

REPORT.

NATURAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE DISTRICT.

In accordance with instructions from the Ministry of Health, this year's report is to be in the nature of a survey report of the past five years.

The subjects to be dealt with accordingly fall under the following main heads:—

- (a) Natural and Social Conditions of the Area.
- (b) General Provision of Health Services.
- (c) Sanitary Circumstances.
- (d) Housing.
- (e) Inspection and Supervision of Food.
- (f) Prevalence of and Control over Infectious Diseases.
- (g) Maternity and Child Welfare.
 - (a) Population Census, 1921, 16,214. Separate Dwellings, 4,070.

The Walsingham Rural District comprises an area of 73,837 acres, situated in North-West Norfolk, essentially an agricultural district; the major portion being highly-farmed arable land; the population is fairly evenly divided over the area, the largest town, Fakenham, having a population of about 3,000; there are few factories existing, Melton Constable Railway Works, Miller, Son & Co., Printers, Fakenham, the Farmers' Foundry, Great Ryburgh, Cornish's Norfolk Iron Works, Walsingham, being the only works employing forty people, and coming under the Factory Act of 1901.

Amount of Poor Law Relief for 1925, £3,931.

I again have to report a year of good health, with about the same incidence of infectious disease. An average death rate of 11.8, and again I must comment on the fact that there were 6 deaths over 90, 37 between 80 and 90, and 50 between 70 and 80. Equalling 93 deaths over 70 in a total number of 195.

Birth Rate, 16.6, the lowest since 1919.

Infantile Mortality, 29.4 per 1,000 births, which may be regarded as extremely satisfactory, the rate for England and Wales being 75.

Rainfall for 1925, 23.69 in.

(b) GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

No Hospitals are provided or subsidized by the Local Authority.

No Institutional provision for unmarried mothers.

Ambulance Facilities.

- (a) For Infectious cases, nil.
- (b) In Non-Infectious cases and accidents, there is now a motor ambulance stationed at Fakenham at the instance of the Red Cross Society, for the use of the district. A charge of 6d. a mile is made and there is a fund raised locally for helping necessitous cases and running expenses of car.

Clinics and Treatment Centres.

There is at present only one Maternity and Child Welfare

Centre, namely, at Walsingham. School Clinics are held at the various Council Schools by the School Medical Officers.

Public Health Officers of the Local Authority.

- (1) Part-time Medical Officer of Health.
- (2) One Building Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector combined.
 - (3) One Assistant Sanitary Inspector.

The Inspector has the special certificate for inspection of meat and other foods.

Professional Nursing in the Home.

(a) General.

There are 10 district nurses, and the area is covered by these with the exception of the Ryburgh and Raynham Districts.

The work of these nurses is carried out under the supervision of local committees who raise the necessary funds by voluntary subscriptions, members, and payment for services rendered, the Board of Guardians helping with an annual subscription to each Committee.

The nurses attended 71 confinements in the year.

(b) For infectious diseases, nil.

Midwives.

There is only one midwife who is qualified to practise without the C.M.B.

Chemical Work.

A large number of water analyses are made during the year by the Sanitary Inspector. In doubtful cases a sample is sent to the County Analyst.

(c) SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

The water supply of the district (with the exception of the artesian wells at Melton Constable and Fakenham Council Housing Scheme) is exclusively derived from surface wells of varying depths. These wells are in many cases defective in structure and are very liable to pollution from their immediate surroundings.

The area of pollution in Hempton is still existent, involving some 29 households. The sources of pollution have been remedied, but it will take some time yet for the soil to recover.

No definite steps have yet been taken for a public water supply for Fakenham, which I strongly recommend for the benefit of the town.

Rivers and Streams.

No grave pollution of rivers and streams.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The only sewage schemes in the district are those at Fakenham and Melton Constable. In the rest of the district the pail system is mostly in use, privy vaults being as far as possible abolished. Slop-water is usually utilized in the gardens.

Scavenging.

