

To the Chairman and Members of Warminster Urban District, Westbury Urban District and Warminster and Westbury Rural District Councils.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

It is pleasing to report that the attached Vital Statistics again compare very favourably with the general figures for England and Wales.

Concern must be expressed, however, with the figures for nonpulmonary tuberculosis and vaccination. Cases with tuberculous glands in the
neck are no longer seen in all large centres of population where all milk
supplies are pasteurised. That they continue to occur in these districts is
undoubtedly due to the persistent use of raw milk. I cannot stress too strongly
that, in these districts the only milk which is safe to drink is pasteurised
milk.

The outbreak of smallpox in South-East Lancashire stressed that our defences against this dangerous disease are not perfect. Vaccination will be performed free of charge by any medical practitioner and not only should infants be vaccinated, but the Ministry of Health recommends re-vaccination on entering and again on leaving school. Such routine vaccination will be amply repaid by the protection afforded to the individual and to the community.

It is regretted that my absence on sick leave has delayed the production of this report and to avoid further delay I omit reference to any other matters. It is my intention to prepare a fuller report covering my first

WATER SUPPLIES

Except for small lengths of main no schemes have been carried out during the year. Amendments have been made to the proposed scheme for the South-East Region, when it was decided that larger pumping equipment and a larger rising main should be provided. Serious consideration has been given to connecting the Heytesbury Estate mains to the South-Eastern Scheme.

New connections to the mains are being made weekly and during the year 123 new ones were made for dwellings and for agricultural purposes.

Samples of water have been taken from all points of the mains in the district regularly and with one or two exceptions were satisfactory.

SEWERAGE ---

The position of sewage disposal in this district remains much the same as in previous years with the exception of some improvements to sewage disposal works at Dilton Marsh, Chapmanslade Council Houses, Corsley Council Houses, Tytherington Council Houses and Horningsham Council Houses, which had to be made owing to trouble with effluents.

More consideration is now being given to the sewage disposal plants on the Council's Housing Sites and more efficient plants are being installed.

The Council employ the services of the Hampshire Cleansing Service to clear all the plants. This is a very expensive item for the Council and in all probability the Council will consider the purchasing of a cesspool emptier, as the number of sewage disposal plants is increasing.

The work of cleansing ditches and other attention to the sewage disposal plants is still carried out by a squad of three men, and although I consider this staff is insufficient for the amount of work entailed, the Council do not feel that any further labour can be employed on this work at present.

There is still, of course, a very urgent need for sewerage schemes, especially in the Parishes of Dilton Marsh, North Bradley and Southwick, and I am afraid now that water has been installed in all the parishes of the North-East area the drainage question will be a serious problem in the next few years.

HOUSING

(a) New Housing Schenes

Building operations are in hand in the Parishes of Bratton, Codford, Corsley, Edington, Knook, Steeple Ashton and Mest Ashton.

(b) Future Housing Programme

The Council have been allocated twenty-eight house's for next year.

(c) Private Enterprise

Eighteen Licences have been issued for the erection of Private Enterprise dwellings. Four dwellings have been completed during the year. Twenty-five Licences have been allocated to the Council for 1953.

(d) Camps and Requisitioned Property

I am pleased to report that all hutments on Camp Site No. 8 at Steeple

Ashton have been demolished and the tenants re-housed. Two more dwellings have been de-requisitioned. The number of huts occupied on all sites now only totals forty-six.

Details of Camp Sites.

No. 4 Site, Steeple Ashton - 11 huts.
No. 10 Site, Steeple Ashton - 12 huts.
Keevil - 3 huts.
Bishopstrow Camp - 3 huts.
Bury Camp - 17 huts.

Several huts have been demolished on Bury Camp and the tenants re-housed. Arrangements have been made for the tenants of the remaining huts at Bishopstrow Camp to be re-housed and it is hoped that the site will be cleared.

(e) Housing Survey

The Housing Survey is progressing slowly. As I mentioned in my previous report, action under Category 5 is suspended for the time being and any serious cases are recommended for re-housing.

(f) Housing Act, 1936 and Public Health Act, 1936

No statutory action has been taken under either of these Acts during the year. Eleven Informal Notices have been served, with which eight have been complied.

ICE-CREAM

There has been a further increase during the present year of three premises registered for the storage and sale of ice-crean. This makes the total number of premises now registered, thirty-eight.

