The above statistics relating to deaths are explained by the situation in the District of a hospital to which aged persons are admitted from many other districts. When a Warminster resident dies in any hospital outside the district he is still regarded, for statistical purposes, as being a resident of Warminster and is included in the Warminster figures. Since 1953 all deaths in hospitals for the chronic sick and mental and mental deficiency hospitals have been assigned to the area of the hospital, whether or not the patients had originally been admitted from that area. This practice explains the inflation of the death rate for Warminster, and the true position is set out in the table on page 5.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

a) Laboratory Facilities.

The district is fortunate in having laboratory facilities available to the East and to the West, i.e. in the Pathological Department of the Salisbury Infirmary and the Public Health Laboratory in Bath. Practitioners in the district use the most convenient laboratory, a practice followed by this Department when forwarding specimens of water, milk, ice-cream, or suspected foodstuffs for bacteriological investigation.

b) Ambulance Service.

The Ambulance service is provided and controlled by the Wiltshire County Council. The service to this district is controlled from Bradford-on-Avon where the station is manned continuously. A sub-station in Warminster also serves the district. Non-emergency calls must originate from a doctor, dentist, or midwife.

To obtain an ambulance in an emergency:-

where there is a dialling system in operation, dial 999

where there is no dialling system, lift the receiver and ask for an ambulance.

c) Midwifery, Home Nursing, Health Visitors and Home Helps.

These services are provided and controlled by the Wiltshire County Council, County Hall, Trowbridge, telephone Trowbridge 3641.

d) Clinics and Treatment Centres.

The following Clinics serve the districts:-

Progressive Hall, North Bradley at 2.30 - 4 p.m. on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month.

Trowbridge C.C. Clinic, The Halve, at 2 p.m. on every Tuesday and Thursday.

3. Paediatrics.

Warminster Hospital on second Friday in each month.
Trowbridge and District Hospital third Friday in each month.

4. Diphtheria Immunization.

Immunization is undertaken by the County Council and Medical Officers visit the schools in outlying villages at specific dates for this purpose. All family doctors will also carry out immunization.

The Warminster Clinic is held on the fourth Friday of every month at 2 p.m. at the Methodist Schoolroom, George Street, Warminster.

The Westbury Clinic is held on the fourth Thursday of every month at 2.30 p.m. at the Laverton Institute, Westbury.

Nursing equipment and appliances can be loaned from the Medical Loan Depot in charge of Mrs. G. (George) Nicholls, Marshlands, Upper Marsh Road, Warminster.

An annual payment is made to the West Wiltshire Hospital Management Committee for mortuary facilities at the Sambourne Hospital, Warminster. The visiting Pathologist has expressed his satisfaction with the facilities provided.

Mass Radiography.

One thousand three hundred and thirty seven (1337) persons were examined by this method during the year resulting in two (2) persons being referred to the Chest Physicians.

It can be seen that no case of smallpox or diphtheria has occurred since 1948. The Family Doctors carry out vaccination against smallpox and the percentage of children vaccinated in infancy is very good in comparison with the rest of the country. I am grateful to the doctors for their co-operation in getting this most important work done. The figures also bear witness that the parents in this district are more sensible and have a greater regard for their children than parents elsewhere.

The figures for diphtheria immunization are not so good because only 69 children were immunized during the first year of life. Every parent should aim at having the infant vaccinated before it reaches four months of age. It can then be immunized against diphtheria and whooping cough before reaching the age of eight months. Such immunization is offered by the County Council at their clinics. The Family Doctors will also do this and in addition protect the child against tetanus without any extra injections.

During the year Raw Tuberculin Tested milk was being sold by five retailers. One can be ignored since he closed the business early in the year. The milk sold by other three persons was only sampled seven times. Since T.T. milk is not a safe milk to drink samples should be taken at least once each month from each retailer for examination.

Sampling has shown the pasteurised milk sold in the town to comply with all statutory requirements. I repeat my previous advice to inhabitants that pasteurized milk is the only safe milk to drink since cleanliness relating to milk is not synonymous with safety.

In each annual report since taking office in 1948 I have stressed the potential danger of the water supply derived from the Shearwater sources. Closer control of chlorination has improved the efficiency of the treatment and in 1955 only three (3) samples out of forty-seven (47) showed coliform organisms as opposed to fourteen (14) out of forty-seven (47) in 1953 and nine (9) out of forty-seven (47) in 1954. The necessary standard for a treated water has not yet been reached since the Ministry of Health states categorically that the treated water should be always entirely free from such organisms.

