C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

- 1. (i) Water,—The new supply at Radford has continued to be a success. The Borough of Leamington is being supplied from this scheme, together with water from the Whitnash supply, at the combined rate of approximately three million gallons per month.
- (ii) Drainage and Sewerage.—There are no changes to report.
- 2. (i) Closet Accommodation.—There is no change to report.
- (ii) Public Cleansing.—This service has been one of great difficulty even for war-time. The position has, however, improved during 1943, one team of four men having been obtained.

D. HOUSING.

Full particulars of the usual tables have been compiled and are being kept for record purposes.

- 3. Overcrowding.—There is little to add to my last Report. Overcrowding has, however, varied somewhat.
- 4. Re-housing.—Eight houses for agricultural workers have been approved and are in course of erection.
- 5. Fitness of Houses.—Inspections of houses have been carried out following complaints. No routine house-to-house surveys are possible. It is hoped that the new scheme whereby certificates for Essential Repairs will be issued, may have some good effect in connection with the more urgent repairs.
- 6. Temporary Housing.—Concern increases about the number of temporary hutments which have been erected, many without plan or notice being given. These are inspected, and where possible licensed as temporary buildings.

E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supply.—The position regarding the production of milk remains fairly satisfactory. No new cowsheds were erected during the year, and only minor improvements were made to sheds.

The County Council has issued 68 licences to accredited producers in this district, a decrease of 6 compared with last year, and 9 licences to producers of Tuberculin Tested Milk, an increase of 2.

Meat and Other Foods.—Visits have been made in connection with emergency slaughter and cottagers' pigs. A total of 800 lbs. of beef, 100 lbs. of pork, and 150 lbs. of bacon has been rejected as unfit for human consumption. Visits have also been made to canteens and shops, and a quantity of canned food has been surrendered.
