Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year ended 31st December, 1972

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the annual report for 1972. The report of the Chief Public Health Inspector is included.

SECTION I

GENERAL STATISTICS

- (a) The Walsingham Rural District covers 88,818 acres and is divided into 39 parishes.
- (b) The estimated Mid-Year Home Population for the District for 1972 was 17,920.

Live Birth Rate

The crude birth rate was 15.7 per 1,000 population. The corrected birth rate (using a comparability factor of 1.08) was 17.0 per 1,000 population. The birth rates for England and Wales, and the Administrative County of Norfolk, were 14.8 per 1000 and 15.5 per 1000 respectively.

Illegitimate Births

The number of illegitimate live births was 23. The percentage of illegitimate live births to the total live births was 8.

Still Births

There were 3 stillbirths in 1972, giving a stillbirth rate per 1,000 total live and stillbirths of 11. The rate for England and Wales was 12, and for the Administrative County of Norfolk 12.0.

Infant Deaths

Four infants under one year of age died in 1972.

Infant Mortality Rate

This is calculated as the total infant deaths under one year of age per 1,000 live births, and for 1972 was 14. The rate for England and Wales was 17, and for the Administrative County of Norfolk 16.1.

The Legitimate Infant Mortality Rate equals the deaths in legitimate infants per 1,000 legitimate live births, and for 1972 was 16.

The Illegitimate Infant Mortality Rate equals the deaths in illegitimate infants per 1,000 illegitimate live births, and for 1972 was zero.

The Neonatal Mortality Rate equals the deaths of infants under four weeks of age per 1,000 live births. Of the four deaths of infants under one year, two were in infants under four weeks. The rate for 1972 was 7.

The Early Neonatal Mortality Rate equals the deaths of infants under one week of age per 1,000 live births. Of the two deaths of infants under four weeks of age, both were under one week of age, giving a rate of 7.

The Perinatal Mortality Rate is the combined stillbirths and deaths under one week of age per 1,000 total live and stillbirths. The rate for 1972 was 18.

Maternal Mortality Rate

No deaths occurred in 1972, therefore the rate was zero.

The total number of deaths at all ages in the District during 1972 was 224 (males 105: females 119).

Ischaemic Heart Disease, with 67 deaths, caused 29.9% of all deaths. Vascular lesions of the nervous system, with 28 deaths, equals 12.5% of all deaths.

If all deaths due to diseases of the heart and circulatory system (which includes vascular lesions of the nervous system) are totalled, a figure of 115 is obtained, equal to 51.3% of all deaths in the District.

Cancer caused 45 deaths, giving a figure of 20.1%. Cancer of the lung and bronchus caused 11 deaths (males 9: females 2), or 24.4% of deaths from all types of cancer.

Four deaths were due to accidents.

No prosecutions were made during the year.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

During the year work was commenced on Sewerage Schemes to serve the parishes of Little and Great Snoring and Kettlestone; Great Ryburgh.

Work on the extension to Fakenham Sewage Treatment Works was expected to commence soon after the end of the year.

Night Soil Collection which had been reduced to three days per week returned to a five day programme by including various parishes in Erpingham R.D.C. for which that Council paid.

REFUSE COLLECTION

The completion of the work study programme on refuse collection meant that for the first time statistics were available to enable charges to be made for the collection of Trade Refuse, in accordance with the Council's legal obligations.

SHELLFISH

Further samples of shellfish were taken during the year, and improvements in methods of harvesting and storing were carried out which it is hoped will reduce the risk of pollution to a minimum.

CONTRACTS

The District Community Centre was completed during the year, and work commenced on a new golf course at the district sports Centre.

PROSECUTIONS

Two successful prosecutions were conducted in 1972. One was against a butcher who was fined £25 over the sale of ham which was unfit for consumption.

The other was a further prosecution against a dairy who received fines totalling £42.
