

The total number of notifications of cases of tuberculosis was 23, of which 17 had been previously notified.

No deaths from tuberculosis occurred in non-notified cases.

4.—INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

Protection against Diphtheria.

The desirability of providing facilities for the voluntary immunisation against Diphtheria has been brought to the notice of the Council, and the matter is still under consideration.

Closure of Schools.

It has not been necessary to close any of the schools on account of sickness for the period April 1st to December 31st, 1927. Peartree Infants School, however, was closed from February 15th to April 1st on account of an outbreak of Influenza and Diphtheria.

5.—SUMMARY (for reference) OF NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOSPITALS & OTHER INSTITUTIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

The Health Council and The Welwyn Garden City Health Association.

This Voluntary Institution is doing most valuable work and merits the support of the public in every possible way. The Health Council consists of the local members of the Medical Profession, six members elected by the Health Association and thirteen representative members elected by the Urban District Council and by firms and Trades operating in the Garden City.

The Health Association may help members in some of the following ways;—by supplying hospital letters, by part payment of ambulance transport to hospital, by providing first aid treatment (free) for the first 24 hours after an accident, and the services of a District Nurse. The Association also supplies Maternity Nurses at a reduced rate, and free consultations at the Infant Welfare and the Ante-Natal Clinics.

Also dental treatment (from 6d. per attendance and from 2/6 for gas) for Nursing Mothers and Children attending the Infant Welfare Clinic, Mothers attending the Ante-Natal Clinic and Children attending the Dental Clinic.

In addition the Association has under its auspices a Massage Clinic and an Electric Radiant Heat Bath (from 1/- per treatment).

The minimum subscription is one penny per week.

Further particulars can be obtained from the Secretary, 30 High Oaks Road, Welwyn Garden City.

6.—LABORATORY WORK.

Bacteriological Examinations.

Arrangements have been made whereby members of the Medical Profession practising in the district can obtain bacteriological reports (free of charge) in cases of diphtheria, enteric fever, tuberculosis and meningitis. In the case of tuberculosis, outfits for collecting specimens for examination can be obtained on application from the County Medical Office, Hertford, or from the Tuberculosis Officers at one of the dispensaries. These examinations are carried out at the Counties Public Health Laboratories, 91, Queen Victoria Street, London, E.C.4. During the year 33 examinations were made.

Provision of Anti-toxin.

Members of the Medical Profession practising in the district can obtain a supply of diphtheria anti-toxin free of charge. The anti-toxin is kept at the "Hollies" Nursing Home, Elm Gardens, Welwyn Garden City.

A supply of sterile throat swabs and outfits for Widals Tests are also available at this Institution.

7.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

Milk Supply.

There are two wholesale traders, 5 retail purveyors and two cowkeepers and milk producers on the register.

A considerable amount of milk is produced outside the district on registered premises under the supervision of four different Local Authorities.

Welwyn Dairy Farms Ltd. control three farms, two of which (Digswell Lodge Farm and Woodhall Lodge Farm) are in the district, while the third (Stanborough Farm) is situated in Hatfield Rural District.

About three-fifths of the milk supply to the Garden City is distributed by Welwyn Stores Ltd., through their Central Milk Depôt at Lower Handside Farm. This depôt has been organized under the direction of the Research Professor in Dairy Bacteriology, University College, Reading. The buildings at this farm have been reconstructed during the year and the drainage overhauled. The various buildings have been fitted with modern equipment for sterilising dairy utensils, etc., and for bottling milk on an extensive scale.

The staff of this depôt include a trained bacteriologist. The Laboratory is equipped with means for producing nutrient media and for the bacteriological and chemical examination of milk and dairy produce after modern methods. Water Supply.

Water is supplied to the town by Welwyn Garden City Ltd., and is obtained from deep bore-holes in the chalk formation.

The pumping station is situated in the valley of the Mimram (a tributary of the Lea) near the northern boundary of the Urban District, where the water is raised to reservoirs on the Sherrards Woods ridge in the north western quarter of the district.

The results of the examination of samples of the water show a high degree of bacteriological and chemical purity. Samples are taken periodically and the results have been invariably very satisfactory.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The town is sewered on the separate system. Surface water is drained to the valleys of the Lea and Mimram rivers, which bound the district on the south and north respectively.

Foul-water is gathered by tributary sewers to the main trunk sewer which traverses the town from south-west to north-east and discharges into sewage disposal works in the north-east corner of the District. The whole drainage system is new and in a satisfactory condition.

The system of disposal consists of detritus tanks, screens, continuous-flow settlement tanks, dosing tanks and percolating filters fed through revolving sprinklers. Both sludge and effluent are discharged on the surface of adjoining farm lands without nuisance, the Lea Conservancy Regulations prohibiting the discharge of any new effluent into the rivers.

There is a small temporary disposal works for the drainage of the south-western area. This plant is similar in character to the permanent works described above. It is intended in the near future to substitute an ejector plant for this temporary works and to treat the whole of the sewage at the permanent works which are to be extended within the next twelve months.

