TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE UCKFIELD RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report for the year 1949. The report is prepared on the lines indicated in Ministry of Health Circular No. 2/50 dated 25th January, 1950.

The Birth Rate is 13.85 per 1,000 population compared with 16.7 for England and Wales.

The Crude Death Rate is 12.69; corrected for comparability in age and sex distribution with the country as a whole, this becomes 9.64, compared with 11.7 for England and Wales.

Heart diseases are responsible for over one third of the total deaths.

The Tuberculosis death rate is .24 compared with .45 for England and Wales.

No deaths occurred during the year from Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Whooping Cough, Measles, Typhoid Fever or Diarrhoea under two years of age.

Infectious Diseases.

The number of cases of infectious diseases notified during the year was nearly three hundred and fifty more than in 1948, this being mainly due to an increase of three hundred and ninety-five in the number of measles cases. More than half of the measles cases occurred in the parishes of Crowborough and Withyham.

Six cases of poliomyelitis were notified during the period August to November, five of which were admitted to hospital. There were no deaths. Investigations failed to reveal the source of the infection and no contact was traced between the patients, all of whom lived in different parishes.

The number of cases of whooping cough notified was the lowest since 1939.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The scheme described in my report for 1948 continues to make satisfactory progress. The percentages of immunised children in the 1—5 and 5—15 age groups have increased to 97.3 and 98.7 respectively.

Fifty-eight children under one year were immunised.

No case of diphtheria has been notified in the District since November, 1946.

National Assistance Act, 1948.

During the year the Council have arranged for the burial of two persons under the provisions of Section 50 of the Act, the total cost of the funerals amounting to £34 3s. 6d. Neither of the deceased persons qualified for a death grant from the National Insurance Scheme, and none of the Council's expenditure was recoverable.

Food Supplies.

Although this report is concerned with the year 1949 perhaps a word regarding the Byelaws made under Section 15 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938 and which came into operation on March 26th, 1950 will not be out of place.

The aim of these byelaws is to secure the observance of sanitary and cleanly conditions and practices in connection with the handling, wrapping and delivery of food, and in connection with the sale or exposure of food for sale in the open air. Provision is made for the protection of food during transit, in store, and when exposed for sale, and every person who handles, wraps or delivers food must take all necessary steps to protect it from contamination by dust, dirt, mud, animals, flies, etc., including contamination by other persons. Part III of the Byelaws deals exclusively with the sale and exposure for sale of food in the open air and implies that all persons selling in open market, or from stalls and vehicles in the street, must take all necessary steps to prevent contamination of the food.

The penalties for an offence against any of these byelaws are (1) a maximum fine of £5 and (2) in the case of a continuing offence, a further fine not exceeding forty shillings for each day during which the offence continues.

Copies of the Byelaws have been distributed among the food traders throughout the district and the various requirements are being explained to them. I anticipate that compliance with this legislation will be largely achieved by informal action; greengrocers have already taken under cover fruit and vegetables previously displayed in the open.

Laboratory Facilities.

Arrangements are made for the examination of specimens, taken for the diagnosis and control of infectious diseases, with the Public Health Laboratory, Royal Sussex County Hospital, Brighton (telephone number Brighton 23506).

Medical practitioners send specimens direct to the laboratory and receive a report by telephone, a copy of the report being sent to this office.

Specimens may be sent to reach the Laboratory any time up to 7 o'clock from Mondays to Fridays and before 12.30 p.m. on Saturdays.

Urgent examinations may be carried out by telephoning to the Director, Dr. Jameson (telephone number Preston 6960).

Ambulance Services.

It is the duty of the County Council under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1946, to ensure that ambulances are available where necessary to convey persons suffering from illness from places in their area to places in or outside their area.

In East Sussex this is being done mainly by arrangement with the St. John Ambulance Brigade, the British Red Cross Society and other voluntary organisations.

A day and night ambulance service is available and calls are accepted from doctors, nurses, midwives and hospitals in the area. Only in cases of accidents or other sudden emergencies are calls accepted direct from members of the public.

Milk Supplies.

Milk and Dairies Order, 1926. Milk and Dairies Regulations, 1949.

The Milk and Dairies Regulations, 1949, which came into operation on the 1st October of this year, repeals the Milk and Dairies Order, 1926 and provides for the registration of dairy farms and dairy farmers by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, but the registration of milk distributors and other dairies remains the responsibility of the District Council. The execution and enforcement of the regulations on dairy farms, so far as they relate to diseases communicable to man, also remains the responsibility of the District Council.

At the end of September the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries were furnished with a list of dairy farmers registered by the Council under the following classifications:—

Milk (Special Designations) Regulations, 1936–1943. Milk (Special Designations) Regulations, 1949.

The Milk (Special Designations) Regulations, 1949, which came into operation on the 1st October of this year, re-enact, with amendments, the provisions of the 1936-1948 regulations.

Two sets of regulations have been made relating to :-

- (a) raw milk, and
- (b) pasteurised and sterilised milk.

