TO THE MAYOR, ALDERMEN AND COUNCILLORS OF THE BOROUGH OF WEDNESBURY.

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on your Public Health Services in respect of the year 1940, prepared in accordance with Circular 2314 of the Ministry of Health. It is, as was that of 1939, an abridged report interim in character; it includes, however, certain tables omitted last year embodying figures for 1939 and 1940 in order that they shall be readily available for comparison.

The vital and other statistics show that despite a mode of life unparalleled and undreamt of—the health of our people has been well maintained. In achieving this, courage and fine determination have played no small part.

In their efforts to guard the public health and to assist in the Casualty Services of the Air Raid Precautions Department your staff have been unremitting.

On the 31st of August your Chief Sanitary Inspector, Mr. Herbert Topping, retired after 33 years devoted service—a period which has seen an improvement and advance in sanitary and housing conditions which is a source of congratulation and astonishment especially to those who return to the Borough after a lapse of time.

Times of war are times calling for increased vigilance and care, and I trust the public will increasingly use the facilities provided for preventive inoculation. I am grateful to you, Mr. Mayor, and the Chairmen and Committee Members for much kindness and help; to my colleague, Dr. Allen, for her loyal assistance in a particularly difficult year; to the whole of the Departmental Staffs for devoted service, and for the ready co-operation of my colleagues in private practice, and the Officers of other Departments for assistance readily accorded.

Number of women attending during year : 350. Percentage of women confined who attended : 59.7. It is gratifying to find that over 81 per cent. of the babies born in the Borough attended the Infant Welfare Centres. Total attendances, however, on account of the black-out and the severe winter, have shewn a fall of some 12 per cent.

The Infantile Mortality Rate, 61.2, whilst slightly higher than 1939 (the lowest ever recorded in the Borough), is still below the two previous peace-time years, 1937 and 1938.

Institutional Treatment.

82 mothers were admitted to Hallam Hospital, 66 being referred through the Clinics, 16 by private practitioners.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

Two cases were notified during the year; in neither instance did impairment of vision result.

Maternal Mortality.

There was only one death directly connected with childbirth; all cases are subject to investigation and report.

Child Life Protection.

Under Sections 206 to 220 of the Public Health Act, 1936, one child was being received for reward at the end of the year.

Free Milk.

Modified dried milks were provided in accordance with the Council's scale, when ordered by a Medical Officer, as in previous years, at an approximate cost of ± 122 17s. 8d. Forms for obtaining liquid milk, either free or at reduced rate, were completed in respect of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five years of age for submission to the Local Food Executive Officer with whom close co-operation is maintained.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water.

Sources of supply are as detailed in the report for the year 1938. Bacteriological and chemical tests have maintained their usual satisfactory standard.

The total rainfall for the year was 25.54 inches.

SECTION D.

HOUSING.

Mr. Arthur Booth, M.I.M.C.E., F.R.I.B.A., M.I.Struct.E., Borough Surveyor, reports that during the year no houses have been erected by the Corporation; 19 houses were erected by private enterprise. Since 1st January, 1919, 3,086 houses have been erected by the Corporation, 1,216 by private enterprise, making a total of 4,302.

On the 1st July the Council applied to the Minister of Health for an Order extending by three years time limited by the Wednesbury (Dale Street, Nos. 1 and 3) Housing Confirmation Orders, 1937, and on the 16th October extension was granted to the 9th August, 1943.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

In two cases Council houses were found to be infested on more than one occasion.

Small Dwellings Acquisition Act.

The Borough Treasurer, Mr. J. S. Hodges, F.I.M.T.A., A.S.A.A. informs me that no advances were made during 1940, and that since the Act was brought into operation in 1934 advances totalling $\pm 30,040$ have been made in respect of 64 houses.

One sample of milk was slightly deficient in fat and the vendor was cautioned.

A sample of milk taken from a retailer was found to contain a small amount of added water. Further samples taken from the wholesaler concerned, who was outside the area, contained a slight amount of added water, and the vendors were cautioned.

An informal sample of ground gentian root, from a retailer, was found to be adulterated with powdered fruit stone shells. A repeat sample contained 10 per cent. of barley husk. Proceedings were instituted and the case was dismissed as the retailer had a warranty from the wholesaler.

All the pasteurised samples except one satisfied the phosphatase test. In addition, one sample of sterilized milk was taken and was satisfactory.

