

YOUR WORSHIP, LADIES and GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Sixty-Second Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health, upon the health and sanitary conditions of this Borough for the year 1942, and am pleased to report that the general standard of health of the population of the Borough has been maintained at a high level.

It is satisfactory to me to have to report a slight increase in the Birth Rate, and a slight but noticeable decrease in the incidence of Tuberculosis.

The scheme for the Immunisation against Diphtheria of the child population, instituted last year, has been fairly well supported by parents, and the results obtained have been reasonably satisfactory.

In conclusion, I desire to express my thanks to the Chairman and members of the Health Committee, for their interest and support throughout the year, and also my sincere appreciation of their very helpful co-operation to all members of the staff of the Health Department.

The nett deaths were 787, which is equivalent to a death rate of 14.71 per 1,000 of the population. The rates for England and Wales, and the Great Towns were 11.6 and 13.3 respectively.

There were 84 deaths of infants under one year of age which gives an Infantile Mortality Rate of 92 per 1,000 live births.

The Infantile Mortality Rates for England and Wales, and for the Great Towns were 49 and 59 respectively.

NEO-NATAL MORTALITY.

The Neo-Natal Mortality, i.e. the death rate of infants under **one month** of age, per 1,000 births was 40.75.

Chemical and Bacteriological analyses are performed for the Local Authority by the Public Analysts for the Borough, in their Laboratory in Newcastle. During the year ten bacteriological and two chemical examinations were made on samples submitted by the Water Engineer.

In Preston Hospital and in the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary, certain examinations and analyses of clinical material were performed by the staff of each hospital, such examinations including blood counts, blood sugar examinations, urine analyses, slide, and smear preparations, etc.

Frater Maternity Home.

This Maternity Home is under the control of the Public Health Committee, and is administered in co-operation with the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary, one Matron acting for both Institutions. General Practitioners attend their own patients in the Home. Part of the cost of the Services under the local scheme is recovered from the Patients, in accordance with a scale of charges based on the family income.

102 patients were admitted during the year, resulting in 102 confinements, (two sets of twins) four of which were stillbirths. The total births were 104 of whom 49 were males and 55 females.

As a matter of routine, swabs are taken from patients on admission, and of 173 total examinations made, 5 swabs showed streptococci.

Average duration of residence per patient was 14.41 days. Medical Aid was summoned in 40 cases, 35 for the Mother and 5 for the Child. There were no Deaths during the year.

Balkwell Smallpox Hospital.

During the year this Hospital was not available for the admission of patients, but at the present moment it is being prepared for the readmission of Smallpox Cases.

BLIND PERSONS.

The total number of Blind Persons on the Register at the end of the year was 157. Under Section 176 of the Public Health Act, 1936, for the prevention of blindness and for the treatment of eye disease or injury, 31 cases were dealt with.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

MARGARET B. STEEL, M.B., Ch.B., D.P.H.,

Maternity and Child Welfare Medical Officer.

The attendances at the Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics show a slight increase compared with those of last year.

MUNICIPAL MIDWIFERY SERVICE.

This scheme, instituted in accordance with the provisions of the Midwives Act, 1936, has continued to give satisfactory service throughout the period under review, during which time 346 births were attended by Municipal Midwives, who attended 299 as Midwife, and 47 in the capacity of Maternity Nurse.

The daily Ante-Natal Clinics, held at the Public Health Department, at which the Municipal Midwives attend on set days for the convenience of their own patients, were reasonably well attended, and a total of 525 new cases were examined. Abnormalities found to be present in the condition of a patient are immediately reported by the Maternity and Child Welfare Medical Officer to the patient's own medical practitioner, and during 1942 there were 16 such cases reported.

Ante-Natal Clinics were also held at the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary, and at Preston Hospital, for the convenience of patients booking at these Institutions, and the following table shows the total Ante-Natal Clinical Attendances for the year.

MEDICAL AID.

In accordance with the regulations of the Central Midwives' Board, Medical Aid was summoned in 239 cases, 204 for the Mother, and 35 for the Child.

STILLBIRTHS.

The figure of stillbirths registered for this Borough, as given by the Registrar-General, for the year, was 51. Included in this number are 7 illegitimate stillbirths.

PUERPERAL PYREXIA.

10 cases were notified during the year, all of which were admitted to Hospital.

POST-NATAL CLINICS.

