# Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year ended 31st December, 1968

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the annual report for 1968.

The Registrar General's estimated mid-year population was 19,060, which is a decrease of 300 compared with the estimated population for 1967. Births numbered 300. Deaths totalled 263. The natural increase was 37. 239 of the 263 deaths occurred in persons over 55 years of age. 202 occurred in persons over 65 years. Diseases of the heart, and the circulatory systems, and cancer, were the main causes of death.

The contracts for the Melton Constable and Briston Sewerage disposal schemes were completed. The house conversions for the above schemes were still proceeding at the end of the year. The Fakenham sewerage disposal contract was in progress during the year, and it was hoped that completion would take place early in 1969.

The scheme for augmenting the water supplies to Fakenham and the south-west of the district was commenced. The construction of a rising main from Houghton St.Giles to Fakenham and a 500,000 gallons storage tower at Fakenham, were in process of being constructed at the end of the year.

A check on the 12th August showed that 239 residential and holiday caravans, together with 57 tents, were occupied. Most of these were sited in the Blakeney area and were used by holiday makers.

I should like to thank the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee, and the staff of the Public Health Department and the Local Health Office for their interest, support and help throughout the year.

# Live Birth Rate

The crude birth rate was 15.7 per 1,000 population. The corrected birth rate (using a comparability factor of 1.01) was 15.9 per 1,000 population. The birth rates for England and Wales, and the Administrative County of Norfolk, were 16.9 per 1000 and 15.72 per 1000 respectively.

# Illegitimate Births

The number of illegitimate live births was 23. The percentage of illegitimate live births to the total live births was 7.7.

# Still Births

There were 3 stillbirths in 1968, giving a stillbirth rate per 1,000 total live and stillbirths of 9.9. The rate for England and Wales was 14.0, and for the Administrative County of Norfolk 11.33.

# Infant Deaths

Three infants under one year of age died in 1968.

# Infant Mortality Rate

This is calculated as the total infant deaths under one year of age per 1,000 live births, and for 1968 was 10.0. The rate for England and Wales was 18.0, and for the Administrative County of Norfolk 15.0.

# Legitimate Infant Mortality Rate

This is the number of deaths in legitimate infants per 1,000 legitimate live births, and for 1968 was 10.8.

# Illegitimate Infant Mortality Rate

This is the number of deaths in illegitimate infants per 1,000 illegitimate live births, and for 1968 was zero.

# Neonatal Mortality Rate

This is the number of deaths of infants under four weeks of age per 1,000 live births. Of the three deaths of infants under one year, all were in infants under four weeks. The rate for 1968 was 10.0.

# Early Neonatal Mortality Rate

This is the number of deaths of infants under one week of age per 1,000 live births. Of the three deaths of infants under four weeks of age, two were under one week of age, giving a rate of 6.7.

# Perinatal Mortality Rate

This is combined stillbirths and deaths under one week of age per 1,000 total live and stillbirths. The rate for 1968 was 16.5.

# Maternal Mortality Rate

No deaths occurred in 1968, therefore the rate was zero.

# Deaths

The total number of deaths at all ages in the District during 1968 was 263 (males 147: females 116).

Heart disease, with 82 deaths, headed the list of causes of death and caused 31.2% of all deaths. Vascular lesions of the nervous system, with 37 deaths, gave a figure of 14.1% of all deaths.

If all deaths due to diseases of the heart and circulatory system, (which includes vascular lesions of the nervous system) are totalled, a figure of 134 deaths is attained - thus causing 50.9% of all deaths in the District.

Cancer caused 49 deaths, giving a figure of 18.6%. Cancer of the lung and bronchus caused 13 deaths or 26.5% of deaths from all types of cancer.

Mine accidents, which were preventable, caused 3.4% of all deaths.

Three deaths occurred in infants under one year, and were due to malformation and prematurity. The deaths occurred at one hour: eight hours, and nine days.

Excellent co-operation between the office and Architects and builders continued, but some difficulty has been experienced with a minority of builders through failure to notify certain stages of building works at the proper time.

# SEVERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

During the year the contract for Melton Constable and Briston was completed and a formal opening ceremony was held at Briston.

Conversions of the houses are proceeding.

Work on the Fakenham Contract was not completed within the year but it was hoped that completion would take place early in 1969.

The enquiry into the Gt. and Lt. Snoring and Kettlestone Schemes was expected and Hindringham Scheme was made ready for tendering pending approval of Loan Consent. Prelininary work was carried out at Gt.Ryburgh and negotiations continued with Crisp Maltings over the combined use of the Pasveer Ditch.

# REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

One new tip was leased at Gt. Walsingham to replace the Edgar Road tip which was almost full. One new Refuse Vehicle was purchased.

The question of paper sacks for refuse collection was considered, and trials were held in various villages. A firm decision was postponed in view of the difficult financial situation.

One interesting and unusual event was the washing ashore of five dolphins which were removed by order of the Coastguards.

Street Cleaning services were extended during the year, and parttime men were employed in Melton Constable, Blakeney, Little Walsingham and Fakenham.

# FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS

Court action was taken under these Regulations against a baker, which resulted in a conviction and fine of £20.0.0d.

# DILAPIDATED BUILDINGS

Three buildings were dealt with under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1961. The Grove at Hempton was subsequently demolished, Nissen Huts at Little Snoring were restored and repaired, and at the Manor House at Binham negotiations commenced with the Ministry as the building was listed as of architectural and historical interest.

# PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

Efforts continued during 1968 to obtain a site for Public Conveniences at Morston. A contract was prepared for the decorations of the Oak Street Conveniences at Fakenham.

# PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT

Nine thousand, eight hundred and eight inspections of properties were made, and seven hundred and thirty-one treatments were given to premises found to be infested with rats and mice.

Eighty-six treatments of farm lands and premises were carried out. The treatment of farm premises was curtailed during the early part of the year, owing to Foot and Mouth disease.

# Market Foodstalls

The Food Hygiene (Market Stalls and Delivery Vehicles) Regulations 1966 came into operation on 1st January, 1967.

There were sixteen foodstalls regularly attending Fakenham Market, each stallholder was supplied with a leaflet outlining the provisions of the Regulations. The majority of these stallholders have made a genuine attempt to comply with the Regulations.

One additional premises was registered for the sale of Ice Cream.

Fifteen samples of Ice Cream were taken, none of which were classified as unsatisfactory.

# (b) Milk

One new distributor of milk was registered during the year.

Sixty-six samples were taken by the County Council's officers. All but one satisfied the phosphatase test for efficiency of heat treatment, and five failed the methylene blue or cleanliness test.

# (c) Meat Inspection

100% inspection of meat was achieved during the year.