The untreated water is sometimes grossly polluted and a breakdown of chlorination coincident with such pollution could lead to a disaster. Another undesirable quality in the water is its acid reaction. Consultant Engineers and Bacteriologists have advised the Council in similar terms. The water supply to the District should be obtained from another source as soon as possible.

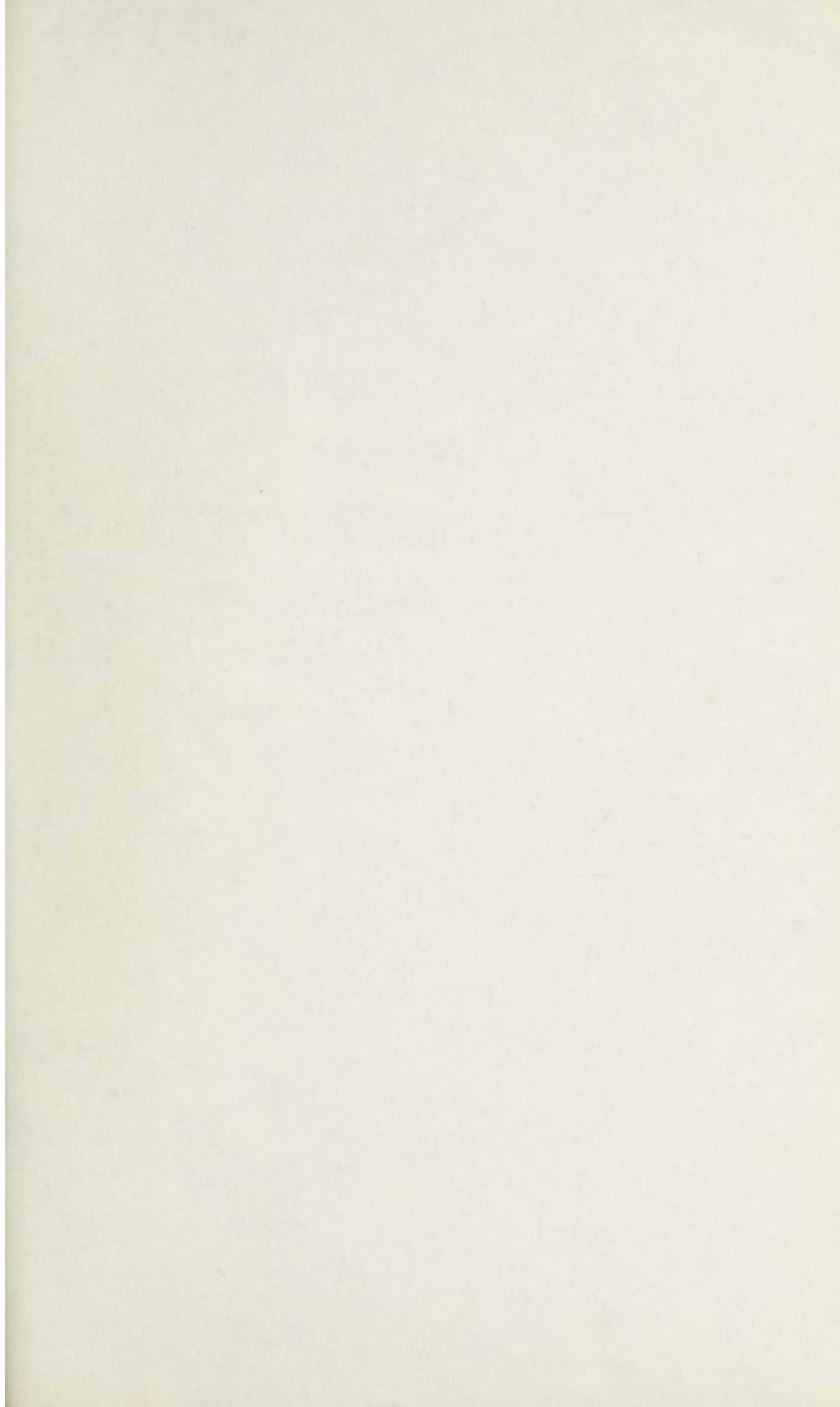