The surface drainage, sewerage and sewage disposal of the town are carried out by Welwyn Garden City Ltd. The details of the scheme have been sanctioned by the Ministry of Health.

During the year 1927 no extensions have been made except by the addition of a few small tributary sewers and drains. Scavenging.

House refuse is collected under contract with the Council once a week and is disposed of by tipping in an old gravel pit near the southern boundary of the district under a very stringent specification with satisfactory results at present. The collection is regular, bins are disinfected each week and there is no nuisance of any kind from the refuse tip.

There are a few cesspools connected with old cottages near the boundaries of the district. These are periodically pumped out by Welwyn Garden City Ltd. (the owners of the properties) and the contents disposed of by spreading on farm lands.

There are in the old dwellings referred to above, a number of pail closets which are emptied by the tenants. As the drainage system of the town extends, these are being converted to the water-carriage system.

8.—PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

One Medical Officer of Health (part time only).

One Sanitary Inspector, who is also Housing Manager for the Council.

The present office accommodation provided for the Public Health Staff consists of part of one room only. The question of additional accommodation is now under consideration by the Council.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR 1927.

To The Chairman and Members
of the Welwyn Garden City
Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my First Report of the Sanitary Work carried out during the nine months ending the 31st December, 1927.

The Parish of Welwyn Garden City was created an Urban District on 1st April, 1927, *vide* sections 3 and 4 of the Hertfordshire (Welwyn Garden City Urban District) Confirmation Order, 1927.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

- Water. Welwyn Garden City has an abundant supply of excellent water of high bacterial purity, derived from deep wells in the chalk, and distributed by the Water Company. A few of the smaller houses on the outskirts of the district obtain their water from shallow wells.
- RIVERS AND STREAMS. A small portion of the River Mimram, about three-quarters of a mile in length, runs through the Northern portion of the district. No complaint has been received, nor has any evidence been forthcoming that it is being polluted.
- DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE. The drainage of the district is on the water carriage system, and is mainly separate in character, the whole of the soil water sewage being dealt with by filtration at the Valley Road and Black Fan Sewage Works.
- 4. CLOSET ACCOMMODATION. The closet accommodation is on the water carriage system, with the exception of a few small houses, rural in character, on the outskirts of the district, where the pail system is generally in operation, and where the occupants arrange to bury the contents in their gardens.
- 5. Scavenging, &c. Houses have galvanised iron dust bins for refuse. All house refuse is collected weekly by Contractor's horse-drawn vehicles, and tipped on a dump near the 20th Mile Bridge. The refuse dump is well kept and free from nuisance.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area.

The total number of inspections made during the year was 229. In connection with 210 premises visited, sanitary defects to the number of 112 were discovered, and the necessary action taken to have these remedied.

For this purpose 112 informal notices and one statutory notice were issued.

The holding of the two offices, *i.e.*, Sanitary Inspector and Housing Manager for the Council's Housing Schemes, seems to work well in practice. It is found that tenants of Council Houses readily complain of unhygienic conditions when such conditions exist, and remedial measures are put in hand immediately nuisances are discovered; authority for such action being obtained at the next meeting of the Housing, Public Health and Sanitary Committee.

Of the informal notices sent, 89 were references to the Housing Department, for nuisances or defects found in Council Houses.

There were four complaints received of an annoyance from barking dogs. It is not generally understood that this is a Common Law nuisance and not a Statutory nuisance under the Public Health Acts, consequently the Council's Health Officials cannot insist on a remedy for barking dogs. All the complaints were referred to the Hertfordshire Constabulary, who have certain powers for controlling dogs.

References to the Surveyor's Department numbered seventyfive. These principally consisted of complaints of nuisances from full dust bins at a period when the Council changed the Contractor who undertook the work of house refuse collection. This work is now proceeding smoothly, and almost without complaint.

The Council's Surveyor, who has charge of the refuse collection and disposal work, refers complaints of defective dust bins which are brought to his notice to the Public Health Department, and twenty-one such complaints have been received and suitable action taken where necessary.

GRADE A (TUBERCULIN TESTED) MILK.

Applications to bottle and distribute

Toward the end of the period under review, an application was received from Welwyn Stores Ltd. to bottle and sell Grade A (TT) milk produced at Viscount Hampden's Dairy Farm, The Hoo, Kimpton, Welwyn, the Ministry of Health having granted the necessary producer's licence. Welwyn Stores Ltd. have installed a well-equipped laboratory at their Dairy and all milk is subjected to a bacteriological examination on arrival, the firm employing their own Bacteriologist.

Arrangements have now been made for samples to be submitted from time to time to the Council's Bacteriologist, and the result of each test will be reported to the Council for their information.

MEAT, &C.

The system of meat inspection in operation comprises irregular visits to the two stores. There are no slaughterhouses in the district.
