The Fural District of Warminster and Westbury is in South West Wiltshire at the South Western corner of Salisbury Plain and includes within its boundaries the Urban Districts of Warminster and Westbury. A part of the Plain containing the Parish of Imber is in military occupation and closed to the public.

The area in the past was mainly given to agricultural pursuits. A trading estate has been developed in the parish of Heywood and new industries are being developed there. They comprise Light Engineering, Processing of Scrap Metal, Concrete Products, Warehouses and Furniture Repositories, Packing and Distribution of Surgical Supplies, Manufacturers of Mobile Houses, Animal Food Factory and a Mushroom Farm. Other industries in the Rural District include works for agricultural machinery and a tannery.

Meny of the villages provide doraitory facilities for workers in the Urban Districts of Frome, Melksham, Trowbridge, Warminster and Westbury. The district is roughly bisected by the watershed feeding the Bristol Avon to the North West and the Hampshire Avon to the East. Through it flows traffic from Bristol to Southampton by the Trunk Road A.36, and from North to South by the A.350. The M.4 Motorway, providing rapid access to London, Wales, The Midlands and the North, runs 25 miles to the North of the Eural District. The Westbury White Horse commemorating Alfred's victory over the Danes is a familiar sight to travellers on the main line of the Western Region of British Railways, which also passes through the district. Longleat House in its rural surroundings of great beauty is a focal point for both national and international visitors.

VITAL STATISTICS

The population figures given are home populations (i.e. including pembers of the armed Forces stationed in the area). The figures for deaths include those of members of the Armed Forces. The Area comparability factors for use with birth and death rates contain adjustments for boundary changes and make allowance for the way in which the sex and age distribution of the local population differs from that for England and Wales as a whole. In addition, the death rate area comparability factors have been adjusted specifically to take account of the presence of any residential institutions in each area. When local birth and death rates are multiplied by the appropriate area comparability factor, they are comparable with the rate for England and Wales or with the corresponding adjusted rate for any other area.

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

a) Laboratory facilities

All samples requiring laboratory examination are sent to the Public Health Laboratory in Bath. Not only are reports on these samples available from the Medical Director but he is always willing to visit the District, and the Medical Practitioners and myself find this personal contact most satisfactory and rewarding.

b) Ambulance Service

The ambulance service is provided and controlled by the Wiltshire County Council. The service in this district is controlled from Trowbridge, where the station is manned continuously. A sub-station in warminster also serves the district. Non-emergency calls must originate from a doctor, dentist or midwife.

To obtain an ambulance in an emergency:Where there is a dialling system in operation, dial 999
Where there is no dialling system, lift the receiver and ask
for an ambulance.

c) Midwifery, Home Mursing, Health Visitors and Home Helps

These services are provided and controlled by the Wiltshire County Council, County Hall, Trowbridge, Telephone Trowbridge 3641.

d) Clinics and Treatment Centres

Special arrangements for the treatment of anthrax have been provided by the South Western Regional Hospital Board at Claverton Down Hospital, Bath. This hospital also holds anti-anthrax serum for prophylactic use and for the treatment of patients sensitive to penicillin.

Arrangements for immunization against anthrax can be made through the Wiltshire County Council. All tannery workers regarded as being at risk in the Rural District have been immunized against anthrax.

Poisons Information Service

A national Poisons Information Service has been established at Guy's Hospital, London S.E.I. (HOP 7600) to provide information to medical practitioners so as to facilitate treatment in cases of acute poisoning. This 24 hour service is not available to members of the public.

Organophosphorus Poisoning

Certain insecticides contain organophosphorus poisons, e.g. parathion. Treatment is by pyridine-2-aldoxine-methiodide (PAM). A small supply of PAM is available in the Royal Infirmary Pharmacy (Telephone no. Bristol 22041).

An emergency service for the treatment of cases of organophosphorus insecticide poisoning is also provided by the Medical Division C.D.E.E. (Ministry of Supply), Porton Wilts. (Telephone No. Idmiston 211).

During the period the water supply in the Bural District derived from the mains of the West Wilts Water Board was satisfactory both in quality and quantity. Unfortunately the Wiltshire County Council has again decided against fluoridation of these supplies which are deficient in natural fluorides. Analysis made of the Burtonfield and Dunkerton sources showed the fluoride content to be less than O.1 parts per million.

Mr. A.H. Eagle, Surveyor and Chief Public Health Inspector reports as follows:-

SEMERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Work on laying the sewers in North Bradley and Yarnbrook were completed during the early part of the year.

Tenders for Whorwellsdown (Phase I) were received from Contractors, and approval was received from the Ministry of Housing and Local Government to commence work.

A local enquiry was conducted by the Ministry at Upton Scudamore, but no results of this enquiry had been received by the end of the year.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

A scheme for providing a weekly refuse collection at Southwick, Achton Park Area, Heywood and Hawkeridge Area was introduced at the beginning of the year. Further requests were received from districts receiving fortnightly collections for a more frequent service. This could only be possible by the purchase of another refuse vehicle.

Attempts to locate additional areas for tipping refuse in the south of the area were unsuccessful. Discussion took place with the Agents acting for the owner of Knook Tip with a view to extending the tipping area. A site has been located in the north of the area and negotiations are being actively pursued with the owner.

A number of complaints were received concerning flies in the vicinity of Penleigh Tip. The purchase of a larger excavator and a more frequent dusting of insecticide kept the problem under control.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

Inspections carried out during the year were mainly confined to newly registered premises and premises where defects were outstanding. The defects found were mainly of a minor nature, namely lack of an abstract notice, or thermometer.

No prosecutions were taken during the year.

One accident was reported. This was caused by a person lifting a wooden pallet and straining his back. This is the lowest number of accidents recorded in the last few years. Circulation of all premises with a letter drawing attention to the obligation of employers to notify accidents (Section 43) is under consideration.

Three premises were newly registered during the year and four premises ceased to come within the scope of the Act.

CIVIC AMENITIES ACT 1967

Eight vehicles found abandoned were dealt with under this Act. One vahicle was towed into the Council's refuse tip at the request of the owner and disposed of. The remainder were removed from their places of abandonment by the owners after service of informal notices.

Four of the eight vehicles were abandoned at Council House Estates.

PETROLEUM ACTS

Eight petroleum storage tanks were due for pressure testing during the year. Six were tested, and withstood a pressure of 10 lbs. per sq. in. for 24 hours. Notification was received that one tank due for testing was no longer used for the storage of petroleum spirit.

HOUSING

(a) Council Housing programme

Four bungalows and 6 flats at Codford were completed together with 6 garages. The construction of four bungalows and 14 garages were commenced at Steeple Ashton.

(b) Private Enterprise Housing

One hundred and fifteen houses were completed during the year and one hundred and forty were under construction at the end of December 1969.

(c) Improvement Grants

During the year thirteen houses were improved with the aid of Discretionary Grants totalling £5,670. and twenty two houses were improved with the aid of Standard Grants totalling £4,998.12.7.

(d) Housing Repairs and Rents Act

No applications for Certificates of Disrepair were received furing 1969.

(e) Housing Act, 1957 and Public Health Acts, 1936 and 1961

Forty four informal notices were served during the year, and twenty one complied with.
