Mr. Mayor, Madam, and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1959, with which is incorporated that of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

The Vital Statistics of the Borough shew that a total of 594 Live Births was recorded during the year, compared with the corresponding figure of 571 for the year before. The resultant Live Birth Rate thus rose to 17.0 per thousand total population. The Adjusted Birth Rate (applying the Registrar General's comparability factor for this district) was 15.6, slightly below the national figure of 16.5. Still births fell from 16 to 10 giving a rate of 15.6 per thousand live and stillbirths, compared with the national figure of 20.7. The number of infants dying under one year of age was 14, compared with 19 in the previous year, the mortality rate being 23.5 per thousand live births, compared with 33.2 in 1958. Of these children 11 died under one month, the mortality rate being 18.5, compared with 24.5 the previous year.

The number of deaths recorded during 1959 was 358, compared with 364 for the previous twelve months. The calculated Crude Death Rate was thus 10.3 per thousand total population, compared with 10.4, and the Adjusted Death Rate for the Borough was 14.2, compared with 14.3 for the year before. The rate for England and Wales for the same period was 11.6. The principal case of death was once again Heart Disease in its various forms, accounting for 30.1% of all deaths, followed by Respiratory Conditions (Pneumonia, etc.), 16.7% with Cancer (all forms) accounting for 16.4%. It is observed that for the first time for many years Cancer has been deposed from its position as the second commonest cause of death. The Natural Increase of the population (excess of births over deaths) was 236, an increase of 29 on last year's figures.

Concerning Notifiable Infectious Diseases, the year in question showed a sharp rise as compared with 1958, there being 412 cases as against 98. Measles proved to be by far the most common with 341 cases, followed by Pneumonia with 22 cases. Notifications of

Whooping Cough remained very low at only 16 cases. The fact that the year reached its end without any cases of Food Poisoning or Dysentery being reported was a matter of great satisfaction.

In pursuance of the programme of slum clearance which was agreed by the Council some years ago, a Public Inquiry was held during 1959 into the third group of unfit properties, namely, those comprising Wellcroft Street and Ladbury's Lane Clearance Areas, and the proposed Compulsory Purchase Orders for the purpose of ultimate redevelopment. Of the 98 properties involved, 91 were confirmed as being unfit for human habitation and Compulsory Purchase Orders were granted. Whilst the district was described as being in general sordid, in parts squalid, and in its entirety ripe for redevelopment, the fact that 28 recommendations for payments for well-maintained properties were made indicates the extent of the efforts made by many occupiers in combating the inevitable effects of age, decay, and bad planning. As a result of this action the total number of properties so dealt with was 329 by the end of the year.

In accordance with the provisions of the Clean Air Act of 1956, the Council duly considered, towards the end of the year, the declaration of the first Smoke Control Area in the Borough. It was resolved that such an Order be approved in principle for the Millfields District of the town, which included 458 private dwellings, and that it should come into force on the 1st August, 1960. A further phased programme for declaration of similar areas to cover the entire Borough was also agreed, the whole to be completed over a period of ten years.

Regarding the provision of new living accommodation, I am advised by the Borough Surveyor that 84 Local Authority and 14 Private Enterprise houses were erected during the year, bringing the grand total built in the town since the end of the war to 2,263 by the 31st December, 1959. The Housing Manager informs me that two families were re-housed during the year on medical grounds (tuberculosis).

In conclusion, I wish to express my thanks to the Council in general, and to the Chairman and members of the Public Health Committee in particular, for their continuing interest and encouragement throughout the year, also to all members of the staff of the Public Health Department and all other officers and members of other departments who have contributed in any way towards the compilation of this report.

#### SECTION B.

#### GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

(as at 31st December, 1959)

A number of environmental Health Services are provided by Staffordshire County Council under the National Health Service Act, 1946. For the purpose of administrating these services, the County has been subdivided into nine areas, the Borough of Wednesbury forming part of, and giving its name to, Area No. 9. Included in this, the largest Area, is the Borough of Bilston, and the Urban Districts of Willenhall, Darlaston and Wednesfield, the total population involved now standing at just over 152,000. A specific Area Health Committee has been convened to supervise the environmental services which are listed below, and the Borough is represented by three members. Your Medical Officer also serves in the capacity of Medical Officer to the Area Committee.

## Ambulance Service. (Section 27).

A 24-hour service is based on Richard Street Station, Darlaston (Tel. James Bridge 2591/2), and Ambulance movements are now controlled by radio from the station at Tipton.

## Ante-Natal Clinics. (Section 22).

King's Hill (School Street) 1st and 3rd Wednesdays, 2-15 p.m.

Mesty Croft (Alma Street) 2nd and 4th Tuesday, 2-15 p.m.

## Health Visiting Services. (Section 24).

Health Visitors are employed in the District by Staffordshire County Council for advice and instruction both in the home and at Infant Welfare Clinics.

## Home Help Service. (Section 29).

A number of women are employed for the purpose of assistance in the home during certain adverse conditions and a scale of charges for the service is applied according to financial circumstances. This service is operated from 20, Hydes Road, Wednesbury (Tel. WED 0961).

## Home Nursing Service. (Section 25).

Several fully-qualified District Nurses are employed by the County Council for general nursing duties in the home, as required by General Practitioners, or following discharge from hospital.

