

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To the Rural District Council of South Shields

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Twentieth Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Condition of the South Shields Rural District.

The Report comprises :--

- (1) Vital Statistics.
- (2) Prevalence of Infectious Diseases.
- (3) General Sanitation.
- (4) Sanitary Requirements.
- (5) Administration of the Factories and Workshops Act in the District.

The Divisions of the South Shields Rural District are as follows :---

- (a) Boldon Parish.
- (b) Boldon Colliery Parish.
- (c) Whitburn Parish, including Cleadon and Marsden.
- (d) Hedworth and Monkton.
- (e) Harton Parish.

VITAL STATISTICS.

The Area of the District in Acres is 12,073. Vital Statistics. The Census Population, April, 1911, for this District is 14,483; at the Census, 1901, it was 10,790. The Estimated Population to the middle of the year 1913 is 16,463.

The General Death Rate of the District is 11.7.

The Zymotic Death Rate is 0.9.

The Death Rate from Phthisis is 0.3,

The Respiratory Rate is 1.7. The Birth Rate is 24.

and in addition 13 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, and 6 cases of other forms of Tuberculosis.

Of the above, 96 cases of Scarlet Fever, and 4 cases of Enteric Fever, were removed to the Fever Hospital.

In the above list, the following cases occurred at the Harton Workhouse :—Erysipelas, 5; Scarlet Fever, 4; and Enteric Fever, 3. So excluding 12 cases from the Harton Workhouse, 181 cases of Infectious Diseases have actually occurred in the District, as compared with 62 in 1912, 58 in 1911, and 100 in 1910.

The total increase in the number of Infectious Diseases notified, was due to an epidemic of Scarlet Fever, especially prevalent at Boldon Colliery, from whence 106 cases were notified, the majority of these occurred in the New Village. In connection with this fact, it may be mentioned that this class of house is not sufficiently hygienic, the streets being too narrow, the houses consist of flats, the rooms are too small, and the ventilation insufficient. The heated state of the atmosphere within the houses, due to constant fires in the kitchens, and insufficient ventilation, has probably a good deal to do with the prevalence of Scarlet Fever during the year. It is gratifying to note that only 3 cases of Enteric Fever occurred actually in the district (excluding cases from the Workhouse), but I am of the opinion that an epidemic will, sooner or later, take place, especially amongst the new houses at Boldon Colliery, unless the drainage is speedily made more efficient.

No cases of Smallpox, Cholera, or Typhus Fever were reported.

REMOVAL TO THE ISOLATION HOSPITAL.—100 cases were removed to the Fever Hospital from this District during the year. Of these 96 were Scarlet Fever, and 4 Enteric Fever.

LACK OF ACCOMMODATION AT THE ISOLATION HOSPITAL.—Owing to the epidemic of Scarlet Fever, and the lack of accommodation at the above Hospital, between 40 and 50 cases could not be removed to the Hospital.

PUBLIC HEALTH (TUBERCULOSIS) REGULATIONS, 1911. —On receipt of the notifications, the cases have been visited by myself, the Inspector, and the Lady Visitor, instructions as to preventative measures have been given, cartoons distributed, pocket spittoons supplied where necessary, and the fumigation of the premises done where required. There is, however, a delay in the admittance of patients to the Sanatoria, which is to be

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regretted, as such delay is prejudicial both in the interests of the patients and the public. It cannot be too strongly pointed out that early admission to the Sanatoria is imperative, and without early admission, it is difficult to see how the spread of Pulmonary Tuberculosis can be prevented. I also regret that your Council has not yet seen its way to provide accommodation for "Chronic Consumptives" at the Isolation Hospital.

In Colliery districts it is impossible to provide sufficient isolation for Tubercular Cases, as most of the houses have not more than two bedrooms and two living rooms, and consequently to provide a bedroom for a consumptive patient to sleep in alone, is an impossibility.

Isolation Hospital. ISOLATION HOSPITAL, WHITBURN.—During the year 1913, 156 cases of Infectious Diseases were treated at the above Hospital, as compared with 116 cases in the year 1912, and 85 cases in the year 1911. Of these 100 cases were from this district, 52 from the Southwick Urban District, and 4 (Enteric Fever) cases from Ryhope, which could not be accommodated at the Sunderland Rural District Isolation Hospital.

Of the 100 cases from this District, 96 were Scarlet Fever, and 4 Enteric Fever; and of the 52 cases from Southwick Urban District 45 were Scarlet Fever and 7 Enteric Fever. The 4 cases from Ryhope were Enteric Fever.

Deaths.

DEATHS.—Out of 156 cases treated at this Hospital during the year, only 4 deaths took place, 3 being Scarlet Fever, and 1 Enteric Fever.

Remarks.

In my opinion, increased accommodation should be provided at the above Hospital, especially for Scarlet Fever cases. The population of the South Shields Rural District is steadily increasing, since 1907 the estimated increase of population up to the middle of 1913, is 4,726; and the number of beds in the Hospital is now the same as it was when built 12 years ago.

