SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

- 1. (i) Water.—Despite the War it has been possible for the work of providing a piped supply of water to Radford Semele and an extension of the Whitnash supply to Harbury Lane to be completed.
- (ii) Drainage and Sewerage.-There is no change to report.
- 2. (i) Closet Accommodation.—There is no change to report excepting in Whitnash, where five pail closets were replaced by W.C.'s.

(ii) Public Cleansing.—Public Cleansing is carried out in nine parishes by direct labour, but owing to shortage of staff and vehicles the service has been greatly curtailed.

The new Cesspool Emptier, however, has been a notable improvement. It is fitted for the collection of nightsoil pails.

D. HOUSING.

- 3. Overcrowding.—There has, as could only be expected, been a great deal of overcrowding in various parts of the District, but it has not been possible to ascertain the extent. Much of it was of a temporary character.
- 4. Re-housing.—The fourteen new houses at Cubbington referred to last year are not yet completed. It is hoped that it will be possible to do so in the near future.

Throughout the District, houses subject to Clearance or Demolition Orders which became vacant during the year were in most cases relet to eligible tenants, such houses being made subject to licences to relet.

- 5. Fitness of Houses.—Six houses were thoroughly repaired following notices issued in relation to houses calling for urgent attention.
- 6. Temporary Housing.—Some concern has been caused by the number of temporary hutments which have been erected recently, many without plan or notice being given. These are inspected, and where possible licensed as temporary buildings.

E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supply.—The position regarding the production of milk remains fairly satisfactory. The year brought some improvements in cowshed and dairy buildings, and included:—Rebuilding of three cowsheds, erection of three cooling sheds, provision of new coolers, installation of three steam sterilizers. One cowshed was discontinued.

There was a considerable increase in the number of milking machines installed, and at practically all farms producing Accredited milk sterilizing appliances are in use.

The County Council issued 77 licences to accredited producers in this District, the same number as last year, and 7 licences to producers of Tuberculin Tested milk, as compared with six last year.

Meat Inspections.—There is no slaughter house in use in the Ministry of Food Centralized Scheme, but frequent visits were paid to the slaughter house supplying two institutions in the District, and a large number of inspections were undertaken in connection with pigs, for which licences to slaughter had been issued by the Food Executive Officer. In all, 151 beats, 283 pigs, 385 sheep and lambs, and 15 calves were inspected.

The total weight of meat not considered fit for human consumption amounted to 1,150lbs., and comprised 1,007lbs. of beef, 80lbs. of pork, and 63lbs. of mutton. In addition two beasts, the subject of emergency slaughter, were rejected but were forwarded to an abattoir outside the District for disposal. Included in the total was one beast found to have suffered from septic pericarditis. Other conditions encountered included localised tuberculosis and parasitic affections

Other Food.—Numerous visits were paid to retail shops and premises used for the storage of food. A large number of eggs and quantities of tinned food were rejected as unfit for human consumption.

54 Plans of New Buildings were received.

8 were for houses.

The remainder were Temporary and other Buildings.

Diphtheria Immunisation.—During the year immunisation of the school children was commenced, and up to December 31st 1,221 children between 5 and 15 years were treated, also 141 under 5 years.