SECTION F.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

January and February, 1940, were characterised by the severest winter conditions since 1891, and although no epidemic of influenza was experienced there was an increased incidence of respiratory infection particularly affecting the elderly and productive of increased mortality in the older age groups.

No epidemic of infectious disease arose, but Diphtheria cases were prevalent during the autumn.

Tables shewing the incidence of infectious disease by age groups are appended in respect of the years 1939 and 1940.

Whooping Cough and Measles only became notifiable from November 1st, 1939.

146 Throat Swabs were sent to the County Laboratory, 27 being positive for Diphtheria, 119 negative.

Immunisation against Diphtheria.

This was carried out as detailed in my report for 1938.

The number of children receiving protective treatment was less than in 1939, but an intensive canpaign now in operation is producing a more satisfactory acceptance rate.

From September, 1936, to December 31st, 1940, 1,185 children of school age and 504 of from one to five years of age have received the full course of injections.

TO THE MAYOR, ALDERMEN AND COUNCILLORS OF THE BOROUGH OF WEDNESBURY.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Minister of Health has intimated by Circular 2314 that Annual Reports should be dealt with as laid down by Circular 2067, dated 19th July, 1940, and that such Report for 1940 shall be regarded as an interim one. Therefore the usual statistics and records will be carefully preserved until after the termination of the war.

The following matters, however, I feel are rightfully submitted to you as a brief indication of the activities of your Sanitary Inspector's Department.

Your Chief Inspector, Mr. Herbert Topping, retired from your service on the 31st August, 1940, and I took up the position and control of the department from the 1st September, 1940.

Mr. A. Matthews, Additional Sanitary Inspector, enlisted in H.M. Forces in February, and Mr. J. Barber, Clerk, enlisted in October, 1940. A new junior clerk, Mr. S. Matthewson, was engaged and commenced duties in December, 1940. For the major part of the year therefore the department was carried on by two Sanitary Inspectors and two clerks.

During the year, 3,018 inspections have been carried out. Every effort has been made to deal with complaints, maintain the proper supervision of food supplies, aid in the control of notifiable infectious diseases, and maintain the efficient collection and disposal of house refuse.

Under the Public Health Act, 1936, 1,066 visits were made to houses for initial inspection and subsequent re-inspection of works in progress regarding complaints at 314 houses. In addition, 63 visits to common lodging houses were made.

Although action under the Housing Act, 1936, gradually reduced, 397 visits were recorded for inspections and enquiries during the year. Only one house was represented as unfit for human habitation and one Demolition Order was made. Under the Factories Act, 1937, 52 inspections were made.

The centralisation of the slaughter of animals for food has resulted in one slaughterhouse at the bacon factory of Messrs. Hollingsworth, Union Street, Wednesbury, being left to our supervision. I wish to place on record the commendable cooperation experienced with the personnel of this firm with your Inspectors. During the year 327 visits were made and 21,277 carcases were inspected.

Butchers' shops and other food shops received 162 visits.

45 visits to the Markets were made.

The weight of food condemned during the year was as follows : Meat : 11 tons, 15 cwts. 1 qr. 2 lbs. Other foods : 11 cwts. 1 qr. 20 lbs.

In connection with the control of Infectious Diseases 212 visits were made.

39 houses were disinfested and cleansed of bugs. 80 visits were recorded in connection with this work.

For inspections of sanitary conveniences under the Shops Act, 1934, 18 visits were made.

Seven visits were made for the purpose of obtaining samples of milk, water and tinned food for the purpose of submitting the same for bacteriological analysis.

The remaining inspections were of an unclassified miscellaneous type and include interviews, so helpful to the progress of the work.

As regards the Collection and Disposal of House Refuse, I feel I have at least maintained progress, and trust I shall show effective progress during the coming year. During the year for inspections of refuse tips and other work, 106 visits are recorded. I have to thank you for the provision of an additional vehicle which has proved of great assistance in coping with the "salvage" work.

The total weight of refuse collected (estimated weight), 10,054 tons, was mainly disposed of at two tips, known as "Old Park" and "Mounts." by controlled tipping, but approximately 200 tons of this was dealt with by incineration. In addition, 175 tons of "salvage" was collected. In conclusion, I wish to express appreciation of the loyal co-operation of Mr. G. H. Suggitt, your Additional Sanitary Inspector, and Messrs. Higgs and Barber, the two clerks of the Department.

For the kindly welcome and co-operation shown to me by all members of the Council under such difficult war-time conditions, I record my sincere appreciation.
