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
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

Report of the Medical Officer of Health for
the year ended 31st December, 1967

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the annual report for 1967. Mr. P.A. Page, M.R.S.H., M.A.P.H.I., Cert.S.I.B., additional Public Health Inspector, resigned in February 1967 on accepting a senior post in another area. Mr. D. Brooks, M.A.P.H.I. was appointed additional Public Health Inspector on 20th March, 1967. Mr. R. Loughran, M.A.P.H.I. was appointed an additional Public Health Inspector on 1st April, 1967. This latter post was an increase to the establishment.

The Registrar General's estimated mid-year population was 19,360, an increase of 170 compared with the estimate last year. Live births numbered 310, deaths 223, giving a natural increase, births over deaths, of 87. There was thus a movement into the district of 78 persons. The corrected birth rate was 16.16 per 1000 population, which can be compared with the corrected rate of 16.95 for the administrative county of Norfolk, and 17.2 for England and Wales.

The corrected death rate was 11.73 per 1000 population, which can be compared with the corrected rate of 10.01 for the administrative county of Norfolk, and 11.2 for England and Wales.

The percentage of illegitimate live births to total live births was 4.2%, the same percentage as in 1966 and 1965.

Four hundred and thirty-one cases of infectious diseases were notified during the year. Included in this total were 397 cases of measles and 29 cases of whooping cough, the majority of the latter being mild cases.

May I again take this opportunity of thanking the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their interest and support and the Staff, including the clerical staff of the department, for their help in the preparation of this report, and throughout the year.

Live Birth Rate

The crude birth rate was 16.0 per 1,000 population. The corrected birth rate (using a comparability factor of 1.01) was 16.16 per 1,000 population, compared with 17.2 for England and Wales, and 16.95 for the Administrative County of Norfolk.

Illegitimate Births

The number of illegitimate live births was 13. The percentage of illegitimate live births to the total live births was 4.2%.

Still Births

There were 6 stillbirths in 1967, giving a stillbirth rate per 1,000 total live and stillbirths of 18.9. The rate for England and Wales was 14.8, and for the Administrative County of Norfolk 10.23.

Infant Deaths

Four infants under one year of age died in 1967.

Infant Mortality Rate

This is calculated as the total infant deaths under one year of age per 1,000 live births, and for 1967 was 12.9. The rate for England and Wales was 13.3, and for the Administrative County of Norfolk 16.25.

Legitimate Infant Mortality Rate

This is deaths in legitimate infants per 1,000 legitimate live births, and for 1967 was 13.4.

Illegitimate Infant Mortality Rate

This is deaths in illegitimate infants per 1,000 illegitimate live births, and for 1967 was zero.

Neonatal Mortality Rate

This is deaths of infants under four weeks of age per 1,000 live births. Of the four deaths of infants under one year, two were in infants under four weeks. The rate for 1967 was 6.5.

Early Neonatal Mortality Rate

This is deaths of infants under one week of age per 1,000 live births. Of the two deaths of infants under four weeks of age, both were under one week of age giving a rate of 6.5.

Perinatal Mortality Rate

This is combined stillbirths and deaths under one week of age per 1,000 total live and stillbirths. The rate for 1967 was 25.3.

Maternal Mortality Rate

No deaths occurred in 1967, therefore the rate was zero.

Deaths

The total number of deaths at all ages in the District during 1967 was 223 (males 118; females 105).

Heart disease, with 70 deaths, headed the list of causes of death and caused 31.4% of all deaths. There were 36 cases of fatal coronary disease, these accounting for 16.1% of all deaths. Vascular lesions of the nervous system, with 29 deaths, gave a figure of 13.0%.

If all deaths due to diseases of the heart and circulatory system, (which includes vascular lesions of the nervous system) are totalled, a figure of 79 deaths is attained -- thus causing 35.4% of all deaths in the District.

Cancer caused 56 deaths, giving a figure of 25.1%. Cancer of the lung and bronchus caused 13 deaths or 23.2% of deaths from all types of cancer.

Accidents, which could be preventable, caused 2.7% of all deaths.