As mentioned in previous Annual Reports, no great number of cases attend the special Post-Natal Clinics held at the Public Health Department daily, patients preferring to attend the Child Welfare Clinics held three times per week, during the afternoon, when they attend with their children. Opportunity has been given during the past year for mothers to make Post-Natal enquiries at these afternoon sessions, and a fair average of cases have been examined, and advice given.

ULTRA-VIOLET LIGHT CLINICS.

Clinics are held twice each week at the Public Health Department. Conditions treated during the past year were, Rickets 8; Debility and Anaemia 5; Other Causes 5; a total of 18 cases, who made 368 attendances.

MILK (MOTHERS AND CHILDREN) ORDER.

A Milk Depot, administered by the Local Authority, and assisted by Voluntary Workers, is in operation, and provides for necessitous pregnant and nursing mothers, and children under 1 year of age. During the year a total of 24,208 lbs. of Dried Milk was distributed at cost price.

The total amount expended by the Local Authority on the purchase of Dried Milk during the year was $f_{2,224}$. 9s. 8d. In addition under the National Dried Milk Scheme 9,355 lbs. were distributed.

CHILD WELFARE.

Three Clinics are held weekly for the weighing of children, whilst consultations concerning the health and feeding, together with general advice, are given to mothers.

Treatment for ear, nose and throat conditions, and defective vision is given by the Schools Medical Officer, and also at the Tynemouth Victoria Jubilee Infirmary, at which Institution cases of Dental caries are also treated. Minor operative or any surgical treatment is also available at the Out-Patient Department of this Infirmary.

HEALTH VISITING AND INFANT HYGIENE.

11,882 visits were made by the Health Visitors during the year, and a summary of these visits is given below :—

NURSERY SCHOOLS.

There are two Nursery Schools in the Borough, both of which have places for 80 children. Dr. Margaret B. Steel, the Maternity and Child Welfare Officer acts as Hon. Medical Adviser to both schools.

These schools have been closed owing to the war, and the children are now evacuated to the country.

There was a total of 204 factories on the Register at the end of the year, 132 with mechanical, and 72 without mechanical power.

OUTWORKERS.

One notice under Section 110 of the Factories Act, 1937, was received during the year, and on inspection, the premises were found to be in a satisfactory condition.

BAKEHOUSES.

There were 42 premises on the Register at the end of the year, all of which were inspected regularly. It was not necessary to serve any notices during the year.

SHOPS ACT, 1934 (Section 10).

Under the provisions of the above Act, 100 visits were made to inspect sanitary conveniences and other arrangements for the welfare of the assistants.

RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919.

During the year, 446 visits were made by the Inspectors to 203 premises for the purpose of ascertaining Rat Infestation, and in consequence 19 notices were served with successful results.

There were three Seamen's Lodging Houses on the Register at the end of the year, containing a total of 64 beds. 12 visits were made during the year, and all was found to be satisfactory. The Chief Constable also made inspections during the year, and reported his satisfaction.

There were 13 Cowkeepers with 26 cowsheds housing 286 cows on the Register at the end of the year.

During the year, Veterinary Inspectors of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries examined the herds of Accredited Producers on 7 occasions. In addition 4 special visits and inspections was made. As a result of these visits, 4 animals were dealt with under the Tuberculosis Order, 1938.

50 visits were made to cowsheds and 299 visits were made to dairies, milk shops, etc., and all infringements of the Milk and Dairies Acts and Orders were dealt with satisfactorily.

MILK SAMPLES FOR BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION.

During the year, 69 samples of Milk were taken for examination and submitted to the Public Health Laboratory, Newcastle. Of the total samples taken 41 were from sources within the Borough, and 28 from outside. In addition, 4 samples of Pasteurised Milk were submitted to the Public Analyst for the Phosphatase Test.

Of the above, 49 samples were examined for Tubercle Bacilli, two of which gave positive results. Appropriate action was taken under the Tuberculosis Order, 1925/38, resulting in the slaughtering of two animals.

TYNEMOUTH CORPORATION ACTS, 1916-1934.

Regulations made under the Acts are in force, and no persons are permitted to use premises for the preparation of food unless they are registered by the Local Authority, who have power to refuse registration if, in their opinion, the premises are unsatisfactory.

Prior to the ban on the manufacture of Ice Cream (S.R.O. 1962), which came into operation on the 24th September, 1942, there were 76 persons in the Borough registered as occupiers of premises in which Ice Cream is sold or manufactured. 89 persons are registered as owners or occupiers of premises in which Preserved Meat, Fish Cakes, or other foods are prepared. These figures do not include premises used for the business of Fish and Potato Frying. 167 visits were made during the year to supervise and emphasise the need for cleanliness in the handling of food. No serious negligence was discovered.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

Slaughterhouses.