So far as raw milk is concerned, producers must be licensed by the Ministry

of Agriculture and Fisheries and dealers by the District Council.

The Council will similarly be responsible for licensing dealers of "pasteurised" and "sterilised" milk, but the duty of licensing premises where the milk is actually heat treated is placed on the Food and Drugs Authority, which for this district, is the East Sussex County Council.

Six samples of designated milk were submitted to the Bacteriologist for examination, four of which were satisfactory. In the case of the two unsatisfactory samples, details were forwarded to the Milk Production Officer of the East Sussex County Council with a view to inspections being made to the producers' premises.

The eleven samples which failed to pass the tests were from ice cream manufactured outside the District. The local authorities concerned were informed of the results of the analysis and given the names of the manufacturers.

It has since been ascertained that four of the seven manufacturers have ceased to sell ice cream in this district and of the others, action has been taken to obtain the necessary improvements.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938.

During the year a survey of all the food premises and shops in the district was made. This entailed visits to three hundred and forty premises and the recording of the conditions found to exist. The premises visited were:—

- (1) Catering establishments, including hotels, restaurants, snack bars, etc. 90
 (2) Inns and public houses (not included above) 56
 (3) Food shops and premises 194
- (1) The catering establishments have been inspected with a view to effecting improvements in the general hygiene. Managers and proprietors and, where-ever possible, kitchen staff, have been interviewed, and suggestions have been put forward for improved methods. On the whole these premises were found to be in a fairly satisfactory condition, some being very good and the standard of hygiene quite high. Of the ninety premises visited, eighty-four were served with main water and a constant supply of hot water was available in seventy-seven cases.
- (2) Attention has been directed also to glass washing facilities and sanitary accommodation in Inns and beer houses in the district. It was found that of the fifty-six premises visited, thirty-seven were provided with a constant

supply of hot and cold water, seventeen had cold water but no constant supply of hot water, and two premises had totally inadequate facilities. The Brewery Companies are very conscious of the need for improved facilities at their premises and many of them have already made improvements in accordance with suggestions from this department. Cellars and pipelines have also been included in the survey, and it is interesting to note that the Brewers' Inspectors pay regular attention to this aspect of the business and usually visit the premises for this purpose fortnightly.

(3) The survey included one hundred and ninety-four visits to shops and premises where food is handled, stored or prepared, and particular attention was paid to hand washing and general cleanliness. It was found that in one hundred and twenty-seven premises there was a constant supply of hot and cold water for the use of the staff, and the remaining sixty-seven premises had only cold water laid on, but hot water was available from gas boilers, kettles, or other means. It is the aim, of course, to obtain a constant supply of hot water at each premises where food is handled.

Financial Arrangements.

Subject to the Council's compliance with certain conditions, the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries offered to continue the consolidated grant of 50% of approved net expenditure incurred on the maintenance of rodent control. The Council accepted the offer.

Commercial and industrial premises, with the exception of those occupied by the Council, do not qualify for grant-aid, the intention being that any expenditure should be fully reimbursed by the occupiers and that no part should fall on public funds. Occupiers of business premises have, therefore, been charged the actual cost of labour and materials used.

Occupiers of private dwelling-houses pay a modified charge based on the number of poison points laid.

Test-baiting of the various sewerage systems in the District will be commenced in January, 1950.

When tests were last carried out in the late summer of 1948, two of the thirteen systems were found to be slightly infested, and the necessary treatments were carried out.

Refuse Tips and Sewage Works.

Inspections are made at regular intervals of the Council's refuse tips and sewage works and, when necessary, treatments are carried out.

ERADICATION OF INSECT PESTS.

The work of eradicating insect pests with D.D.T. solution and powder was carried out during the year by the Rodent Operators under the supervision of the District Sanitary Inspectors.

The exceptionally dry weather experienced during the summer produced serious problems. The source of supply at Nutley proved quite insufficient to meet the needs of the dwellers of Danehill where people living on higher levels suffered serious inconvenience. In order to meet the need as far as possible a temporary intake was made on a small stream, a short distance from the purification plant and the pumping station.

Notices were posted in the parishes of Maresfield and Danehill, asking consumers to economise in the use of water. A loud-speaker van also toured

the district for the same purpose.

At Blackham where the Council supplies water purchased in bulk from the Crowborough District Water Company, a failure of supply occurred on a number of occasions, especially at weekends, due to the pressure in the Crowborough Company's mains being insufficient to secure delivery from the hill at High-fields. With a view to overcoming this recurring problem the Surveyor has recommended and the Council have agreed to construct a steel tank having a capacity of about one and a half days supply.

During the year it was necessary to cart water to meet the domestic

needs, where private supplies had failed, as follows:-

Mayfield Flat. Piltdown.

Nursery Lane, Framfield.

Palehouse Common, Framfield.

Upton's Mill, Framfield.

Horsted Lane, Little Horsted.

The problem which arose during the season, clearly indicated an urgent need for improvement and much larger sources of supply.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

No extensions to the sewers have been made during the year.