## Immunisation and Vaccination. (Section 26).

Protective treatment against Smallpox, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Poliomyelitis is available at Infant Welfare Centres and from General Practitioners.

## Infant Welfare Centres. (Section 22).

Three Infant Welfare Centres are maintained within the Borough by Staffordshire County Council, these being:

Albert Street .. . . Mondays and Thursdays, 2-15 p.m.

King's Hill (School Street) Tuesdays and Thursdays, 2-15 p.m.

Mesty Croft (Alma Street) Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 2-15 p.m.

## Midwifery. (Section 23).

Confinements in hospital arranged by Clinic and private doctors if on medical grounds; through Ante-Natal Clinics, if on social grounds. Domiciliary births, and care during the latter part of the puerperium, if discharged from hospital at an early date, are the duty of fully qualified midwives provided by Staffordshire County Council.

## Prevention of Illness, Care and After-Care. (Section 28).

This is mainly carried out by a Social Worker for the district provided by Staffordshire County Council who deals with convalescent treatment, assistance with clothing, extra food, and so on. Care of the aged and infirm is more the concern of the Area Welfare Officer.

## Water Supply.

- Mr. R. H. Taylor, B.Sc., M.I.C.E., Engineer-in-Chief, the South Staffordshire Waterworks Company, within whose statutory area the Borough of Wednesbury falls, has given me the following report in respect of the year 1959:—
  - (i) The water supply of the area has been satisfactory in(a) quality, and (b) quantity.
  - (ii) The supply to the Borough of Wednesbury is derived from the Barr Beacon and Hednesford systems. The Barr Beacon system consists of 5 pumping stations and the Hednesford system of 9 pumping stations. These pumping stations are examined regularly and frequently both bacteriologically and chemically, and where treatment is installed, both before and after treatment. Regular samples are taken within the Borough boundaries at Wednesbury Reservoir, the Waterman's house, Wednesbury, and Wood Green Repumping Station.

During 1959, 19 out of 23 samples from Wednesbury Reservoir were free from coliform bacteria. 17 out of 19 samples from the Waterman's house were free from coli. bact. All 35 samples from Wood Green Repumping Station were free from coli. bact.

- (iii) The waters are not liable to plumbo solvency, 19 samples from the Waterman's house being free from lead.
- (iv) Chlorination is practised at most of the pumping stations as a precautionary measure.
  - In cases of possible contamination and in the event of burst or damaged mains, emptying reservoirs, etc., emergency chlorination is performed. Special apparatus and staff are available for this work. New mains, etc., are not brought into use until the water has been examined and pronounced satisfactory.
- (v) The following are particulars of the number of houses supplied and the approximate population:—
  - (a) 10,287 houses supplied direct at 3.4 persons per house .. .. = approx. 34,976 persons
  - (b) 105 houses from outside taps at 3.4 persons per house . . . . = approx. 357 persons 10,392 houses = approx. 35,333 persons

## Drainage and Sewerage.

Mr. A. W. Ewart, A.M.I.C.E., Borough Engineer, reports:—
"The sewerage system functioned satisfactorily during the year ended 31st December, 1959, and no stoppages occurred.

The treatment of sewage at the Sewage Disposal Works was performed as satisfactorily as possible with the existing plant.

The rainfall for the year was 24.45 inches."

(N.B.—The rainfall for the year 1958 was 29.83 inches.)

## Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

Under the term Rodent Control 337 complaints of Rat Infestation affected 298 dwelling houses and 39 business premises and 96 complaints of Mice Infestation affected 89 dwelling houses and seven business premises.

These infestations required 1,524 visits.

In connection with Rat Infestation at five cases the sewers nearby were treated and in each case clearance was completed.

## Pet Animals, 1951.

As authorised officer I visited the premises of five persons who applied for licences under this Act. The premises were satisfactory and were consequently licensed until the end of the year.

#### Atmospheric Pollution.

Samples were again taken from the two observation stations first set up in the Borough in January, 1952, one station is in the garden of the Convent School, Church Hill, and the second at the Cemetery Lodge, Beebee Road, the highest and lowest points in the town respectively, until in August, young folk gained access to the Convent school premises whilst they were vacated and destroyed our No. 1 Station. Discussions then took place with owners of the land with a view to the revival of the Station.

The despoit gauges and Sulphur Candles installed at the Stations are changed monthly and forwarded to the County Laboratory at Stafford for the required analysis. These results are then passed to the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, Fuel Research Station at Greenwich.

#### Collection and Disposal of Refuse.

The method of disposal by tipping continues. Land is still being recovered at the Site at the end of Moor Street. This land will become useful on the verge at each side of the proposed Ringroad from Hydes Road to Crankhall Lane. The portion where the road will be, is being filled by heavy spoil.

It was June, 1959, before the collection work had been overcome after the absence through Sickness in February and March and a steady control was maintained until the end of December. Owing to a shortage of man-power at the Labour Exchange it is difficult to keep to the Establishment permitted. I am satisfied that the Bonus Scheme is a fair incentive and am also satisfied that we have a good overall system of accomplishing the task, but both these matters depend entirely on the good attendance of the men. Without diminishing the intense importance of maintaining Household Refuse Collection, a good establishment of men in good health allows for the Salvage and other duties to receive regular attention also.
