throughout the Borough (during the day) weekly, with the exception of the before-mentioned isolated cases.

The collection vehicles are of the S.D. Freighter, Low-Loading Type, including one 10 cubic yard moving floor van type. These are supplemented by horse drawn two-wheeled vehicles. All the vehicles are on pneumatic tyres.

The contents of privy pails and ashpits are collected by one horse and cart during the night, and disposed of to farmers.

Refuse is disposed of by controll ed tipping, with the exception of a small quantity of trade refuse which is incinerated.

The total mileage of streets to be cleansed is 84: 16 miles are cleansed once daily or more frequently, 6 miles twice weekly, 62 miles once weekly.

Street cleansing is carried out by the "Orderly System." All sweepings are collected by motor vehicle direct from the beats and are finally disposed of within a short period from the time of sweeping.

Litter bins are affixed to street standards in an endeavour to encourage pedestrians to refrain from depositing litter.

There were snowfalls and severe frosts during December, 1938, and January, 1939, and road gritting on account of frosts was carried out mechanically and by hand.

Gullies are vacuum cleaned regularly and re-sealed with fresh water.

SCHOOLS.

A brief note is made in this Report on the sanitary condition of schools, on page 71 of the Senior Sanitary Inspector's Report.

A full report on the health of the scholars and the control of infectious disease and other matters has been published as the Report of the School Medical Officer for the year 1938.

SMALLPOX.

The average duration of treatment in Hospital was 31.6 days. 3,380 swabs were examined in the laboratory for the presence of diphtheria bacilli (see page 12).

One diphtheria carrier admitted to Walkergate Hospital for Tonsil operation.

The distribution of anti-toxin to general practitioners was continued as in previous years. During 1938 546,000 units of anti-toxin were distributed in 241 phials.

ENTERIC FEVER.

There were no cases notified during the year,

ENCEPHALITIS LETHARGICA.

No cases were notified during the year.

One death attributed to this disease occurred in Preston Hospital.

The diagnosis was confirmed by bacteriological examination.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES DIAGNOSTIC SERVICES.

Laboratory facilities and the services of the Medical Officers in the Health Department are available for the diagnosis of doubtful or unusual cases of infectious disease.

During the year the Medical Officers of the Department dealt with 35 cases in this connection.

SCHOOL INTIMATIONS OF DISEASE.

As in previous years weekly returns of figures relating to absenteeism on account of illness in the various schools in the Borough have been submitted by the Education Department and have again proved helpful in the tracing of sources of infection, excluding contacts, and eradicating infectious diseases in localised areas.

On the occurrence of any group of infective cases a special visit of the medical staff of the School Medical Service is made with a view to tracing the source of infection and excluding the latent or likely cases. The homes of children excluded on account of disease are visited by the School Nurses and Health Visitors and appropriate advice is given on the prevention of disease and its applications.

The Council have three disinfectors, one at Moor Park Hospital, one at Balkwell Hospital, and one at Preston Hospital. The disinfection of articles removed from infected homes is undertaken at the station at Moor Park Hospital.

There is one Ford Motor van for the transport of infected and sterilised clothing and bedding. The van made 671 journeys during the year. The number of days on which the disinfector was in use at Moor Park Hospital amounted to 209.

DEINFESTATION.

X-RAY EXAMINATIONS.

Radiography of contacts, suspected cases and all notified cases were carried out during the year, subsequent examinations when necessary were made as part of the routine Dispensary supervision.

709 Radiographs and 462 Screen examinations were made during the year.

ULTRA-VIOLET LIGHT THERAPY.

The total number of patients treated at the clinic during 1938 was 165 made up of 31 adults and 134 children.

The results of treatment were as follows:—76 were discharged healed or quiescent; 56 improved; 25 remained stationary and 8 retrogressed.

Since the 1st October, 1938, the Public Health Committee have accepted responsibility for the maintenance of cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis admitted to Preston Hospital. Up to the end of December liability was accepted for 34 cases.

In addition to the above certain cases requiring special treatment are now admitted to the Newcastle General Hospital for surgical treatment by the Thoracic Specialist. The Public Health Department have accepted responsibility for the cost of operation and maintenance of such patients.

TYNEMOUTH TUBERCULOSIS CARE COMMITTEE.

The Committee, which consists of representatives of practically all the voluntary associations of the Borough and from a number of business firms etc., has now become purely self supporting from the administrative point of view, the administrator being the Hon. Financial Secretary (H. W. Welch). The Medical Staff of the Health Department act in an advisory capacity and refer cases from the Dispensary to the Committee who deal with them.