There now remain 15 private slaughterhouses, which are subject to annual Licence. Since the operation of the Livestock (Restrictions on Slaughtering) Order 1940, all slaughtering is now centralised at Whitley Bay under Government Control.

4 cases of special slaughter of pigs for home consumption were authorised under a Licence by the Local Officer of the Ministry of Food.

Meat coming into the town was distributed until 11th November. 1942, from four centres, which served 82 butchers. Since that date the present system of direct deliveries to butchers' shops has been in force.

Inspection of Meat.

144 visits were made to the distributing centres and shops.

SWINE FEVER.

Two cases of suspected Swine Fever were reported to the Ministry. The one outbreak confirmed by the Veterinary Inspectors resulted in the slaughter and destruction of one pig.

IMMUNISATION.

The scheme for the Immunisation against Diphtheria of the child population, instituted last year, has been fairly well supported by parents.

In conjunction with the staff of the Education Department, scholars were immunised at their own schools, whilst Pre-School children were immunised at the Maternity and child Welfare Centre, a total of 3,126 children being immunised under the scheme during the year, 2,120 of which were School Children, bringing the percentage of immunised School Children now in school to 88.4, whilst 1,006 Pre-School Children were immunised, which brings the percentage of the Pre-School child population of the Borough immunised to 50.7.

DISINFECTION OF PREMISES AND ARTICLES OF CLOTHING.

TYNEMOUTH CARE COMMITTEE.

Mr. H. W. Welch, the Hon. Financial Secretary of the Tynemouth Care Committee reports that during the past year, the number of cases assisted was 11. Of this number 9 were granted extra nourishment, consisting of special quantities of eggs, and milk, to approved cases of Tuberculosis. The 2 remaining cases were supplied with surgical appliances.

The income of this Committee consists of an annual grant from the Tynemouth Corporation and from donations received from the Employees of the Newcastle and Gateshead Gas Co., and the Employees of Messrs. Smith's Dock Co. (Hospital Committee). A donation was also received from Mrs. Oulds, Princeway, Tynemouth.

Grateful thanks are expressed to these donors.

ULTRA-VIOLET LIGHT THERAPY.

The total number of patients treated at the Clinic during the year was 105, made up of 25 adults and 80 children, the result of the treatment given being as follows :—

35 were discharged, healed or quiescent; 30 improved; 28 remained stationary; and 12 cases ceased to attend.

SECTION G.

MISCELLANEOUS.

CIVIL DEFENCE.

The work of organising and supervising the First Aid and Casualty Service of the Civil Defence Organisation of this Borough, has continued to occupy a large part of the time of certain members of the Public Health Department Staff.

There is now in operation two Fixed First Aid Posts, each having facilities for the decontamination of injured persons, and two Public Gas Cleansing Centres for the decontamination of un-injured. Ambulance facilities are situated in close proximity to each First Aid Post, and also dispersed throughout the Borough at each First Aid Party Depot, and at First Aid Party Headquarters, Masonic Hall, Albion Road, North Shields. In addition there are four Mobile Gas Units and two Mobile First Aid Units garaged centrally and dispersed to action stations on the sounding of the "Alert."

Control.—The direction of the Casualty Services is carried out by the Medical Officer of Health, who is assisted by Mr. G. G. Ellis (a member of the staff of the Public Health Department) as Staff Officer, and Mr. J. Cox, as Transport Officer.

Decontamination is under the direction of the Senior Sanitary Inspector, Mr. C. A. Murray.

The two fixed First Aid Posts in the Borough are under the direction of Doctors Martin and Paterson, general medical practitioners, who, in an emergency, are assisted by Doctors Muirhead and Graham.

Personnel.—There has been some reduction of personnel in the Casualty Services of the Borough, now reducing the Whole-time paid strength to 12 teams, having at their disposal 11 ambulances and 11 cars, the balance of personnel required to bring the strength up to that authorised being drawn from part-time volunteers.

The training of First Aid Party personnel is carried out under the direction of Dr. R. M. White, the Assistant Medical Officer of Health, whilst Doctors Martin and Paterson are responsible for the training of First Aid Post personnel. Instruction in decontamination and anti-gas methods has been carried out by Inspector C. A. Murray and Mr. J. A. Ratcliffe, both fully qualified A.R.P.S. Instructors.

A very high standard of efficiency has been maintained throughout the year. APPENDIX.
