MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report for 1939 which for reasons of economy is presented in a shortened form.

As I did not take up my appointment until the middle of October most of the statistics which follow were compiled by my colleague Dr. Anderson, who was called up for service with the Royal Air Force at the outbreak of War.

The birth-rate per 1,000 population was 14.32 as compared with 15 for England and Wales.

The death-rate, after adjustment, worked out at 19.65, compared with 12.1 for England and Wales. It is slightly higher than that for 1938 which was 10.2.

The infant mortality rate, or deaths of infants under 1 year per 1,000, live births was 36.59 which compares very favourably with 50 the rate for England and Wales.

The Zymotic Death Rate, which refers to deaths from Smallpox, Measles, Whooping Cough, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria and Diarrhœa under 2 years of age, was zero, a very satisfactory state of affairs.

The incidence of notifiable disease has been low during the year, the largest number being that for diphtheria, of which there were 19 cases, 5 of which were brought into the area by evacuee children. This represents a figure of 1.11 per 1,000 population, 1.14 being the rate for England and Wales. It is specially interesting to note the age distribution of these cases, 10 of the 19 occuring between the ages of 5 and 10. Diphtheria is primarily a disease of early school life. Preventive measures therefore to be effective must be applied before or just after the child begins school. Dr. Anderson had inaugurated his immunisation scheme at the beginning of 1939 and these are the figures for the amount of work done up to the end of the year.

There were 10 deaths from Tuberculosis during the year and 19 new cases were notified, while in 1938 there were 20 new cases and 7 deaths.

At the end of 1939, there were 124 cases on the Register, an increase of six since 1938.

During the year there was a change of Staff and the present Sanitary Inspector, Mr. H. E. Gilby took up his appointment only a few weeks before I came to the district.

I should like to acknowledge with gratitude the encouragement I have received from the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee and the loyal co-operation of every member of the Staff.