During the year 30 cases were assisted, 21 being granted Extra Nourishment which consists of certain specified quantities of Eggs and Milk to approved cases of tuberculosis. The remaining 9 cases were supplied with surgical appliances, boots and clothing etc.

A Flag Day was held during the year and a collection of £34 7s, 0d, was made.

Thanks are expressed for donations received from "A Wellwisher"; Mr. Donald, Cullercoats; Mrs. Weatherstone, Cullercoats; Employees Newcastle & Gateshead Gas Co.; Employees Smith's Dock Co. (Hospital Comm.); North Shields Inner Wheel; Anonymous; and Staff of Public Health Department.

REHOUSING OF TUBERCULOUS FAMILIES,

Under a scheme inaugurated by the Health Committee in February, 1933, 11 houses are now allotted for the purposes of rehousing families containing one or more cases of pulmonary tuberculosis of a definitely infective nature.

Three alterations in tenancies have taken place during the year.

The minimum rent payable by families rehoused under this scheme has been fixed by the Committee at 5/- per week.

The houses are inspected periodically by the Tuberculosis Health Visitors.

INSTITUTIONAL TREATMENT.

Venereal Diseases.

Seven deaths attributable to syphilis were registered during the year.

The Centres available for the treatment of venereal diseases are the Joint Committees Clinic, Newcastle, and the Auxiliary Centre at Preston Hospital, Tynemouth, and at the Health Department, for females and children.

Eighty-six patients suffered from two or more abnormalities.

Since the institution of the Municipal Ante-Natal Clinic, letters indicating serious major abnormalities in a patient have been sent to the patient's own doctor, and during the year, the number of such notifications sent to private practitioners was 44.

The remainder of the patients who were examined at the Municipal Clinic and who were discovered to be suffering from minor conditions were either given advice, referred to their own medical attendant, or a record for medical help was sent by the midwife to the patient's own doctor.

POST NATAL CLINIC.

During the year, 35 patients attended the Post-Natal Clinic, and many more were advised by the Maternity and Child Welfare Medical Officer at the Child Welfare Clinic.

HEALTH VISITING, INFANT HYGIENE, AND CO-ORDINATION OF WORK WITH SCHOOL MEDICAL SERVICES.

The total number of births notified during the year was 1,179 including 45 still-births, 122 outward transfers (which includes 7 still-births). Of the total births 59 were notified by medical men, 945 by midwives and 175 by parents and others. 17 births were found not to have been notified, but these were intimated after the requirements of the Notification of Births Act were brought to the notice of the persons concerned.

The number of first visits by the Health Visitors was 1015 and of these 63 births occurred in houses of one apartment, 254 in houses of two apartments, 365 in houses of three apartments, 191 in houses of four apartments and 142 in houses of five apartments and over.

5,566 re-visits were made to infants under one year and 14,593 to children from one year to five years of age, making a total of 20,159 re-visits. The total number of first visits and re-visits was 21,174 made up of 1,015 first visits and 20,159 re-visits. In addition 278 ante-natal visits were paid.

Frater Maternity Home.

During the year 88 cases were admitted, 87 confinements Of these births 3 were still-births. The births included 41 Males and 46 Females. The average duration of residence was 13.9 days. Medical Aid was requisitioned in 36 instances (35 for mothers and 1 for babies).

There were no infantile deaths during the year.

It will be realised that in a Borough the size of Tynemouth any slight increase in the number of maternal deaths results in a large variation in the maternal mortality rate.

A Milk Depot is administrated by the Local Authority with the assistance of voluntary workers to whom I am indebted for their help.

REPORT ON CLINICAL WORK.

Dr. Margaret B, Steel.

CHILD WELFARE CLINICS.

Three Clinics per week have been held during the past year, for the weighing of children, whilst consultations concerning health and the feeding of children have been given, together with general advice and instruction to mothers.

There were 1,053 children under one year, who made 5,557 attendances; 857 children over one year, who made 2,698 attendances, totalling 1,910 children making 8,255 attendances. The average weekly attendance was 165 as compared with 150 for the previous year.

The second year of life still provides the majority of cases of ill-health, rickets being responsible in most cases. Calcium deficiency and anaemia are prevalent during the winter months. A large proportion of the children over one year develop dental caries following on rickets. These cases of dental caries have been dealt with effectively at the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Dental Clinic.

Treatment required for ear, nose and throat conditions and defective vision has been given by the School Medical Officer and the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary. Children requiring minor operations or any surgical treatment are also referred to the Out-Patient Department of the T.V.J.I.

Many cases of ill-health have derived great benefit from regular attendance at the Ultra-Violet Light Clinics, these Clinics being held twice per week. During the past year 62 cases made 967 attendances.