The Tuberculin Index does not necessarily indicate tuberculous disease, as the resistance of the majority of pupils is sufficient to overcome the invading germs but it does, however, indicate the degree of opportunity for infection and is thus a useful index of infectious cases in a community.

Poliomyelitis

There were no cases of poliomyelitis in the District in 1967. Immunisation is offered by the County Council and is by oral vaccine.

Excellent co-operation between the office and Architects and builders continued, but some difficulty has been experienced with a minority of builders through failure to notify certain stages of building works at the proper time.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Tipping at the refuse tip at Thursford, which was formerly a railway cutting, commenced during the year, and Falenham tip was closed.

One new cesspool emptier was purchased during the year.

A trial period was arranged for the use of paper sacks in selected villages and a Sub-Committee formed to report to the Council on the results of this trial.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The scheme for Melton Constable and Briston proceeded satisfactorily during the year, and it is hoped to be completed within the two year schedule.

Final details were completed for the extensions to Fakenham Sewage Works and the work should be completed during 1968. It is hoped that during the course of the contract it will be possible to include the sewerage of Sculthorpe, but this is dependent on loan consent being obtained for this purpose.

Work continued on the preparation and submission of schemes for Kettlestone and Little and Great Snoring by the County Public Health Engineer, and at Hindringham by Messrs. A.P.I. Cottorell & Son.

At Little Snoring the existing sewage works were re-habilitated, it was therefore possible to produce a much improved effluent. As a result of this, instructions were given to the County Public Health Engineer to amend the proposed scheme so as to utilise the existing works.

Negotiations began with Crisp Malting Ltd. as to the possible use of their sewage disposal plant for the effluent from Gt. Ryburgh village.

No serious breakdowns occurred in the existing schemes.

A trade waste agreement was made with Jack L. Israel Ltd. regarding the effluent from their proposed factory at Hempton.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

The underground conveniences at Oak Street, Fakenham, continued to cause concern, and it was decided to consider a scheme for the improvement of these conveniences. It is now hoped that a satisfactory scheme can be prepared to bring them to a higher standard of cleanliness.

LEGAL PROCEEDINGS

Successful prosecutions were carried out during the year against Messrs. Seaman's Dairies regarding unfit sausages, and against Messrs. Howard's Dairies regarding a dirty milk bottle.

SWIMMING BATHS

Bylaws were adopted for the control of swimming baths open to the public. The need for this to be done arose following the use of a private bath at Fakenham for the benefit of the general public.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT

Eight thousand, two hundred and sixty-two inspections of properties were made, and eight hundred and nine treatments were given to premises found to be infested with rats or mice.

One hundred and twelve treatments of farm land and premises were carried out. The treatment of farm premises was curtailed during the latter part of the year, owing to Foot and Mouth disease.

Market Foodstalls

The Food Hygiene (Market Stalls and Delivery Vehicles) Regulations 1966 came into operation on 1st January 1967.

There were 13 foodstalls regularly attending Fakenham Market, each stallholder was supplied with a leaflet outlining the provisions of the Regulations. The majority of these stallholders have made a genuine attempt to comply with the Regulations.

Five additional premises were registered for the sale of ice-cream.

Twenty-two samples of ice-cream were taken, none of which were classified as unsatisfactory.

(b) Milk

No new distributors of milk were registered during the year.

Sixty-two samples were taken by the County Council's officers. All but one satisfied the phosphatase test for efficiency of heat treatment, and six failed the methylene blue or cleanliness test.

Four samples of raw water from the sources of Public Supplies were taken, all of which were satisfactory.

Forty-four samples of treated water were taken from various points served by the regional mains, all of which were satisfactory. Three samples were taken from the regional mains of treated water following mains bursts, all of which were satisfactory.

Six samples were taken following extensions to the regional mains, three of which were satisfactory, and three unsatisfactory. Further samples were taken following treatment, which proved satisfactory, after which connections to the extended mains were permitted.

Fifteen samples were taken from private sources, seven of which were satisfactory, and eight unsatisfactory.