During the past two years it has been found to be impossible to admit cases, which would have come in, if we could have accommodated them. In addition to the ordinary increase of population in the district, the Cottage Homes at Cleadon with a population of between 200 and 300 persons, mostly children, have been built, and it is certain that from time to time cases of infectious diseases will occur at these Homes.

CLOSURE OF SCHOOLS.—The Infants' School' at Marsden was closed from February 26th to March 20th, 1913, on account of Measles and Chickenpox, and the Infant School at Cleadon from March 3rd to March 20th, on account of Measles.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES AND SHOPS.—There are 14 in the Slaughter Houses. District. 5 notices were served by the Inspector of Nuisances, viz., 3 for accumulation of offal, 1 for lime washing, and 1 for a choked drain.

UNSOUND MEAT.—During the year 1 carcase (bullock) Unsound Meat. had to be destroyed owing to it being in an advanced stage of Tuberculosis. No proceedings had to be taken as it was surrendered on our visit.

SCAVENGING.—59 notices for neglect were served. Scavenging. On the whole, it has been well done.

EXCREMENT DISPOSAL.—Vide Annual Reports 1912, 1911, etc.

PREMISES AND OCCUPATIONS CONTROLLED BY BYE-LAWS. --- Vide Annual Reports 1912, 1911, etc.

DAIRIES AND COWSHEDS.—The whole of the above Dairies and have been inspected during the year, and they are kept in a sanitary condition.

The following have been specially reported on :--

- (1) Crow's Hall Dairy, West Boldon.—A new model dairy has been provided.
- (2) Pike's Hole Farm, West Boldon.—The drainage system has been improved.
- (3) Moor Lane Dairy Farm, Cleadon.—A new house and dairy has been built, and the outbuildings are being remodelled for Cowsheds and Stables, etc.
- (4) Mundle's Farm, East Boldon.—This farm is without a proper water supply.

- (5) Long Loaning Farm.—A Closing Order has been made.
- (6) Field House Farm, East Boldon (Turnbull's) .---This farm has been repaired, and is now in a sanitary condition.
- (7) Old Mill Dairy Farm, Hedworth.—This farm is still without a proper water supply.
- (8) East Farm, Monkton (Watson's).- A proper dairy should be provided.

INSANITARY PRIVY ASHPITS.—These, at the N.E.R. Co.'s Cottages, Brockley Whins, require attention. I have already reported on their insanitary conditio.

WATER SUPPLY.—This is the same, as already reported in my previous Annual Reports.

Child Birth. MEANS FOR PREVENTING MORTALITY IN CHILD BIRTH AND IN INFANCY .--- The Notification of Births Act is now in force in this district, and a Lady Visitor pays periodical visits to the houses, and gives instructions, etc.

> PREMISES AND OCCUPATIONS WHICH CAN BE CON-TROLLED BY BYELAWS .- No Lodging Houses, Cellar Dwellings, and Offensive Trades exist in the District, and if they did exist, the Rural District Council have no powers over them.

Schools.

These are all in a sanitary condition. The Medical Officer of Health is not the School Medical Officer. I am of the opinion that Schools should not be closed for sickness unless the local Medical Officer of Health is first consulted, as he alone knows the local conditions, and a case has recently arisen where a large School was unnecessarily closed owing to the Medical Officer of Health of the district not being primarily consulted.

Water Supply.

HOUSING ACCOMMODATION.—Although there is a Housing. great demand for houses, especially in the Colliery districts, there is no great need for any further steps to be taken to provide the same. No action has been taken by the Council under the Housing and Town Planning Act, 1909.

MAIN DRAINAGE.—In consequence of the action of Main Drainage. your Council regarding the want of further drainage, the Local Government Board has held two enquiries in respect of two Sewerage Schemes, one for the further drainage of Boldon Colliery, and one for East and West Boldon. I understand that the Local Government Board has sanctioned both schemes, and that tenders are now being advertised for these.

The new schemes are as follows :—The sewerage of West and East Boldon is to be diverted eastwards and carried to the Sea near the Bents, Whitburn, instead of going to Jarrow, whilst the whole of Boldon Colliery will be drained into the Tyne, near Jarrow.

SANITARY REQUIREMENTS.

- (1) Public Urinals at Boldon Colliery and Whitburn. Sanitary Requirements
- (2) Increased accommodation at the Isolation Hospital.
- (3) Street Paving.
- (4) A wholesome water supply to some of the outlying Farms.

At the end of this Report, I append Tables submitted to me by the Inspector of Nuisances concerning the Housing Town Planning Act, 1909, etc. Factories and Workshops Act. FACTORY AND WORKSHOPS ACT, 1901-1907.—There are 35 Factories and Workshops in the District. An increase of 2 since 1912.

113 inspections were made, and 14 notices were served for want of cleanliness, defective drainage, insufficient sanitary accommodation.

Night Soil.

ACCUMULATION OF NIGHT SOIL.—31 Notices were served for the abatement of Nuisances, arising from accumulations of ashpit refuse and night soil.