The systematic removal of house refuse and pail contents is now existent in the following parishes, Fakenham, Blakeney, Hempton, Stiffkey, Great Ryburgh, Walsingham and Melton Constable. In 1922-1923, in connection with the Fakenham scavenging, 23 houses were provided with separate closet accommodation, and 240 houses provided with separate portable dust-bins.

(d) Housing.

(1) General Housing Conditions in the Area.

Fair for a rural district, on the large estates a high standard attained.

(2) (a) Extent of Shortage.

The shortage of houses are in my opinion mainly apparent in Fakenham, Walsingham, and Melton Constable.

(b) Measures taken to meet shortage.

Six housing schemes, in Melton, Fakenham, Ryburgh, Sculthorpe, Hempton, and Wiveton, and erection of cottages by private enterprise with the aid of Government subsidy, and especially by Messrs. Wyman, of Fakenham (10 in Fakenham and 22 in course of erection in Norton).

(e) INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk Supply.

Cow sheds and dairies have been inspected during the year and verbal notice given as to cleansing and whitewashing. No disease has been traceable to the milk supply in the district. The general standard of cleanliness observed has much improved during the past 5 years.

(b) Meat.

The Sanitary Inspector's report of meat condemned indicates the necessity of supervision and the arrangement for inspection at the time of slaughter and for marking under the Public Health (Meat) Regulations, 1924, during the coming year.

(f) PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The most noteworthy feature during the past 5 years has been the gradually diminishing number of cases of Diphtheria. Scarlet Fever remains about stationary, and Enteric Fever rarely met with.

No cases of Malaria, Dysentery or Trench Fever notified. Average Pneumonia cases about 10 to 12.

Arrangements are made with the County Pathological Laboratory for the examination of pathological and bacteriological specimens and free use is made of this facility. Diphtheria anti-toxin supplied free to necessitous cases.

No use has been made of the tests known as the Schick and Dick tests in Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever.

No vaccinations have been performed by the Medical Officer of Health.

One hundred and twenty-eight successful primary vaccinations in the year; 271 births.

Influenzal colds and Chicken-pox were very prevalent in the schools and Influenza in adults in the spring and autumn.

There were 14 deaths from Influenza in 1925.

Cowsheds, Dairies, and Milkshops Order, 1885, and Milk and Dairies Act, 1922.

There are 913 cows kept by persons registered. The milk from 19 farms is sent out of the district—13 sending to London, 2 to Wells, 1 to Norwich, 1 to Sheringham, 1 to Hunstanton, and 1 to Yarmouth.

There are 62 persons on the register; of these 3 are "Retail Purveyors of Milk" only, and the remainder "Wholesale Producers and Purveyors."

Bakehouses.

There are 26 bakehouses, 25 being workshops, *i.e.* without mechanical power, and 1 factory, *i.e.* with mechanical power. By the Factory and Workshops Act, 1901, all workshop bakehouses have to be cleansed every six months.

Housing.

One case of overcrowding was discovered. Statutory notice served and nuisance abated.

Housing and Town Planning Act, 1909.

Ten inspections and reports were made under Housing (Inspection of District) Regulations, 1910.

Four closing orders were made during the year.

Seven closing orders determined.

Plans for 13 new houses were approved and work commenced thereon. Three Licences for the erection of railway carriage bungalows, as "temporary buildings," were issued during the year.

Increase of Rent and Mortgage Interest (Restrictions) Act, 1920.

No application was received under Section 2 of above.

Legal Proceedings.

It was only necessary to institute legal proceedings in one case during the year, in which a summons was issued under

Sec. 12 of the Housing Act, 1925, against the owner of a house at Little Snoring for allowing the premises to be occupied before Closing Order on same had been rescinded. Fined 10s.

Water Supply.

Thirty-six samples of water have been analysed, 8 by Mr. W. L. Sutton, the County Analyst; the results being as follows:—14 unsatisfactory, 22 satisfactory; 1 well has been closed and 7 cleaned out, and water supply improved; and 6 new wells sunk, 4 water certificates issued, providing for 4 houses.

The small water scheme in connection with the Council's Housing Scheme at Fakenham continues to provide an ample and satisfactory supply, the windmill power being sufficient for all ordinary purposes.