The tonic effect of sunlight upon the children treated has resulted in a general increase in appetite and energy and gains in weight.

Several children suffering from debility following infectious diseases in the second year of life, and others who have accquired irregular dietry habits through illness or lack of proper training in their homes, have been referred to the Nursery Schools, where a marked improvement in the general condition of these children has become apparent, due to regular meals and rest intervals, and training on the part of the Nursery School Teacher.

ANTE-NATAL CLINICS.

Ante-Natal Clinics were held daily at the Health Department, the Municipal Midwives attending on set days with their own patients.

663 cases attended during the year.

Cases were kept under observation, and any abnormality was reported immediately to the patient's own doctor, the number of such notifications sent to private practitioners during 1938 was 44.

During the last three months of pregnancy, necessitous cases were granted free milk foods and dressings, these being provided by the Joint Council of Midwifery through the National Birthday Trust Fund, and the patients concerned greatly benefitted from such supply. There was also a special distribution of Blankets as a Christmas Gift from the same source.

The Milk Depot administered by the Local Authority, and assisted by Voluntary Workers continued its activities during the year, supplying dried milk foods at cost price and under, to nursing mothers or children under one year of age; and whereas breast feeding has been encouraged as much as ever possible it has been found necessary in many cases to grant the nursing mother a supply of dried milk so that breast feeding could be maintained. Food accessories have also been provided at cost prices.

The Invalid Children's Aid Society have continued to give us a grant of Virol, Numol, Cod Liver Oil, and Malt, etc., for necessitous children.

During the Ante-Natal Clinical Sessions, the Municipal Midwives prepare their own dressings for use at confinments in the patient's own home,

POST-NATAL CLINICS.

The Post-Natal Clinic established in 1937 has continued and during the year 35 patients attended for advice. Any abnormalities found were reported to the patient's own doctor, as in the case of patients attending the Anti-Natal Clinics. Whilst the above number is not a large one, many patients seek advice regarding themselves when attending with their babies at the Child Welfare Clinics.

There are eight midwives engaged by the Local Authority under the Midwives' Act, 1936 A regular inspection of their equipment is maintained.

Slum Clearance, Deinfestation and removal of tenants has been carried on according to programme, despite the pressure of other work. The Overcrowding Provisions of the Housing Act continues to make a considerable cail on the services of the staff and warrants additional staff, if attention to routine duties is to be maintained.

The Factories Act, 1937, which came into force on the 1st July, 1938, makes an additional call on the services of the

Department.

In conclusion, may I take this opportunity of thanking the Health Committee and all colleagues for their support and keen interest in all work undertaken during a period of great difficulty.

OTHER FOODS INSPECTION.

There have been no prosecutions as in all cases the food condemned was voluntarily surrendered. All unsound condemned foodstuffs are disposed of at a factory where they are utilized in the manufacture of manure, fertilizers etc.

Fish.

During the season a large number of boats are engaged in herring fishing and the catches are usually landed and dealt with the same day. All catches are dealt with at the Corporation Fish Quay and the quality of fish landed has been well maintained.

MILK SUPPLIES.

There were 15 cowkeepers with 31 cowsheds, housing 285 cows on the Register at the end of the year. One cowshed was enlarged and improved.

On the 1st April, the duties of Veterinary Inspection were transferred to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, who are now responsible for the supervision of milch cows in the Borough. I would like to pay tribute to the excellent manner in which Mr. Thomas Harper, the former Veterinary Inspector has carried out this work during the time I have been connected with the Department, and his good advice and willingness to help at all times. It is to be regretted that Mr. Harper's thirty-one years' service with the Corporation could not be continued on its former basis, but I am pleased to report that he is retained on the panel of Veterinary Inspectors of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries and that he is occasionally called upon to carry out work within the Borough.

During the year, all the herds of the farmers licensed to produce "Accredited" milk were examined four times, and the herds of the producers of ordinary milk received two routine visits and five farms received special visits. As a result of these inspections, 14 cows were slaughtered under the Tuberculosis Order, 1938. This number includes 6 animals discovered to be affected as a result of milk sampling.

493 visits were made to cowsheds, dairies, milk shops, etc., and all infringements of the Milk and Dairies Acts and Orders, namely 30, were dealt with satisfactorily.

Consignments of milk coming into the Borough by road or rail received attention; also the condition of the empty churns returned.

Owing to pressure of work, it is not possible to take a census of the milk consumption as in 1936 and 1937.

MILK FOR EXAMINATION FOR TUBERCLE FACILLI.

103 samples of milk were taken for examination, 51 were from sources within the Eorough and 52 from outside sources.