FOOD PREMISES

The number of food shops, including cafes, in the district now totals eighty-seven. These premises were regularly inspected and where premises were found to be below standard necessary action was taken and the premises were made satisfactory.

SLAUGHTER OF ANIMALS ACT

There are five Licensed Slaughtermen in the district, but there are no Ministry of Food Slaughterhouses in use in the district. There is one private Slaughterhouse which is used for emergency cases, and pigs.

TENTS. VANS AND SHEDS

There are two licensed camping sites in the district and eleven licences were issued to individual persons to station and use moveable dwellings.

SALVAGE AND REFUSE

Salvage and refuse is still being colleted fortnightly from all Parishes. One new tip has been obtained in Heywood Park, making a total of three tips in the district.

rIt has still not been found possible to carry out a scheme of properly controlled tipping with the small staff employed. Penleigh Tip, however, has been much improved and has been levelled with a bull-dozer. A large amount of covering material has been spread over the surface and the face has been reduced.

A small amount of salvage material is still sold to dealers.

RODENT DESTRUCTION

Rodent destruction has been carried out very satisfactorily by a fulltime operator and all cases brought to the Council's notice have been dealt with forthwith. The operator has completed a survey of all farms in the district and where infestations were found appropriate action was taken.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR TO THE URBAN DISTRICT OF WESTBURY FOR THE YEAR 1952.

HOUSING

Buring the year, two houses were completed on the Oldfield Park Housing Estate. Owing to protracted negotiations relating to the sale of the land, the building programme was retarded to a considerable degree.

The total number of occupied houses on this estate is now 132. Seven private enterprise houses were also completed during the year.

Eight hutments in Eden Vale were converted to temporary living accommodation during the year.

At the 31st December, 1952, the building programme at Oldfield Park was well under way and future reports should show a considerable improvement in numbers completed per annum.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Approximately 1,200 tons of domestic refuse were disposed of during the year by the method known as controlled tipping.

A proposal by Melksham U.D.C. to share the tipping facilities in Westbury was received and given general approval by the Westbury U.D.C. subject to the observations of the Railway Executive from whom the tip is rented. No such observations have yet been received.

The Council were fortunate during the year in getting approximately 2,000 cubic yards of covering naterial for the tip from roadwork excavations in the district.

The replacement of non-approved type dustbins by those of approved type continues to improve slowly but surely. The Council voted against buying dustbins for re-sale to Council tenants.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The Sewage Works at Frogmere continue to operate satisfactorily during normal dry weather flows. In times of storm, however, the present pumping and storage facilities are inadequate to deal with the combined flow and the overflow is, of necessity, brought into action. The filtration beds, fed from the overflow, become overloaded and are almost continually under water.

Mossrs. A.P.I. Cotterell & Son, Consulting Engineers, 54, Victoria Street, S. W. I., are preparing a report upon the sewerage and sewage disposal facilities in Westbury. It is expected that this report will be in the Council's hands in early 1953.

A relief storm water sewer 2! O" in diameter has been aid in the Oldfield Road area. This has proved advantageous in relieving the flood conditions previously known there.

Although the 12" sewer in Frognore Road has been scraped, this has not had the effect of obviating local flooding during heavy rainfalls and it is therefore a reasonable assumption that this main is inadequate to do the work which it is called upon to do.

Field Tests of the effluent from the humus tarks at the Sewage works have shown it to be within the prescribed standards.

Negotiations with the W.D. for the repair of the Dortmund Tank have now been completed and Contract documents are being prepared for this work.

SANITARY INSPECTIONS

An analysis of inspections for the year is appended.

PEST CONTROL

The Rodent Officer, whose services are shared with the Warminster U.D.C., visited dwellinghouses, factories, farms, shops etc. in the district. The sewers and the refuse tip have been treated regularly. Satisfactory results have been achieved.

WATER

Water samples have been taken at regular intervals and bacteriological examination of these has shown that is is of excellent quality.

FACTORY AND SHOPS ACT

The number of inspections carried out during the year is to be found in the analysis of Sanitary Inspections.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACTS

Samples of designated milks, ice-cream etc. were taken at regular intervals. In the main satisfactory results were obtained. The few cases which produced unfavourable results were followed up until satisfactory results were obtained.

During the year 101 Condemnation Certificates were issued in respect of foodstuffs (mostly tinned goods) voluntarily surrendered for examination.
