Population.

The total population at the middle of 1938 (1939 not available), as estimated by the Registrar-General, was 59,000, and this figure has been used for deriving population figures and comparative rates which are given throughout this Report. The institutional population, at the middle of 1939, was 3,124 of whom 2,713 were non-residents and 411 were residents. The net population, excluding non-residents, was therefore 56,287.

The discrepancy between estimated and National Register population is mainly due to the calling-up of men on the outbreak of the War.

Marriages.

592 marriages were celebrated, equal to a marriage rate of 20.1 persons per 1,000 of the population, compared with 16.5 in 1938. The number of marriages was 136 more than in 1938.

Births.

Excluding 177 non-residents, the total number of live births registered in the City during 1939 was 781. The Registrar-General's figure for births in respect of residents whose confinements occurred outside the City was not available, and, for the purpose of reaching a comparative birth rate this number

has been estimated as 9, thus making a total of 790 live births. The estimated birth rate for 1939 is 14.04 per 1,000 of the population, compared with 16.3 in 1938 and 14.7 in 1937.

Of the live births 22 (2.8 per cent.) were illegitimate. The number of still-births registered was 33 (17 males and 16 females) excluding 7 outward transfers.

Notifications of births totalled 997, 477 from dwelling-houses and 520 from institutions. Of the home confinements, 135 were attended by doctors and 342 by midwives. The institution births include 434 in the Maternity Hospital, 25 in the White Rose County Hospital, 59 in private Maternity Homes, 1 in the Municipal Infectious Diseases Hospital, and 1 in the West Riding Mental Hospital.

Of the institution confinements, 372 were attended by midwives and 148 by doctors.

Of the registered births, 11 (1.4 per cent.) were not notified, compared with 1.1 per cent. in 1938 and 2.2 per cent. in 1937. 43 (4.31 per cent.) of the notified births were still births.

The total number of deaths registered in Wakefield during 1939 was 1,147, including 434 non-residents. In addition, 35 deaths of residents occurred outside the City. The number of resident deaths was therefore 748, giving a crude death rate of 13.3 per 1,000 of the population, compared with 12.4 in 1938 and 12.3 in 1937.

In order to make the above death rate comparable with the rates in other areas where population may be constituted differently from that of Wakefield, it is necessary to apply a "comparability factor" calculated for each area by the Registrar-General's Department. In the case of Wakefield, this factor is 1.08, which gives a corrected death rate for 1939 of 14.3, compared with 13.4 in 1938 and 13.3 in 1937.

In 1939 the number of deaths was 63 more than in the previous year.

Comparable death-rates for England and Wales and for the Large Towns were not available at the time of preparing this Report.

Infantile Mortality.

The number of infantile deaths (under one year of age) was 45 giving an infantile mortality rate of 57 per 1,000 live births, compared with 60 in 1938 and 55 in 1937.

The neo-mortality (i.e. the mortality during the first four weeks of life) was 38 per 1,000 live births, compared with 43 in 1938 and 39 in 1937.

Maternal Mortality.

There were three maternal deaths from diseases and accidents of pregnancy and parturition, excluding 1 non-resident who died in the Maternity Hospital, giving a mortality of 3.65 per 1,000 total (live and still) births, or 3.79 per 1,000 live births only, compared with 4.25 per 1,000 total births and 4.43 per 1,000 live births in 1938.

It is open on Thursday afternoons (1.30 to 4 p.m.) and Thursday evenings (6.0 to 7.30 p.m.) The evening session was discontinued during the winter months, with the sanction of the Ministry of Health, due to difficulties of black-out conditions.

(e) Venereal Diseases Clinic.

A Clinic for Venereal Diseases is held at the Clayton General Hospital and is used jointly by the West Riding County Council and the Wakefield County Borough Council. There are two sessions for Men (Wednesday 6 to 8 p.m., and Friday 10 a.m. to 12 noon), and two sessions for Women and Children (Monday)

4 to 6 p.m. and Friday 3.to 5 p.m.) Provision is made at the Clinic for daily irrigation and other treatment, when required. As from the 6th December, 1939, the Wednesday evening session for men has been altered, the new times being from 5.30 to 7.30 p.m.

All 66 samples were examined by inoculation for tuberculosis infection, and 2 samples or 3.03% gave positive results as against 6.06% in 1938. One sample was produced inside the City, and the other outside the City. The results of these examinations were sent to the Divisional Veterinary Officer of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, in the case of the milk produced inside the City, and in the case of the milk produced outside the City, to the County Authority.

The results of samples submitted for bacteriological examination show that of the 66 samples, 43 or 65.16% were reported to be satisfactory, all of which came within the standard of that required for "Accredited" milk.

This number represents 3.9 samples for each thousand of the population of the City (i.e. 59,000) being more than the proportion suggested by the Minister of Health, which is 3 per thousand.

(b) Inspection of Dwelling-houses.

A total of 1,380 dwelling-houses were dealt with under the Public Health or Housing Acts, and 2.043 inspections were made for the purpose. This included 133 dwelling-houses inspected under the Housing Consolidated Regulations, 1925, and 21 dwelling-houses were found to be in a state so dangerous or injurious as to be unfit for human habitation.