6 of the samples disclosed the presence of tubercle bacilli.

The Veterinary Inspector subsequently examined the herds of the farms affected and as a result 6 animals were removed from the herds and slaughtered under the Tuberculosis Order, 1925-38,

During the year 3 certificates of Exemption were granted to occupiers of lock-up shops and other persons where there were no sanitary conveniences owing to restricted accommodation. In these cases alternative accommodation was arranged.

RAG FLOCK ACTS, 1911 and 1928.

No samples were obtained. This material seems to have fallen into disuse.

SLAUGHTER OF ANIMALS ACT, 1933.

There are 80 Licensed slaughtermen in the Borough.

No infringement of the Regulations concerning the above Act came to the notice of the Department during the year. The stunning of sheep is not carried out in the Borough.

PUBLIC HEALTH (SMOKE ABATEMENT) ACT, 1926.

Eight observations were made during the year and in two instances black smoke was emitted in excessive quantities. The premises were visited and the cause of the smoke investigated, and it was found that the plant was in order and that the nuisance resulted from careless stoking. Verbal warning was given in each case with satisfactory results.

SEAMENS' AND COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

At the end of the year there were 5 Seamen's and 2 Common Lodging Houses on the Register. Total number of beds contained therein, 160. During the year 1 Common Lodging House was closed due to Slum Clearance.

22 visits of inspection were made during the year and no cause for complaint was found at the time of inspection. The Chief Constable has also had inspections made and has found everything satisfactory.

At the end of the year, the Tyne Sailors' Home closed down due to lack of support. This institution provided 72 beds (not included in the above figures) together with recreation facilities.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

The premises at which Offensive Trades are carried on have been frequently visited and inspected, and the Regulations have been strictly enforced. During the year, it was necessary to institute a prosecution against a Butcher for Gut Scraping on unlicensed premises, namely a shed at the rear of his premises. The butcher concerned was fined five pounds.

During the year 2 Fried Fish Shops were closed down. 2 licences were transferred to new premises; 1 application for a new licence was deferred; and 3 licences were transferred to fresh occupiers.

THEATRES, MUSIC HALLS, AND PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

The Inspector of Public Buildings has regularly visited all places of amusement and no complaint of defects or irregularities have been made in connection with the Ventilation, Sanitation or Cleanliness of any of these buildings.

INSPECTION AND TESTING OF DRAINS.

Questions relating to the remodelling of old systems and the installing of new systems have been discussed with owners and builders with advantage to all persons interested, as both efficiency and economy has been secured. When old systems are tested, smoke is used, unless the drain is uncovered, when the drains, both old and new, are tested with water. The drains and sanitary conveniences of new buildings are dealt with by the Borough Surveyor's staff.

SANITARY CONVENIENCES (PUBLIC).

All Public Conveniences are under the control of the Director of Public Cleansing and have always been kept in a satisfactory condition.

RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT. 1919.

As required by the Ministry, special efforts were made during Rat Week to secure concerted action in the destruction of rats and mice. Much preparatory work was undertaken during the weeks preceding the appointed time to secure success.

The results ascertained were that 229 rats and 140 mice were

destroyed.

Rat traps are available at the Health Department and were on loan to 54 persons making application for them during the year.

SCHOOLS.

There have been no complaints received of inadequate ventilation, sanitation or drainage at any of the schools. There are 23 schools in the Borough (this figure includes 2 Nursery Schools) under the control of the Tynemouth Education Authority and the structures are under the supervision of Mr. J. H. Forsyth, the Clerk of Works.

Whilst there have been no houses specifically built for Overcrowded families, the Borough Treasurer has utilised surplus houses on existing Corporation Estates for the alleviation of overcrowded tenants residing in Corporation and Privately Owned Properties, and during the year, 109 families have been suitably accommodated.

Regard should be taken of the alleviation of overcrowding in properties scheduled in Slum Clearance Areas. During the year 284 overcrowded families have been removed from Slum Areas and given ample accommodation in new houses erected under the Housing Acts.

The total overcrowded families relieved during the year was 393.

Four instances were discovered where overcrowding had appeared during the year, due to two cases of wilful misrepresentation of new tenants and the size of their families to the landlords and the others due to neglect of duty by the landlords. Notices were served in all instances, three have been abated and one notice is still in force.

The provisions of the Act have been advertised in the local Press and by posters several times.

During the year, 90 certificates, relating to 863 properties, giving the "Permitted Number" were issued to local landlords.

It has been necessary to institute a prosecution against an Estate Agent during the year under Section 168 for refusing to give information as to the ownership of property and so prevent the serving of notices for repairs. One pound fine was imposed.
